AT the Court at *St. James's* the 4th Day of February, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by His Majesty's Proclamation, bearing Date the Fourth Day of January last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and "Able-bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; For granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; For pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and "shall return into the Service; And also for "taking up all Straggling Seamen"—His Majesty was pleased to promise and declare, amongst other Things, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Tenth Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by the said Proclamation; As likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Tenth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service:— And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring, and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly Ordered, That the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the Bounties and Rewards aforementioned be prolonged and extended from the said Tenth Day of this Instant February, to the Tenth Day of March next inclusive; and that the said respective Bounties, and Rewards, be continued to be paid by the Persons, and at the Times directed by His Majesty's aforesaid Proclamation.

"Sir, Wee the poor of "this Niborhood do desire you as you are chief at "presant that you will petition His Majesties Grace "to hinder the Maltors, that the make no more "Malt for this Year, for Wee can live without Drink "but not without Bread, for Wee must all starve if "not Timly prevented This Wee implore you first "with Tears. But if You lie sleeping & Wee "starving by your Side, Wee will soon gather, & "burn Your house, & destroye both You & Yours; "For if the Enemy be so near it is time stirr.—See "Wee offer you Life and Death, Chuse which you "please — Foriskue Grigar & Carlion shall share "with you."— His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said Letter, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to be paid by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.*

Madrid, Jan. 11. The Council of the Indies has received Advice from Buenos Ayres, that after the Indians of the River Uruguay were routed by his Catholick Majesty's Troops, in Conjunction with those of his most Faithful Majesty, in the Battie of the 10th of last February, the Victors had continued their March to the Settlements; and, after overcoming immense Difficulties, which they met with from the Nature of those Defarts, they had quartered themselves, without any Opposition, in the Villages of the Indians, who were preparing for their Transmigration, to the Places that might be appointed for them.

Dresden, Jan. 23. The Prussian Field Artillery is already prepared, and every Thing is kept in Readiness for marching. All the Saxon Officers, who, when they were made Prisoners of War, engaged themselves to repair wherever his Prussian Majesty should think fit, are ordered to come here by the latter End of this Month.

Brussels, Feb. 1. The Letters that arrived here from Vienna the Day before Yesterday, brought us the News, that the Archduke Joseph is fallen ill of the Small Pox, which occasions the greater Uneasiness, as the Empress Queen has never had that Distemper. Our Advices from France contain no Particulars of Damien's Tryal. But they inform us, that on Sunday Se'nnight the Grand Chambre of the Parliament repaired to Versailles, upon the King's Orders, when the Chancellor declared to them, in his Majesty's Name, "That instead of revoking "his late Declarations, it was his Pleasure, that "they should have their full Execution, and "that the two Chambers of Enquêtes and Re-quêtes should remain suppressed.
