Westminster, December 23.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Quarme, Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty, certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder and Perry, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Eight.

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty, by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Eight, and for enforcing the Payment of the Rates to be assessed, upon Somerset House in the Strand.

An Act for allowing the Importation of such fine Italian Organzine Silk into this Kingdom, from any Part or Place whatsoever, as shall have been shipped, on or before the Day therein mentioned.

Rome, Nov. 26. The Pope has come to a Resolution to abolish the Farm of the Tobacco at the End of the present Year.

Florence, Dec. 3. On the 28th past His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Guernsey anchored at Leghorn from a Cruize.

Hamburg, Dec. 16. By repeated Accounts from Silesia, the Advantage gained there by his Prussian Majesty over the Austrians proves still more considerable than was at first imagined. General Zieten, with the greatest Part of the Prussian Cavalry, pursued the Austrians the two following Days, and it is assured, that the Number of Prisoners made in the Action, and those two Days, amount to above 17000.

By Letters received To-Day, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick's Head Quarters were at Altenhagen near Zell. The French have set Fire to the Suburbs of Zell. It was doubtful whether they intended to defend or evacuate the Town. The French Army is posted behind Zell. The Castle of Harbourg has not yet surrendered.

Hague, Dec. 20. By all Accounts, the Victory gained on the 5th Instant by the Prussians, is the most compleat that has been ever gained. A full Detail of the Battle, and of its Consequences, are expected every Day.

His Prussian Majesty is said to have summoned the Town of Breslau the 7th Instant, in which the Austrians have left General Sprecher with about Twelve Thousand Men; who answered, That he was ready to give up the Town, if the King would let him march out freely with his

Garrison: But that the King of Prussia replied, That as the Governor knew the Terms granted at Schweidnitz by General Nadaft, he might draw up a Capitulation in the same Form, and send it to him, and he would agree to it. The Event of this Negociation is not yet come to our Knowledge.

We have no Particulars from the Army under Prince Ferdinand of Brunwick, except that his Highness arrived at Altenhagen near Zell on the 13th Instant: That the French had burnt the Bridge over the Aller, set Fire to the Suburbs, and had abandoned the Town the 14th or 15th, and retired towards Hanover. Prince Ferdinand having represented to Marshal Richelieu the Consequences of such a Proceeding, the Marshal alledged that it was done by mere Accident.

The Castle of Harbourg it was expected would be surrendered on the 16th Instant, as the Commandant despaired of being relieved.

Whereas on Tuesday the 8th Instant, in the Night, John Miles and William Dodd, Officers of the Customs, belonging to the Port of Arundell in Sussex, with four Dragoons, fell in with a large Gang of Smugglers, to the Number of Fifty or upwards, who were loading a great Number of Horses with Tea, and upon the Officers attempting to seize the same, a Signal was given by the Smugglers to a Cutter lying near the Shore; belonging to Selsey near Chichester, commanded by one Thomas Green, as represented by the Account transmitted to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, from which Cutter the said Tea was brought and landed, as there is great Reason to believe; And whereas thereupon a great Quantity of Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons were brought from the Cutter to the Smugglers on the Shore, with which they (the Smugglers) fired upon the Officers and Dragoons, and shot one Thomas Cole, a Dragoon of the Iniskilling Regiment, commanded by the Honourable Lieutenant General Cholmondeley, who is since dead, and also dangerously wounded another Dragoon, and violently beat and abused one of the Officers of the Customs, and rescued from the Officers much the greatest Part of the said Tea. The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, and the more effectually to put a Stop to such illegal, violent, and outrageous Proceedings, do hereby promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend the said Offenders, or any or either of them, so that they may be dealt with according to Law, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs, on Conviction of each of the said Offenders.

And any of the Persons who were concerned in the Rescue of the Goods aforesaid, who shall, within three Months after such Offence, discover two or more of their Accomplices, so as they be convicted thereof, will be intitled to a Reward of Fifty Pounds; and every such Person so discovering, will be clearly acquitted and discharged of his Offence aforesaid, by the Act of the 9th of His present Majesty.
