the Government here has publified a Placart, by [which the small French Coins, such as Mousquetaires, Pieces of fix Liards, of fix Sols, of 12 Sols, and of 24. Sols, are allowed to be current in the Austrian Netherlands, provisionally, as they were during the last War. The Letters from Paris mention the Arrival of the Marechal d'Estrées at Verfailles, on the 18th Instant. The Dolphin Packet Boat, Captain Cockrill, bound from Helvoet to Harwich, was taken and carried into Calais, the 20th Instant, by a French Privateer Snow, of 14 Cuns and 130 Men, call. ed the General Lally, Pierre Sauve, Commander, belonging to Boulogne. The Mail was thrown over-board. The Letters just arrived from France, tell us likewise, that the Hanover Packet Boat, bound from Falmouth to Lisbon, has been taken and carried into Brest oy the Comtesse de Bentheim Privateer belonging to St. Malo.
