St. James's, November 10.

THIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Birth Day, there was a numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

From the Camp of Budin the 21st of October.

Since the Saxon Army was shut up between Pirna and Konigstein, we had always endeavoured, on our Side, to facilitate their Retreat into Bohemia; at last having concerted the Plan to effect it, his Excellency Marshal Brown put himself at the Head of a Body of Troops composed of three Regiments, Brown, Kolowrath, and Durlack, with 2000 Croates, 10 Companies of Grenadiers, 4 of Horse Grenadiers, 300 Dragoons, and 500 Hussars, with 20 Pieces of Cannon. His Excellency took with him General Kolowrath, the Duke of Arenberg, Maquire, and Haddick. This Body passed the Elbe the 8th at Raudnitz; hereafter I shall give a particular Relation of the Expedition: In the mean Time the two Armies rest very quietly in the Position they were in since the Battle of Lowoschutz, that of the Enemy behind the Village, and ours at Budin; nothing extraordinary passed, but our Hussars bring in every Day some Prussian Prisoners; and there arrives continually Numbers of Deserters.

The 15th, Day of St. Therese, being the Birth-day of her Imperial Majesty, his Excellency Count Luchesi, General of Cavalry, who had the Command of the Army in the Absence of Marshal Brown, ordered Te Deum to be sung at the Head Quarters with all possible Solemnity: At the same Time he published the Promotion of some Officers, who had particularly signalized themselves at the Battle of Lowoschutz, their Majesties having nominated them immediately after having received the News of the Battle: General Count Odonel was declared Lieutenant General of Horse, with the Promise of the first vacant Regiment; the two Colonels, Baron Materni and Count Lacy, General Majors; and the General Prince of Lovenstein had the Regiment which was vacant by the Death of Count Radicati.

The 18th arrived in the Camp the Regiments of Bethlehem and of Marshal, Infantry, both from Koniggratz, in very good Order.

The 20th arrived the Body of Troops that had been detached to succour the Saxons, and

they were followed this Morning by the Regiment of Luchesi Cuirassiers, who came from Koniggratz. As the Troops, which come from Italy, are already on the Frontiers of Bohemia, our Army, by the End of this Month, will be considerably reinforced, besides the Soldiers that are recovered, and by the Recruits which arrive daily from Prague. Major General Luzou is also arrived at the Army.

I will very shortly send you a Relation of our Expedition to succour the Saxons, who by their Fault have made us lose the Advantages we ought to have reaped, and rendered useless all the Blood, Pains, and Expences that was prodigally thrown away for them at Lowoschutz.

From the Camp of Budin, October 26.

The 22d, the Enemy made divers Motions towards our Left, which obliged his Excellency Marshal Brown to order a Detachment of 2000 Men, under the Order of Count Althan, Major General. This Detachment marched the 23d to Postelberg, to harrafs the Enemy in their Foraging, and to guard that Part of the Circle of Satz from their Exactions.

The 24th, the Prussians broke up their Camp of Lowoschutz, and began to retire in two Columns, one by the Road of Auffig, the other by that of Topliz. As we could not penetrate their real Design, the Marshal thought proper to reinforce the Detachment of Count Althan with 2000 Men, under the Command of General Burkhausen.

The 25th, all the Prussian Army marched to Linay, where they halted to Day. As they marched their Baggage and Artillery in the Road to Auffig, General Haddick was sent to harrafs the Rear Guard with his Hussars; he behaved with his usual Courage and Prudence, of which we had so many Proofs in the late War in Flanders: Besides the Prisoners and Baggage he took, he facilitated the Deserion, insomuch that in four Days, 200 of their Deserters arrived here, not counting those that took the Road of the Eger. At the same Time the Marshal ordered the Croats to cross the Elbe at Tetschen on Rafts. After the Enemy had abandon'd the Castle of Tetschen, General Maquire took Possession of it, with the Body that had passed the Elbe, and fell on their Rear Guard, and cut many of them to Pieces, and took some Prisoners, without losing a single Man.

Dresden, Oct. 31. We learn from Warsaw, that his Polish Majesty, and the Princes Xavierius and Charles are safely arrived there. Her Majesty the Queen, and the rest of the Royal Family here, continue to be in good Health.

Dresden, Nov. 4. His Prussian Majesty not intending to take Winter Quarters in Bohemia, where

where the Winter begins early, and is extremely severe, and consequently would make the subsisting the Army from Saxony very difficult, by obstructing the Carriage either by the Elbe or thro' the Mountains; Marshal Keith was ordered to send off the Baggage of his Corps on the 21st past, the Horse and heavy Artillery on the 22d; which was accordingly executed.

