Westminster, December 1.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

IT would have given Me the greatest Pleasure to have acquainted you, at the Opening of this Session, that Our Success in carrying on the War had been equal to the Justice of Our Cause, and the Extent and Vigour of the Measures formed for that Purpose.

I have the firmest Confidence, that the Spirit and Bravery of this Nation, so renowned in all Times, and which have formerly surmounted so many Difficulties, are not to be abated by some Disappointments. These, I trust, by the Blessing of God, and your Zeal and Ardour for My Honour, and the Welfare of your Country, may be retrieved. It is My fixt Resolution to apply My utmost Efforts for the Security of My Kingdoms, and for the Recovery and Protection of the Possessions, and Rights of My Crown and Subjects in America, and elsewhere; as well by the strongest Exertion of Our Naval Force, as by all other Methods. Another great Object, which I have at Heart, is the Preservation of the Protestant Religion, and the Liberties of Europe; and, in that View, to adhere to, and encourage My Allies.

For this Cause, I shall decline no Inconveniences; and, in this Cause, I earnestly desire your hearty Concurrence, and vigorous Assistance. The late signal Success in Germany has given a happy Turn to Affairs, which it is incumbent upon Us to improve; and, in this critical Conjunction, the Eyes of all Europe are upon you. In particular, I must recommend it to you, that My good Brother and Ally the King of Prussia, may be supported in such a Manner, as His Magnanimity and active Zeal for the Common Cause deserve.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

It gives Me the utmost Concern, that the large Supplies, which you have already granted for carrying on the War, have not produced all the good Effects We had Reason to hope for. But I have so great a Reliance on your Wisdom, as not to doubt of your Perseverance. I only desire such Supplies as shall be necessary for the Publick Service; and, to that End, have ordered the proper Estimates to be laid before you. You may depend upon it, that the best and most faithful Oeconomy shall be used.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have had such ample Experience of the Loyalty and good Affections of My faithful Subjects towards Me, My Family, and Government, in all Circumstances, that I am confident they are not to be shaken. But I cannot avoid taking Notice of that Spirit of Disorder, which has shewn itself amongst the common People, in some Parts of the Kingdom. Let Me recommend it to you, to do your Part in discouraging and suppressing such Abuses, and for maintaining the Laws, and lawful Authority. If any Thing shall be found wanting, to explain, or enforce what may have been misunderstood, or misrepresented, I am persuaded it will not escape your Attention.

Nothing can be so conducive to the Defence of all that is dear to Us, as well as for reducing Our Enemies to Reason, as Union and Harmony amongst Ourselves.

Extract of a Letter from Capt. Elliot, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Hussar, of 28 Guns, to Mr. Cleveland, dated in Plymouth Sound the 28th of November, 1757.

Upon the 19th I joined Company with His Majesty's Ship Unicorn of 28 Guns, and on the

21st



21ft we chased two French Ships of War. About Ten at Night, being the Headmost Ship, I passed the Sternmost of the Enemy, (which the Unicorn has taken) but I lost Sight of the Ship I followed about Midnight.

Upon the 23d, in Company with His Majesty's Ship the Dolphin of 24 Guns, we chased a large French Ship, which I got along-side of about Eight o'Clock at Night: We had not exchanged above two or three Broadfides when the Dolphin came up. About Ten, or a little after, the Enemy lost all his Masts, and sunk with his Colours flying. I judged her to be a Two-Deck Ship, with one Tier of Guns mounted. I could not possibly get a Boat out to save one of his Men, my Lifts, Braces, and Tackles, being all shot away. The Dolphin sent her Boat, but could find nobody. Having 21 Men killed and wounded, our Mast and standing Rigging a good deal damaged, with the Loss of the Mizzen Top-mast, and Part of the Top, I judged it proper to return to Port.

Extract of a Letter from Capt. Moore, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Unicorn, to Mr. Cleveland, dated at Falmouth the 22d of November, 1757.

In the Latitude of 45°, 23', on the 22d of this Month, I chased a French Frigate, came up with her, engaged her five Hours, and, after dismasting her, took her. She sail'd the second of this Month with the French Fleet from Louisbourg, in Number 22 Ships. She is as fine a Frigate as in the French Service, mounts Twenty-six Thirteen-Pounders, and Two Nine-Pounders.

Whitehall Treasury Chambers, Dec. 1, 1757.

WHEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Admiralty Office, November 18, 1757.

My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having been credibly informed that divers evil-minded Persons have of late (under Colour of Commissions granted by their Lordships, during this present War, to the Commanders of Privateers) frequently committed Acts of Piracy and other Outrages, by unlawfully plundering and forcibly taking away Goods, Effects, Stores and Ammunition, as well on board of Neutral Ships, as on board of other Ships belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, in Violation of the Laws of Nations, and of the particular Laws of this Kingdom; Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring such Offenders to Justice, are pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, without any Deduction, unto or amongst such Person or Persons, as shall discover any other Person or Persons belonging to any British Privateer, or other British Vessel, who, during this present War with France, hath or have committed, or shall commit, any such Act or Acts of Piracy or Robbery as aforesaid, either on board any Neutral Ship or Ships, or any other Ship or Ships belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; which Reward, with Respect to the Conviction of such Offender of Offenders of any Act or Act of Piracy or Robbery, committed on board any one such Neutral or other Ship as aforesaid, shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after such respective Conviction.

And as a further Encouragement for the apprehending and prosecuting of the said Offender or Offenders, their Lordships do also hereby promise, that every Person who shall be intitled to the Whole, or any Part of such Reward of One Hundred Pounds as aforesaid, shall also, upon Request, have a Protection from being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, for the Space of one Year from the Date of such Protection.
