Rome, August 14.

ON the 5th Instant the Pope's Gallies returned to Civita Vecchia to refit, in order to put to Sea again to cruize against the Barbary Corsairs. On the 6th Instant Cardinal Ferroni sat out for Florence, to pass some Weeks in his native Country.

Florence, Aug. 21. Last Week the Regency met to consider of the Request of the Governor of Leghorn for a Reinforcement of Troops from hence, in the present critical Conjunction of Affairs; but no Determination as yet has been taken. On the 11th Instant Count Richecourt sat out for the Pisa Baths, and, on his Return from thence, proposes to take a Journey to Vienna.

Turin, Aug. 18. A second Earthquake was felt here the 13th in the Morning, about twenty Minutes after nine; it was stronger than the first. At Suza the Shock was so great, that the Inhabitants went out of their Houses, and even during Mass, the People deserted the Churches.

Vienna, Aug. 18. Regiments are passing daily by this City, in their Way to the Camps in Bohemia and Moravia; and a Body of 4 or 5000 Croatians are in full March, and will pass by here some Day next Week. To-morrow three Battalions, and two Companies of Grenadiers of Marshal Leopold Daun's Regiment, are to leave this City; and, in their Absence, the Garrison of this Place is to consist of a Battalion of that Regiment, one of Waldeck, one of Botta, one of Piccolomini, and one of Sincere, with the Grenadiers of Baaden-Baaden, and of Teutsch Meister. The Regiments of Foot that are to be encamped, have only three of their Battalions and their Companies of Grenadiers in the Field, the rest being left in order to recruit. Three Regiments are ordered from Italy, to supply the Place of those now called from the Provinces of Stiria, Carinthia, &c. And the Regiments of Horse and Foot in Italy, are to be immediately made up to their full Complement. General Stambach died a few Days ago, which makes a Regiment of Cavalry vacant. The Emperor sets out To-morrow or

next Day for Hollitsch, and the Empress will follow on Saturday next.

Venice, Aug. 20. On Tuesday last a violent Storm of Wind tore off the Roof of the Town Hall, and did much Damage to a great Number of Houses in Padua, and in the Country round about, and tore up many Trees by the Roots. Likewise at Mastri, within five Miles of this City, and in that Neighbourhood, great Numbers of Boats were overfet, in one of which were 21 Persons, 17 or 18 of whom were drowned.

Brussels, Aug. 31. Our last Advices from Paris confirm the Intention of the French Court to send a Body of Troops into the Island of Corsica. The Embarkation was to be made (as they give out) at Antibes, on the 20th Instant, and was to consist of eight Battalions, under the Command of the Marquis de Castries. The Regiments named for this Expedition are those of Flandres, Montmorin, Diesbach, and Hockart.
