Leghorn, December 12.

THE 8th Instant arrived here two Dutch Ships of War from Algiers, under the Command of Rear Admiral Sels, who went there with M. Paravicini, the Consul from their High Mightinesses, whom the Dey would not receive, insisting, that M. Levett, formerly Consul from the States at Tunis, and who was brought Prisoner to Algiers after the Taking of the said Place, should remain as Consul at Algiers, in Consideration of his having negotiated the Renewing of the Peace with the States General. They write from Malta, that on the 29th of October, about Three o'Clock in the Morning, they had a most terrible Hurricane, which did considerable Damage to the Shipping in the Harbour as well as to the City; a Dutch Man of War was droye on Shore, and the Seven French Ships of War there received some Damage; the Swallow French Xebeck lost her Mizzen Mast. In the City several public Buildings were greatly damaged by the Hurricane, which drove like a Torrent, and overfet every Thing in its Course. On the 5th of November they had a second Hurricane, which differed from the first, as it was accompanied with a prodigious Shower of Rain. It is said the French Squadron, which was still there, suffered much in this last, and that one or two of their large Ships are entirely disabled, and the others not in a Condition to go to Sea, at least for some Time.

Turin, Dec. 21. On Saturday last, the 17th, a little after Two o'Clock in the Morning, the Dutcheffs of Savoy was safely delivered of a Daughter. Her Royal Highness and the young Princess both continue perfectly well.

Head Quarters of Ultsen, Dec. 26.

On the 20th Instant, Major General Count Kilmanseck, who commanded in the Suburbs, reported, that the Enemy made Appearances of repairing the Bridge.

On the 21st, the advanced Posts not having seen any Lights of the Enemy's after Midnight, and having heard several Waggons, imagined that they were marched, but it proved otherwise.

On the 22d, there was a little firing from some small Parties that had crossed the River below the Town, which were immediately forced back; and, in the Night, the Enemy's Parties, (having been surprized by the Hunters) fired upon each other.

On the 23d, Colonel Kilmanseck reported that the Enemy had repaired the Bridge in the Night, and that some of their Cavalry had marched to their Right: Intelligence being also received, that the Duke of Broglio had passed the Aller to our Right, with a large Corps, Lieutenant General Spoercke, with Major Generals Sieplin and Gilfe, was detached the same Night to that Side with five Battalions and five Squadrons.

On the 24th, at Eleven in the Morning, Major General Prince of Brunswick was detached, with four Battalions and four Squadrons, to march to Hermanberg, where both Corps were to join: The Intelligence was, that the Duke of Broglio's Corps was at Fallingboffel; and that the Enemy had also passed the River on our Left at Muden and Gifhorn. As the Severity of the Weather made it next to impossible to continue in Camp, it had been intended to put the Army into Cantoonment, nearer to our Magazines here; which was accordingly executed on this Occasion; and, the rather, as this Motion defeated at the same Time any View the Enemy might have upon this Place. The Enemy did not appear any where during our March; and on the 25th the Army arrived at the Places allotted them.

About 400 of the Enemy appeared Yesterday, but did not attempt any Thing farther than taking three or four Peasants Waggons. They were seen from this Town, and a Detachment was sent out after them, upon which they retired.

Admiralty Office, January 10.

Extract of a Letter from the Honourable Captain Byron, of His Majesty's Ship the America, to Mr. Cleveland, dated in Plymouth Sound, the 7th Instant.

The 9th of December, in the Latitude of 48. the Lizard bearing N. 71. E. 140 Leagues,

