HEREAS the Time limited by His wiajetty's Order in Council, of the Twentieth of September last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who fhould voluntarily enter themfelves in H. Majefty's Royal Navy ; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons discovering Seamen who should conceal them leives, will expire upon the Fifteenth Day of this Initant November : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for fome Time longer ; His Majefty doub therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not ar we the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Land man, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Fourteenth Day of January next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Preclamation of the Fourth Day of January last : And likewife, That the Rewards of Tvo Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who shall, on or before the faid Fourtcenth Day of January next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Custom House, London, November 18, 1757 Whereas on Tuesday the 8th Instant, in the Night, John Miles and William Dodd, Officers of the Cuftoms, belonging to the Port of Arundell in Suffex, with four Drayoons, fell in with a large Gang of Smuglers, to the Number of Fifty or upwards, who were loading a great Number of Horses with Tea, and upon the Officers attempting to feize the fame, a Signal was given by the Smuglers to a Cutter lying near the Shore, belonging to Selfey near Chichefter, commanded by one Thomas Green, as represented by the Account transmitted to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, from which Cutter the faid Tea was brought and landed, as there is great Reason to believe; And whereas thereupon a great Quantity of Fire Arms and other offensive Wea-pond where brought from the Cutter to the Smuglers on the Shore, with which they (the Smuglers) fired upon the Officers and Dragoons, and foot one Ibomas Cole, a Dragoon of the Inifkilling Regiment, commanded by the Honourable Lieutenant General Chelmondley, who is

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fice dead, and also dangeroufly wounded another Dra-gron, and wielently beat and abused one of the Officers of the Cuftons, and refaued from the Officers much the great ft Part of the faid Tea. The Commifficienes of this Majefiy's Cuftons, in order to bring the Officienes to Justice, and the more effectually to put a Stop to fuch illegal, wielent, and outragious Proceedings, do bereby promife a Reward of One Humdred Pounds to any Perf.n or Perjons who shall apprehend the said Offenders, or any or either of them, fo that they may be dealt with according to Law, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majefly's Cuftoms, on Conviction of each of the

And as a further Encouragement for the apprehending and profecuting of the faid Cffender or Offenders, their Lordships do also hereby promise, that every Person who shall be intitled to the Whole, or any Part of fuch Reward of One Hundred Pounds as aforefaid, shall also, upon Request, have a Protection from being impressed into His Majelty's Sea Service, for the Space of one Year from the Date of such Protection.
