WHEREAS James Zouch, otherwise Souch, of *Poynings*, in the County of *Suffex*, Miller; Thomas Ticehurst, of *Patcham* in the said County, Taylor; John Kenward, of *Henfield* in the said County, Yeoman; Francis Ballard, commonly called or known by the Name of *Old Tom*, of *Tarring-Nevil*, in the said County, Farmer; Richard Ballard, of *Southease* in the said County, Farmer; Edward Saunders, of the same Place, Labourer; George Barnham, commonly called or known by the Name of *Swath*, of *Bighthelmstone*, in the said County, Victualler; James Davis, of *Patcham* aforesaid, Husbandman; Samuel Grover, of the same Place, Husbandman; William Chapman, of *Poynings* aforesaid, Miller, Richard Shirley, of the same Place, Labourer, both Servants to the said James Zouch, otherwise Souch; and William Gutteridge, commonly called or known by the Name of *Gip*, of *Tarring-Nevil* aforesaid, Labourer, Servant to the said Francis Ballard, were, upon the Fifteenth Day of July last, charged by Information of a credible Person, upon Oath, by him subscribed before *Elfred Staples*, Esquire, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the County of *Suffex*, with having been guilty, on or about the Thirteenth Day of April, which was in the Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred and fifty five, together with diverse other Persons, one of them being armed with a Club or large Stick, and most of them with large loaded Whips, or other offensive Weapons, of being all assembled at a Place called *Row-dean Gap*, in the Parish of *Rottingdean*, in the said County of *Suffex*, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Running, Landing, and Carrying away uncustomed Goods, to wit, about Fifteen Hundred Weight of Tea, and of having by Force and Violence rescued and took away the said Goods,

after they had been seized by the Custom House Officers—Which Information was afterwards certified by the said *Elfred Staples*, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, in that Case made and provided—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said James Zouch, otherwise Souch, Thomas Ticehurst, John Kenward, Francis Ballard, commonly called or known by the Name of *Old Tom*, Richard Ballard, Edward Saunders, George Barnham, commonly called or known by the Name of *Swath*, James Davis, Samuel Grover, William Chapman, Richard Shirley, and William Gutteridge, commonly called or known by the Name of *Gip*, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the *London Gazette*, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

*War Office, August 17, 1756.*

On Saturday last His Majesty dismissed Lieutenant General *Thomas Fowke* from His Service.

*Lisbon, July 9.* Last Sunday being the Anniversary of the Birth of the Infant *Don Pedro*, the King's Brother, there was a splendid Appearance at Court, which is still kept under Tents near *Belem*, the Palace that is building of Wood not being as yet finished. On Friday last we had a severe Shock of an Earthquake, which lasted near a Minute, but it happily went off without doing much Damage. The Fleet bound for *Maragnan* put to Sea a few Days ago with a fair Wind, and was convoyed to a certain Distance by two Men of War.

*Copenhagen,*

*Copenhagen, July 30.* On Saturday last the Danish Squadron of Men of War failed from the Sound on its Return to the Baltick. Yesterday the Frederick and Louisa, belonging to our India Company, arrived in our Road from Tranquebar, having on board a very valuable Cargo.

*Berlin, Aug. 3.* The King has conferred on M. de Wuthenow, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Foot of Kallenheim, the Post of Commandant of Pillau. M. de Borck, Lieutenant General of his Majesty's Armies, having obtained Leave to quit the Service, his Regiment is given to M. Zastrow. 'Tis said the King intends to set out in a short Time for Silesia.

*Dresden, August 5.* The King has ordered a Number of Workmen to be taken from the Mines of Freyberg, and employed about strengthening the Fortifications of Konigstein. By our last Advices from Bohemia, the Preparations for forming the Camp near Colin, go on with great Diligence; and we are likewise informed, that another Camp is also forming near Hollitschau in Moravia.

*Dresden, Aug. 8.* The Cannoniers, who have been preparing Cartridges, &c. for this Month past, at the Arsenal in this City, returned last Wednesday to their Garrison at Freyberg. They are now employed in repairing the Pontoons. 'Tis assured that the whole Artillery in the Arsenal will be removed from hence to Konigstein, which Place is now strongly fortifying. We hear from Bohemia, that the Austrians, who are forming a Camp there, have entirely prohibited the Exportation of Corn, and all Kinds of Provisions whatsoever, out of that Country.

*Hague, Aug. 10.* We have received Advice from Dieren, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Children, arrived there Yesterday in perfect Health.

*Brussels, Aug. 13.* According to the last Advices received by the French Court from Quebec, it appears that a contagious Distemper had broke out on board the Leopard, a 64 Gun Ship, belonging to the Squadron that failed from Brest on the 26th of March, with the Reinforcements for Canada, under the Command of M. de Moncalm. The two Captains, several subaltern Officers, and a great Number of Sailors and private Soldiers were carried off by this Distemper, the Consequences of which were so much apprehended, that the greatest Precautions were used at Quebec, to prevent the spreading of the Infection, and the Ship even condemned to be burnt with every Thing on board. Letters from Brest advise, that the Diadem, a new Ship of 74 Guns, had so bent her Keel in Launching, that she is deemed quite unfit for Service.