we



we retook the John Galley belonging to Boston, laden with Tar and Oyl, put some Hands on board her, and ordered her for Plymouth. The 14th the Coventry joined us. On the 18th, in the Latitude 48. 40. Lizard N. 82. E. 203 Leagues, we took a French Ship from Gaspi Bay, called the Neptune, laden with Fish, put some Men into her, and ordered her also to Plymouth. On the 19th, in the Latitude of 49. 20. the Lizard N. 86. E. 214 Leagues, we came up with a French Snow, who, in firing her Stern Chafe at the Brilliant, which was very near her, by some Accident took fire in her Powder Room, and blew up all the After Part of her. She burnt with great Violence for Half an Hour, and then sunk. Out of 70 Hands no more than 24 could be saved, and those so miserably burnt, that many of them are since dead. She was a very fine Vessel, of upwards of 200 Tons, called the Diamond, mounted 14 Carriage Guns, came from Quebeck, and was of very great Value, as her Cargo consisted of the finest Furs. On the 24th, in the Morning, in the Latitude of 48° 51', the Lizard 84 E. 204 Leagues, we chased a French Privateer, and towards the Evening, falling very little Wind, the Coventry came up with her, and engaged her an Hour and Half, when she struck. She was called the Dragon, belonged to Bayonne, is quite a new Ship, and was but just come upon her first Cruize. She has 24 Nine Pounders, and many Swivels, and had 284 Men. She had 4 killed, and 10 or 12 wounded. The Coventry had only 6 wounded, one of which is since dead. On the 25th, as we were employed in removing the Prisoners, we saw a Sail, and made the Brilliant's Signal to chase, who soon came up with her. She was a Snow Privateer of 14 Guns from Bayonne, called the Intrpid. She fired into the Brilliant, and wounded one Man, upon which the Brilliant returned the Fire, and sunk her. She had 130 Men, eight or ten of which were killed, the rest were saved by the Brilliant's Boats.

Whitehall Treasury Chambers, Dec. 1, 1757.

WHEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting

for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Custom House, London, November 18, 1757.

Whereas on Tuesday the 8th Instant, in the Night, John Miles and William Dodd, Officers of the Customs, belonging to the Port of Arundell in Sussex, with four Dragoons, fell in with a large Gang of Smuglers, to the Number of Fifty or upwards, who were loading a great Number of Horses with Tea, and upon the Officers attempting to seize the same, a Signal was given by the Smuglers to a Cutter lying near the Shore, belonging to Selsey near Chichester, commanded by one Thomas Green, as represented by the Account transmitted to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, from which Cutter the said Tea was brought and landed, as there is great Reason to believe; And whereas thereupon a great Quantity of Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons were brought from the Cutter to the Smuglers on the Shore, with which they (the Smuglers) fired upon the Officers and Dragoons, and shot one Thomas Cole, a Dragoon of the Wiltshire Regiment, commanded by the Honourable Lieutenant General Cholmondley, who is since dead, and also dangerously wounded another Dragoon, and violently beat and abused one of the Officers of the Customs, and rescued from the Officers much the greatest Part of the said Tea. The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, and the more effectually to put a Stop to such illegal, violent, and outrageous Proceedings, do hereby promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend the said Offenders, or any or either of them, so that they may be dealt with according to Law, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs, on Conviction of each of the said Offenders.

And any of the Persons who were concerned in the Rescue of the Goods aforesaid, who shall, within three Months after such Offence, discover two or more of their Accomplices, so as they be convicted thereof, will be intitled to a Reward of Fifty Pounds; and every such Person so discovering, will be clearly acquitted and discharged of his Offence aforesaid, by the Act of the 9th of His present Majesty.

Admiralty Office, November 18, 1757.

My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having been credibly informed that divers evil-minded Persons have of late (under Colour of Commissions granted by their Lordships, during this present War, to the Commanders of Privateers) frequently committed Act of Piracy and other Outrages, by unlawfully pluns dering and forcibly taking away Goods, Effects, Stores and Ammunition, as well on board of Neutral Ships, as on board of other Ships belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, in Violation of the Laws of Nations, and of the particular Laws of this Kingdom; Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring such Offenders to Justice, are pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, without any Deduction, unto or amongst such Person or Persons, as shall discover any other Person or Persons belonging to any British Privateer, or other British Vessel, who, during this present War with France, hath or have committed, or shall commit, any such Act or Acts of Piracy or Robbery as aforesaid, either on board any Neutral Ship or Ships, or any other Ship or Ships belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; which Reward, with Respect to the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders of any Act or Act of Piracy or Robbery, committed on board any one such Neutral or other Ship as aforesaid, shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after such respective Conviction.

And as a further Encouragement for the apprehending and prosecuting of the said Offender or Offenders, their Lordships do also hereby promise, that every Person who shall be intitled to the Whole, or any Part of such Reward of One Hundred Pounds as aforesaid, shall also, upon Request, have a Protection from being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, for the Space of one Year from the Date of such Protection.

And for the more speedy and effectual discovering and bringing such Offenders as aforesaid to Justice, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the Offenders, concerned in any of the Offences abovementioned, or their Accomplices, who shall first discover, and give Information against any other two or more of the said Offenders, so as they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
