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Whitehall, June 15.

THIS Day M. Michell, his Prussian Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires, notified to the Earl of Holderness, by Order of the King his Master, that the Remainder of the Principal and Interest of the Seven per Cent. Silesia Loan, will be paid in a few Days, and that Part of the Money is already lodged in the Bank for that Purpose.

Kensington, June 15.

The following Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, of the County of Dublin, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty; who was pleased to receive the same very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, of the County of Dublin.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly beg Leave; with Hearts full of Gratitude and Loyalty, to express our sincere Acknowledgments of your Majesty's continual paternal Care and vigilant Regard for the true Interest and Prosperity of all your Subjects, particularly by the vigorous Measures taken by your Majesty to protect our Commerce, and repress the Injuries of our faithless Enemies.

Permit us to express our just Indignation and sincere Abhorrence at the Attempts of our base and slavish Foe against these happy Nations, who so fully enjoy all Religious and Civil Liberties, and every Blessing of Peace and Freedom, under your Majesty's most excellent and auspicious Reign: And that Almighty God, of his infinite Goodness and Mercy, may prolong your Majesty's Reign, adorn it with Victory, Peace and Prosperity, bless and preserve your Royal Family, who are the Bulwark of our Religion and Liberties, is the ardent Wish and constant Prayer of your Majesty's most grateful and loyal County of Dublin, who on

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this, and every Occasion, are firmly resolved to stand by your Majesty, and your Royal Family, to the End of Time, with our Lives and Fortunes.

Warsaw, May 24. The Waters of the Vistula, which, by the almost continual Rains we have had for several Days past, were rose so high as to interrupt the Navigation, began to fall Yesterday, and this Morning a great Number of Barges, laden with Corn, sailed down that River for Dantzick.

Stockholm, May 25. His Majesty is perfectly recovered from his late Indisposition; and last Sunday he dined in Publick for the first Time, after which he rode out for the Benefit of the Air.

Dantzick, May 27. The great Quantities of Corn that have been lately bought up here for Hambourg, Lubeck, and other Places, has considerably rose the Price of that Commodity.

Lisbon, May 28. The Weather has been, for four or five Days past, so very stormy, that no Vessel has gone out of the Harbour; and it is much fear'd that the poor People, who are lodged in miserable Barracks, have much suffer'd by the great Rains that have fallen. Our Fears, relating to the Plague in Corfica and Genoa, prove to have been founded only on an Epidemical Distemper in the Island of Corfica.

Genoa, May 29. Letters from Marseilles of the 22d Instant, advise, that an Embarkation had been made from thence, to reinforce the Army under the Command of the Duc de Richelieu. It is said that the French have raised a Battery of nine Guns and five Mortars near the Signal House, opposite to the Castle of St. Philips, and that they had opened three Batteries of eight, twelve, and twenty-four Guns, in the Front of the Castle, which had began to play on the 14th Instant. The greatest Precautions are taken by the French to prevent any Intelligence being received of their Operations in Minorca, no Letters being suffered to go from thence but what are sent to be perused by the Duc de Richelieu, and then sealed with his Seal. And an Edict has been published, that makes it Death and Confiscation of Goods, if the Masters or Crew of any Vessels, that arrive from Minorca in the French Ports, should publish what is doing in that Island.

Turin, May 29. Little can be known concerning the Operations of the French at Minor-

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ca, as the Duc de Richelieu does not suffer any Officer, or Inhabitant of the Island, to receive or send away any Letters but through his Hands and under his Seal. The Report of an Engagement, on the 20th Instant, between the English and French Fleets in the Mediterranean, is confirmed from several Parts, and with different Circumstances, so that no exact Judgment can be formed of it, as the Accounts hitherto received are only from French Officers.

Berlin, June 1. The King has appointed the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Darmstadt, and Mess. Kleist and Winterfeld, to be Lieutenants General of Foot; and the Prince of Schonaich, and M. Katt, to be Lieutenants General of Horse. His Majesty has also been pleased to confer the Title of General on the Prince of Prussia, and that of Lieutenant General on Prince Ferdinand. The Command of the Regiment of Foot of the late Count Haake is given to Lieutenant General Winterfeld.

Hambourg, June 4. Their Highnesses the three young Princes of Hesse-Cassel arrived here last Night; and To-morrow towards Evening the King of Denmark is expected at Altona, where his Danish Majesty will pass the Whitfun Holydays. We have received the News here, that the reigning Duke of Mecklemburg Schwerin died at Schwerin the 30th past, in the 74th Year of his Age.

Hambourg, June 8. Last Saturday, towards Evening, the King of Denmark arrived at Altona, and dined that Day at Gluckstadt, seven German Miles from hence. His Danish Majesty was saluted upon his Arrival with 36 Guns from that Part of the Ramparts of this City, which faces the Town of Altona. The Prince of Hilbourghausen, Brother-in-Law to the King of Denmark, is here. The Day before Yesterday their Highnesses the three young Princes of Hesse-Cassel were presented to his Danish Majesty, and dined with the King. All the Foreign Ministers, who reside here, have paid their Court to his Majesty. The Deputies of this Magistracy, the Sieurs Klefeker and Dreffky, have been admitted to an Audience of the King, and were most graciously received. This Afternoon the King of Denmark came into this City on Horseback, attended by some of his Nobles and a Company of Cuirassiers, and passed through the principal Streets.

Hague, June 8. The Number of Busses that are to be employed this Year in the Herring Fishery amount to 154, viz. Schiedam 10, Delfshaven 17, Maastrandhuys 20, Vlaardingen 99, and Rotterdam 8. They are to sail next Tuesday, accompanied with 24 Tenders that are to be employed in carrying the first Fish that are taken to Hambourg, Bremen, Lubeck, &c. And the Number of Ships that are to be employed in the Whale Fishery this Year amount to 95, viz. Rotterdam 4, Schiedam 9, Delfshaven 1, Maastrandhuys 56, Vlaardingen 21, and the Breill 4.

Brussels, June 11. According to our Advices from the French Frontiers, the Regiment of Bourbonnois, of four Battallions, in Garrison

at Lille, and some other Regiments from the neighbouring Garrisons, are order'd to march immediately towards the Sea-Coast; and are to be replaced by the Militia of Brittany and Normandy, which is daily arriving in French Flanders, from those two Provinces. It is also said, that the Camp, to be formed between Dunkirk and Calais, under the Command of the Prince of Soubise, is to assemble about the latter End of this Month, and to consist of 30,000 Men. Our Letters this Day from France bring us no Particulars of the Siege of St. Philip's Castle.
