Rome, July 12.

ON Monday last a private Consistory was held in the Pope's Presence, at which the Cardinals Argenvilliers, Passionei, Millo, Spinelli, Cavalchini, and Paulucci, assisted, when the Differences between this Court and the Republick of Venice were taken into Consideration, but the Resolutions taken therein are not as yet made publick. The Cardinal Secretary of State, who was preparing to set out for the Baths of Viterbo, is taken so extremely ill, that his Journey is laid aside for the present. Last Tuesday Morning the new General of the Dominicans, accompanied by several of the Religious of that Order, was admitted to an Audience of the Pope, and met with a kind Reception.

Petersbourg, July 12. Her Imperial Majesty, who has been for some Time past at Petershoff, came to the Palace in this City on Thursday last, and was saluted thereupon by repeated Discharges of the Cannon of the Fortrefs and of the Admiralty.

Copenhagen, July 17. The King has appointed M. de Laurberg to be President of the Tribunal of Justice in the Island of Santa Cruz in America. His Majesty has conferred on Count Stollberg the Office of Marshal of the Court of the Queen-Mother; and the Post of Grand Bailiff of Segenberg, which Count Stollberg resigned on this Occasion, is given to M. Reitzenstein. M. Heydel, Captain of Horse in the Second Regiment of Jutland, is appointed Commandant of the Fort of Apen in the County of Oldenbourg, vacant by the Death of Lieutenant Colonel Bocaca. On Saturday last died Admiral Schinder, in the 82d Year of his Age.

Mayence, July 24. The Elector our Sovereign, who has been for these three Weeks past at Worms, set out from thence Yesterday for Aschaffembourg for the Remainder of the Summer. By the Preparations that are making at Landau, it is thought that a considerable Body of French Troops are shortly to assemble in the Neighbourhood of that Place. Last Wednesday Night we had a most violent Storm of Thunder, Lightning and Rain, which did considerable Damage, not only in and about this City, but also in several of the adjacent Villages.

Amsterdam, July 28. On Monday last three Ships arrived in the Texel from Batavia, one from Bengal, and two from the Island of Cey-

lon. We are informed by our last Letters from Marseilles, that one of our Men of War, named the Dolphin, sailed from that Port on the 16th Instant for Holland, with several Merchantmen under her Convoy. And we have received Advice, that three other Ships belonging to our East India Company are arrived in the Maese, and that six more were seen upon our Coast, five of which come from China.

Vienna, July 28. Marshal Brown arrived here from Bohemia on Saturday Evening. It is now said three Camps will be formed in Bohemia; at Koniggratz, Colin, and Teutschbrod; and the Troops, which are to compose them, are on their March from all Quarters. Monday, being the eldest Archduchess's Name-day, there was a very numerous Court at Schonbrun; and their Imperial Majesties, with the Royal Family, dined in Publick. The two new Cardinals, with all the Foreign Ministers, and others of the first Quality of both Sexes, dined at a great Table prepared in the Gallery for that Purpose; and there was a Drawing-Room in the Evening, as usual. Count Rosenbe.g, who goes to Spain in Quality of their Imperial Majesties Minister Plenipotentiary, sets out Tomorrow on his Journey by the Way of Paris. M. d'Aubeterre, the French Minister, has obtained Leave to go home on his private Affairs, and it is said M. Follard will come hither to take care of the Affairs of that Court, during the former's Absence.

Dresden, August 1. On the 24th of last Month there was a violent Storm of Thunder, which fell upon the Porcelain Fabrick at Meissen. It splitted the Beams, pierced all the Vaults, caused a considerable Damage as to the Porcelain, and wounded eight Men that were at Work in the Vaults.
