AT the Court at St. James's, the 13th Day of January 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of November last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Fourteenth Day of this Instant January: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twenty-eighth Day of February next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Dresden, Jan. 1. The Commandant of this Place received Yesterday Letters of the 27th past, from Silesia, by a Hunter from his Prussian Majesty, in which it is said, that the Condition of Schweidnitz was such, that it would not be able to hold out long. We have also positive News, that the Prussian General Werner, with a Corps of Cavalry, has taken Possession of Jagerndorff, Troppau, and Tescchen, in Upper Silesia.

Head Quarters at Ultzen, Jan. 7. On the 29th past an Account was brought to Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, that Major Luckner, of our Hussars, having been informed that a Detachment of the French were at Marenholtz in the Bailiage of Giffhorn, had marched thither

to attack them; that on his Arrival he found 100 French Hussars, and 50 dismounted Dragoons, whom he dislodged, having taken Prisoner Lieutenant Colonel Grandmaison, of the King's Regiment of Dragoons, and Commander of this Detachment, as also a Captain of the same Regiment, a Captain of Hussars, three Subaltern Officers, one of whom was wounded, and 60 Hussars; besides those left killed on the Spot.

On the 2d Instant an Account was received from Lieutenant General Oberg, who is with a Detachment at Soltau, that having the Day before been informed of a Detachment, consisting of some Hundreds of the French, being at Visselhövede, he had detached Colonel Drees with 400 Foot, 100 Horse, 10 Chasseurs, and some Hussars; that the said Colonel had surprised and attacked the Detachment of Enemies, consisting of French and Palatines; had taken Prisoners, a Captain, a Lieutenant, and an Ensign of the Palatine Regiment of Preissing, two Lieutenants of the Regiment of Royal Grenadiers, and 114 common Men, with eleven Horses, three Drums, and a great Number of Swords and other Arms: That the rest, except about 30 killed and wounded, had saved themselves by Flight; Lieutenant Grote, of the Regiment of Knefebeck, having been killed on our Side, and a Serjeant and two Grenadiers wounded.

Extract of a Letter from Wildeshausen, on this Side Bremen, January 15.

We have been greatly alarmed here since last Post, by an Account of a smart Action that happened between the Burg-Fort and Rotenburg, in which a great many are said to have been killed on both Sides; but we have not yet learned the Particulars.

Just now, at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, we learn by the Post from Bremen, that the Hanoverians have got Possession of the Burg-Fort, they having already appeared between that Post and Bremen; and that the Duke of Broglie has reinforced himself with 3000 Men in order to dislodge them. The Postilion coming from Bremen heard great Firing on the Road.

Hague, Jan. 10. By the Hamburgh Mail, which arrived very late this Evening, we are informed that Schweidnitz had offered to surrender upon the same Terms as Lignitz; but that the King of Prussia insisted upon the Garrison's being Prisoners of War. Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick was still at Ultzen: His Parties continue to have good Success against the French.

Hague, Jan. 17. The Hamburgh Mail has brought several Letters from Bremen, with the Account of an Action near that Place on the 11th Instant, to the Advantage of the King's Troops, who had repaired the Bridge over the Wumme, and crossed that River on the 14th Instant. The Prussians are Masters of all Pomerania except Stralsund, and a Ship going there with Stores was lost.

Part of the Cargo is landed and secured at Worthing in the Parish of Broadwater, and the Ship, with the Rest of her Cargo, is got off, and now safe in the Harbour of New Shoreham.

Whitehall Treasury Chambers, Dec. 1, 1757.

WHEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that the House of Thomas Mould, Farmer, at Maryland Point in the Parish of Westham, in the County of Essex, was, on Saturday last, the 5th Instant, at Night, forcibly entered by five or more Men, armed, who attempted to murder the said Thomas Mould and his Family, but meeting with such Resistance from him, and one of his Servants, as defeated that Design, wounded both of them in a desperate Manner; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons guilty of the said wicked Crimes, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover the rest of his Accomplices in the said Facts, so that they, or any two of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, the said Thomas Mould does hereby promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to the Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid by him upon the Conviction of any two or more of the Offenders.

And the Church Wardens of the Parish of Westham do likewise hereby promise a still farther Reward of Thirty Pounds, to the Person making the aforesaid Discovery, to be also paid by them upon the Conviction of any two or more of the Offenders abovementioned.

Custom House, London, November 18, 1757.

Whereas on Tuesday the 8th Instant, in the Night, John Miles and William Dodd, Officers of the Customs, belonging to the Port of Arundell in Sussex, with four Dragoons, fell in with a large Gang of Smuglers, to the Number of Fifty or upwards, who were loading a great Number of Horses with Tea, and upon the Officers attempting to seize the same, a Signal was given by the Smuglers to a Cutter lying near the Shore, belonging to Selsey near Chichester, commanded by one Thomas Green, as represented by the Account transmitted to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, from which Cutter the said Tea was brought and landed, as there is great Reason to believe; And whereas thereupon a great Quantity of Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons were brought from the Cutter to the Smuglers on the Shore, with which they (the Smuglers) fired upon the Officers and Dragoons, and shot one Thomas Cole, a Dragoon of the Lifekilling Regiment, commanded by the Honourable Lieutenant General Cholmondeley, who is since dead, and also dangerously wounded another Dragoon, and violently beat and abused one of the Officers of the Customs, and rescued from the Officers much the greatest Part of the said Tea. The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, and the more effectually to put a Stop to such illegal, violent, and outrageous Proceedings, do hereby promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend the said Offenders, or any or either of them, so that they may be dealt with according to Law, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs, on Conviction of each of the said Offenders.

And any of the Persons who were concerned in the Rescue of the Goods aforesaid, who shall, within three Months after such Offence, discover two or more of their Accomplices, so as they be convicted thereof, will be intitled to a Reward of Fifty Pounds; and every such Person so discovering, will be clearly acquitted and discharged of his Offence aforesaid, by the Act of the 9th of His present Majesty.
