THE following Cases are published at the Request of a worthy Clergyman by whom the Medicine was administered.

Isabella Ba. l. y, of the Parish of Kilpeck, Herefordshire, of a thin Habit of Body, aged about Twenty, was taken (August 22, 1755) with a Shivering, which was soon succeeded by a violent Fever, the Symptoms of which were intense Heat, excessive Thirst, discoloured Tongue, Watchfulness and Deliriums.
