*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Sheriff, Governor, Gentlemen, Clergy, Grand Jury, and other Freeholders of the County of Antrim, assembled at a General Assizes and Goal Delivery held at Carrickfergus on the Nineteenth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and fifty six, for said County,

Presume at this Time to express our Abhorrence of and Resentment against the unjust and desperate Schemes formed by France to invade your Majesty's Dominions in Great Britain or Ireland. Your Majesty's paternal Care for the Welfare and Happiness of your Subjects has long since united us in Duty and most grateful Affection to your Majesty's Sacred Person, Family and Government. And we most humbly assure your Majesty, that we will on this, and every other Occasion, exert our utmost Power, and most willingly hazard our Lives and Fortunes, to support and defend your Majesty, and the Protestant Succession in your Royal Family, on which alone our Safety and Happiness as a People can depend, not doubting but the Zeal and Fidelity of your Majesty's Subjects, assisted by Divine Providence in so just a Cause, will be able to defeat these wicked Designs of your Enemies.

The following Address of the Mayor, Burgeses, Freeholders, and principal Inhabitants, of the Borough of Callington in the County of Cornwall, has been presented to His Majesty by John Sharpe, Esq; one of their Representatives

in Parliament, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Hyndford, one of the Lords of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Burgeses, Freeholders, and principal Inhabitants, of the Borough of Callington, beg Leave, in this our present alarming Situation, to give your Majesty the strongest Assurances of our most inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person, Family, and Government; and at the same Time to declare our utmost Resentment at, and Abhorrence of, the treacherous and insolent Preparations, which have been so openly and daringly made by a most perfidious and inveterate Enemy to invade these Kingdoms, in Breach and Violation of the most solemn Treaties.

We likewise beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we are ready and determined, with Hand and with Heart, to stand by and support your Majesty in this truly British Cause; and at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, and every Thing that is dear and valuable to us, to join with the rest of your Majesty's faithful Subjects, to repel and defeat this rash and desperate Enterprize, and to support and defend the invaluable Liberties and Privileges we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign, which we most sincerely pray may be Long, Happy, and Glorious.
