The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 13th of October last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April.---And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the same should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy-Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, The Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, The Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, The Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the First of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this Instant April: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seaman and Landman respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of May next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Constantinople, March 3. The new Vizir Ragib, Pascha of Aleppo, arrived here on the 27th inst. He is at present taken up with the usual Visits of Ceremony; the Foreign Ministers will begin their Audiences some Time next Week. The Testerdar, or Head of the Treasury, who has been ill a considerable Time, so as to prevent his acting in the Functions of his Office, has been laid aside, and another named in his room. The Vizir Cheala has been deposed, and one Jusuph Esfendi, a Man of an exceeding good Character, has been appointed to succeed him: Other Changes are expected.

Brussels, April 8. Since last Tuesday no French Troops have passed thro' this Place; but on Wednesday arrived here 60 Copper pontoons, and about 30 Caissons, with Gunpowder, and other Ammunition. All the heavy Artillery, that is appointed for the Use of this Army, is to be embarked upon the Maese and the Rhine. The Number of Pieces is said to be very considerable. Yesterday in the Evening a Messenger arrived from Vienna, with an Account, that her Imperial Majesty has suppressed the two Supreme Councils of Flanders and Italy, of both which Count Tarouca was President. The Affairs of both those Departments are now under the Direction of Count Kaunitz. M. de Karle, the Third of the Austrian Commissaries at the last Conferences at Brussels, is appointed the Empress Queen's chief Commissary, to take Possession of such Conquests as may be made in these Parts upon the King of Prussia, and sets out Tomorrow for Guelderland.

Brussels, April 12. On Saturday arrived here the two Battalions of the Grenadiers Royaux de d'Aulan, which were followed the next Day by those of Bergeret, and Yesterday by two Battalions of the Grenadiers de France. These last, which are the most compleat, and make the best Appearance of any of the French Troops that are gone through this Place, are composed of the Companies of Grenadiers belonging to those Regiments that have been incorporated since the last Peace. Our Letters from Paris confirm the sailing of a Squadron of four Ships from Toulon, under the Command of M. du Reveft: But it seems that M. d'Apcher's Fleet was not sailed from Brest on the 1st Instant.

His Majesty's Ship *York*, Captain *Pigot*, arrived from a Cruise, in *Plymouth Sound*, the 11th Instant, with 412 Prisoners and three French Prizes, viz. *Le Don de Dieu*, from *Rochelle*, bound to *Mississipi*, loaded with

Wine, Brandy, Flour, and Soap, with 82 Persons on board, 60 of them Soldiers, taken the 11th of *March*, off *Cape Finisterre*; the *Henry*, from *St. Malo*, bound to *Cape Breton*, loaded with Provisions on the French King's Account, and 49 Men; and the *Ruby*, from *St. Malo* likewise, bound to *Canada*, with 281 Persons on board, 227 of them Soldiers of Fischer's Regiment; both taken the 10th Instant, the Land's End bearing North, distance 12 Leagues.

Several Persons having been prosecuted, by the Order of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, (of which Order Notice was given