The King of Prussia left Struppen the 20th, accompanied with ten Battalions to cover the Retreat of his Bohemian Army, and lay that Night at Peterswald, and the next at Lenai; on the 22d in the Morning (leaving his Battalions at Lenai) he went on to Lowoschutz, but returned that Night to Lenai. The 23d early in the Morning the Camp at Lowoschutz broke up; they formed into two Columns, the first, commanded by Marshal Keith, the second by the Prince of Prussia. Marshal Keith detached four Battalions by the Banks of the Elbe to guard the Right of the Army, and, at the same Time, to pick up the Detachments placed along the River: They joined the Army at Lenai. The Prince of Bevern commanded the Rear Guard, which consisted of 8 Battalions, 5 Squadrons of Dragoons, and 5 of Hussars. On the Left of the Rear of the Army, but, at some Distance, was posted Part of the Regiment of Zeithen Hussars, to prevent the Austrian Irregulars from acting. No Attempt whatever was made to molest the Prussians in their Retreat, and they lay that Night, the 23d, behind Lenai, where they rested the 24th and 25th.

The King of Prussia had occupied with his ten Battalions all the high Grounds about Lenai, and his Army continued to retire in perfect Safety, his Battalions still marching on, and keeping Possession of the Heights. The Army advanced on the 26th to Teutsch Neudorff, encamped there, and the next Day the 27th, to Schoenwald, where they had Orders to separate into Quarters of Cantonment. On the 28th the King arrived at Great Sedelitz. Part of the Camp at Sedelitz, broke up that Day, and the rest the next, and went into Quarters of Cantonment. The whole Prussian Army is cantoned in the Villages hereabout, and along the Elbe towards Dresden, so as to be capable of assembling in less than 24 Hours upon any Occasion.

The 30th Lieutenant General Winterfield marched with five Battalions: It is said he is to join the Corps of seven Battalions commanded by General Lestwitz, and that they were to march to Zittau, in Lusatia, in order to join the Army under Marshal Schwerin, if there should be Occasion.

The 31st the Saxon Life Guards took the Oaths to the King of Prussia, who permitted the under Officers of that Corps to come into the Chamber, whilst he dined, where they had Wine given them, and they seem'd very hearty. It is not known whether the Officers of that Corps are to serve, but it is imagined that the Example of those Guards will have an Effect upon the other Saxon Regiments.

It is believed the Army will continue in the Cantonments for some Weeks, and then go into Winter Quarters; but this depends upon the Resolutions and Motions of the Austrian Generals.

The King of Prussia has given the Saxon Regiments as follow:

Foot Guards, to General Blankensee; Bruhl, to General Wyllich; Rochow, to General Wetersheim; Gotha, to General Saldern; Minkewitz, to General Manstein; Lubomirski, General Ulfeld. There are four Seven

Regiments of Foot not yet disposed of: The Regiments of Horse Rutoffski is aggregated to the Prince of Wurtemberg's Regiment, as the Gardes de Corps, Cavalry, are likewise to the Prussian Guards. The other Saxon Regiments, it is said, will be incorporated with, and dispersed amongst the Prussian Regiments.

Brussels, Nov. 2. The Troops that were in Garrison in this Town began to move towards Luxembourg on Saturday last, and are followed by other Corps who arrive here successively every Day from other Parts of the Country, in their Way to the same Place. The last Division, with the Artillery and Pontoons, is to set out from Mechlin To-morrow. The Day for his Royal Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine's Departure is not yet fixed.

Brussels, Nov. 5. The first Division of the Artillery, belonging to the Body of Troops that are assembling at Luxembourg, did not arrive here till Yesterday from Mechlin. The other Division is expected in Town this Evening. Twelve Hundred Horses have been taken up by the Government for this Service. All the General Officers who are to command these Troops are still here, but purpose to set out the Beginning of next Week. On Monday next the States of Brabant are to assemble. M. Luigiuzzi, who was the Empress Queen's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Madrid, arrived here from thence the Day before Yesterday, and sat out again this Day, on his Return to Vienna.

Brussels, Nov. 9. The Troops that are marching from the Austrian Netherlands into Germany, are to reach Luxembourg before they receive their Orders for proceeding forward, so that their Destination is still unknown. The Remainder of the Field Artillery, belonging to them, pass through this Town on Sunday last; the whole consists of 64 Pieces, including Haubitzers, with every Thing necessary for such a Train, besides 50 Pontoons. The States of Brabant assembled Yesterday, when Count Robiano took the Oaths as Chancellor of this Province, and began the Functions of that Employment by demanding, in the Empress Queen's Name, the Subsidies necessary for her Imperial Majesty's Service.
