P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Fourth of February last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this Instant March: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seaman and Landman respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of April next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of April next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

This Day his Grace Thomas Duke of Leeds was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Dresden, March 13. On Tuesday last Mr. Mitchell, his Britannick Majesty's Minister, returned to this City. All the Saxon Officers, who subsist on Pensions from the Court, as also those of sixty Years of Age, who had received Orders to leave this Place, have, at the Intercession of Field Marshal Rutowsky, obtained Leave to remain here.

Dresden, March 20. The Week before last the Duke of Bevern marched out of Zittau with a Body of near 9000 Men, in order to destroy the Dens the Austrians keep upon their Frontiers. In which Expedition he took the Austrian Magazine at Friedland in Bohemia, consisting of 9000 Sacks of Meal and great Store of Ammunition; and, after making himself Master of Reichenberg, he returned to Zittau. The Van of his Troops, consisting of 150 Hussars of the Regiment of Putkammer, met a Body of 600 Croats, sustained by two Hundred Austrian Dragoons of Bathiani, at their entering Bohemia, and immediately fell upon them Sword in Hand, killed about Fifty of them, took Thirty Horses, and made Ten Dragoons Prisoners. The Prussians did not lose one single Man on this Occasion, two of them only were slightly wounded, the Austrians having been immediately put to flight.

Brussels, March 18. The French Troops intended for the Army on the Lower Rhine, are in Motion every where; and this Evening the first Division from Lille is to be at Ghent. We have Advice from Paris, that Marechal de Belle Isle is very much out of Order. Private Letters from Brest mention, that the Fleet, which had just sailed from thence, was obliged to put back again on the 6th Instant; the Formidable of 84 Guns, on Board of which was General Lally, having run foul of another Ship, by which both were much damaged, the Formidable, in particular, having lost her Masts.

Brussels, March 22. The Marquis de Crillon, Marechal de Camp, arrived here Yesterday with the First Division of the French Troops, consisting of two Battalions of the Regiment de la Marine; and this Day they are to be replaced by two Squadrons of d'Aubigné's Dragoons. Some Alterations have been made with regard to the Corps of Austrians which are to join the French. That Corps is now to consist of one Battalion of each of the four Walloon Regiments of Ligne, Los Rios, Saxe Gotha, and Arberg, to each of which have been added a Company of Grenadiers of 60 Men, draughted out of the Battalions that remain in the Netherlands. These Troops are to be assembled at Ruremonde on the 31st Instant. The Letters from Paris confirm the Return of the French Fleet to Brest on the 6th Instant, occasioned by a Hurricane, in which several of the Ships lost their Masts.

Brussels, March 25. The Prince de Soubise arrived here Yesterday, and alighted at the French Minister's. He purposes to proceed Tomorrow Morning for Stockem. The French Troops continue to march through this Place by two Battalions or two Squadrons a Day. Those that are already gone through, are the four Battalions of La Marine, and the four Squadrons of d'Aubigné's Dragoons. This Day the Regiment of Salis-Grifons, of two Battalions, is expected in Town. For the Conveniency of the French Troops passing through this Country, the

the Government here has published a Placart, by which the small French Coins, such as Mousquetaires, Pieces of six Liards, of six Sols, of 12 Sols, and of 24 Sols, are allowed to be current in the Austrian Netherlands, provisionally, as they were during the last War. The Letters from Paris mention the Arrival of the Marechal d'Estrees at Versailles, on the 18th Instant. The Dolphin Packet Boat, Captain Cockrill, bound from Helvoet to Harwich, was taken and carried into Calais, the 20th Instant, by a French Privateer Snow, of 14 Guns and 130 Men, called the General Lally, Pierre Sauvé, Commander, belonging to Boulogne. The Mail was thrown over-board. The Letters just arrived from France, tell us likewise, that the Hanover Packet Boat, bound from Falmouth to Lisbon, has been taken and carried into Brest by the Comtesse de Bentheim Privateer belonging to St. Malo.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on the 27th Day of June, in the Year 1755, George Bright, an Officer to the then Sheriff of His Majesty's County of Cornwall, being, in the Execution of his Office, levying a Sum of Money on the Goods and Chattels of John Cock, of Ennission in the said County, Esq; by Virtue of the said Sheriff's Warrant, on a Writ of Fieri Facias, issued out of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas, at Westminster, at the Suit of Arundell Cock, Gent. was barbarously murdered by a Shot, received from a Gun, fired at him by the said John Cock; and that a Bill of Indictment was found against the said John Cock, for the said Murder, at the then next Assize held at Bodmin in and for the said County of Cornwall; but that, notwithstanding legal Processes have been issued on the said Indictment, and all possible Endeavours used, for apprehending and bringing to Justice the said John Cock, he has been, and continues still to be, so environed and protected by a Set of desperate Persons, that, the same have, hitherto, proved ineffectual.—His Majesty, for the better and more speedy apprehending and bringing to Justice the said John Cock, is hereby pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall so apprehend and secure him, that he may be brought to a legal Trial for the said Murder; the said Reward of One Hundred Pounds to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon his, the said John Cock's, Conviction for the said Crime.

Several Persons having been prosecuted, by the Order of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, (of which Order Notice was given in the London Gazette of Saturday the 23d of October last) for selling several Tickets, called Irish Tickets, to be determined by the drawing of the last State Lottery, in Disobedience of the Laws made against such Practices, two of which Persons, viz. Mr. John McCarrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, were, on Tuesday the 7th of March Instant, convicted of the said Offence, before the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, and Sir Robert Ladbroke, Knight, one of the Aldermen of the City of London, on the Statute made in the Eighth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2. Sect. 36. which inflicts a Penalty of 500 l. and one Year's Imprisonment in the County Goal, without Bail or Mainprie, on every Person so convicted.

For the preventing other Persons being guilty of the like Offences, Notice is hereby given, that all Persons offending against the said Act, will be prosecuted forthwith, the Solicitor of His Majesty's Treasury having received Orders for that Purpose.

Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Lyntonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman in Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unwrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Swaffham, Attleborough, Windham, Thetford, Lynn Stoke, Bury St Edmunds, New Market, Saffron Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sawbridge, worth, Downham, Epping, Ongar and Ely.

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a pl in Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swift Tail.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
