Florence, July 17.

ON the 7th Instant, fourteen Wag-gons, with divers Curiofities of all Kinds, which Marquis Ginori, the Governor of Leghorne, has procured from feveral Parts for the Emperor, paffed by this City on their Way to Vienna. We hear from Leghorne, that on the 9th Instant, the Ambaffador from the Bey of Tripoli to the Emperor was admitted to Pratick. He has a Retinue of twenty Perfons, and is entertained at the Expence of the Emperor, and propofes to fet out from Leghorne hither, on the 21ft, on his Journey to Vienna, to renew, it is faid, the Treaty of Friendfhip, &c. between Tufcany and the Regency of Tripoly. Yefterday the Commandeur d'Andreda, the late Portuguefe Minifter at the Court of Rome, arrived here from that City.

Bruffels, July 30. Our laft Advices from France only fay, that they are daily increasing the Number of Workmen that are employed about the Fortifications of Dunkirk, and that Marechal de Belle Ifle, and M. de Paulmy, are ordered to return directly to Court, without proceeding any further upon their Progreff along the Coafts.
