WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects are deeply sensible of the Insults and Injuries your Majesty has received by the treacherous Incroachments and Invasions made by the French King upon your Majesty's Dominions, both in Europe and America; and by the apparent insolent Attempts of that King to invade even your Kingdoms of Britain and Ireland, in open Violation of the most solemn Treaties betwixt the two Crowns: And we do, with Hearts full of Loyalty and Zeal for your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, express our chearful and humble Approbation of your Majesty's declaring War against the French King: And as it shall be our daily ardent Prayers to the Most High God, to grant Success to your Majesty's Arms by Sea and Land, in the vigorous Prosecution of that most just, lawful, and necessary War; so we do hereby heartily and willingly offer to serve your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes in so glorious a Cause, as is the Vindication of your Majesty's Honour, and the just Rights of your Crown.

Constantinople, May 1. The Vizir is not yet arrived, however it is assured he will be here on Monday or Tuesday next, when he will occupy the new Vizirat, which is rebuilt in a more extensive Manner than the former, and better calculated for the Conveniency of dispatching Business. The Caimachan took Possession of it Yesterday. The Sultana Valide, or Mother of the Grand Seignor, died on the 26th past, in a very advanced Age, upwards of Eighty; she was buried the same Day in the new Mosche, called the Splendor of Osman. The Polish Envoy Count Mnizeck, is still confined to his Chamber on Account of a Humour in his Leg, and

it is feared it may be some Time before he will be in a Condition to commence his Functions. Prince Dolgorucky, the Russian Envoy, is expected here in three or four Days; one of his Sons is already arrived.

Naples, May 11. Their Majesties are at Portici with the whole Court. Advice having been received, that the Barbary Corsairs have of late frequently appeared on our Coasts, the King has given Orders for two Frigats, and six Chebecks, to be equipped immediately, in order to cruize against those Pyrates.

Rome, May 15. The Fruits of the Earth having suffered greatly by the continual Drought we have had in these Parts for some Time past, publick Prayers were Yesterday put up in all the Churches of this City for Rain.

Stockholm, May 20. The Price of Bread in this City having considerably risen, the Government, in order, if possible, to reduce the same, has published an Ordonnance, forbidding, under severe Penalties, the Distilling of Spirituous Liquors from Corn till after the 15th of September next.

Copenhagen, May 23. On Wednesday last a Placard was published here, for obliging all Ships and Vessels that shall arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom from Algiers, or elsewhere on the Coast of Barbary, to perform an exact Quarantine. We have received an Account, that the King arrived last Tuesday Night at Corfoer; that the next Morning his Majesty visited the Fortifications of that Place, after which he passed the Belt, and continued his Route for Holstein.

Turin, May 26. Monday last being the Birth Day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Piemont, the same was observed at Court as usual.

Hambourg, May 28. The Report that was spread some Time since of the Swedish and Danish Fleets having failed, was without Foundation, the first continuing in the Port of Carlscron on the 16th Instant, and the other in the Road of Copenhagen the Beginning of last Week.

Frankfort, May 29. We have received Advice from Manheim, that the Princess, Spouse to Prince Frederick of Deux-Ponts, was Yesterday Morning safely delivered of a Prince, who was afterwards baptized by the Names of Maximilian-Joseph, the Elector of Bavaria standing Godfather. They write from Anspach, that Baron Seckendorff has obtained the Elector's Consent to resign his Post of Prime Minister; and 'tis said he will be succeeded by Baron Gemmingen, Governor of Montbeillard, who is daily expected at Anspach for that Purpose.

Dresden, May 30. Their Polish Majesties and the Princes Xaverius and Charles returned hither from Leipzig on Monday last, the 24th Instant; his Majesty is recovered from the Gout, and finds himself in perfect Health. Baron Halberg, the new Minister of the Elector Palatine at this Court, had his first Audience of his Polish Majesty on the 26th Instant.

Hague, June 3. By our last Advices from Dieren, her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, with the young Prince Stadtholder and his Sister, continue there in perfect Health. M. vander Mieden, and M. de Wirdum, who

were some Time ago appointed by the Council of State to settle the Duties, and visit the Fortifications and Magazines in Dutch Flanders, are set out from hence, in order to acquit themselves of that Commission.

Brussels, June 8. It does not appear, by the Accounts the French themselves give out, that, on the 24th of May, they had made any great Progress in their Attacks against St. Philip's Castle. We hear from Boulogne, that the rest of the Irish Brigade remaining in these Parts had Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march some Time this Month towards St. Malo, where they are to join, and be encamped with the other Part of the Brigade.
