Naples, Marh 50 Rom Sicily they write, that the Mcfinefes are greatly encouraged fince the arrival of the fuc-

cors, brought them by the Duke de Vivonne; and the rather, for that they observe, the Spaniards are daily forced to leave the Posts they possessed near the City, as now lately they have quitted the Posts they had at St. Placido, and at the Scaletta, on presence, that they kept their Forces too much divided. The Marquis d'Afforgas, our Viceroy, though he is much concerned to see things succeed so ill, yet omiss nothing on his part, which may contribute to the reducing that City to its former Obedience, and the

ridding the Crown of Spain of an affair, which gives it to much pain and trouble.

Vienna, March 17. The four Millions of Livres, demanded by the Count de Montecuculia for the defraying the charges of this next Campagne, will be now suddainly put into his hands, and in that view he has resolved to part hence the 28 instant towards the Army. The Count of Hofkirken, who was fent by the Emperor to take an account of the posture of the Imperial Troops, Commanded the last Summer, by the Duke of Bournonville, and to inform himself of the behaviour of the several Officers, during the late actions in Alsatia, has returned his Imperial Majetty an ample relation, by which, several miscarriages, and the faults of nora few are laid open; Whereupon the Commissary-General parted hence on Friday laft, by the Empefors Order, to make Process against all those that are found guilty, in order to their punishment, before the Army draws into the Field again. The Count of Watdech purposes to part hence in 3 or 4 days, on his return for Holland. We are told, that there will be a most exact Discipline observed in the Imperial Army this next Campagne, and that the Count de Montecuculi has taken it upon him, to be answerable for all the diforders and violences that shall be committed by his Soldiers for want thereof.

Strasburg, March 22. On Tuefday last arrived here the Marquis of Baden Dourlach, General of the Artil-Tery of the Imperial Army, though he was very much indisposed of an Apoplexy. The French continue to ex-ger vast Contributions of all the Villages in the Marqui-Eut of Baden, and upon failure of payment thereof, they pillage and burn them. It is faid that they are demolishing the Castle of Dachstein, and that to that end, they have undermined the Walls thereof, in order to the blowing them up. From Vienns they write, that the Count de Montecueule, will certainly begin his journey from thence, the 28 of this month, for that by that time, the Moneys which have onely retarded it, will by ready; it is generally expected, that his Excellency will take better care then has been hitherto, to keep the Soldiers wishin an exact Order and Discipline, and to prevent the like disor-

ders, that were committed the last Summer.

Coblems, March 24. The seizing of Germsbeim by the Elector Palatine, some days since, hath afforded great matter of distatisfaction to the Elector of Mayence, to whom that place belongs; on the other fide, we are told, that the Elector Palarine artwers, he was

forced to it, for the preventing that places falling into the hands of the French, as some others have, which likewise belong to his Electoral Highness of Mayence, so that it is seared this matter may create some difference between them.

Cologne, March 29. The Imperial Troops that are lodged in this Diocess, and in the Countrey of Juliers begin to move nearer to the Meufe, on what defigne we know not, unless it be to convoy the Cardinal of Baden, who is coming hither from Liege. The Imperialists have removed the Magazine they had at Mayence to Bonne; and they speak likewise of erecting one here. Our Letters from Strasburg bring us not any thing of news, but continue to tell us of the French preparations in Lorrain and Alfatia, of which they fear, the y shall ere long see the effect. On Tuesday last the Heer Fischer, the Emperors Ambassador parted again from thence for Munster, whither he is gone to hasten the Levies that Bishop is making for the service of the Emperor; and some hours after his departure, arrived here two Deputies from the Bishop, who missing the said Ambassador, are gone to Bonne, to conferr with the Imperial Generals there, upon the Matters they came about.

Liege, March 29. Things are at present here in much

disorder and consusion, occasioned by the French being lett into the Cittadel by the Governor of it. Yeherday about two in the morning 2500 French Foots convoyed by several Squadrons of Horse, approached the Suburb of this City, called St. Walburg, and pre-fently after were received into the Castle, which was no fooner known there, but all was in an allarm, the Inhabitants run to Arms, and marched up and down the streets in Troops, who meeting on the Market place a French Major and his Man, discharged their Mus-kets and killed them. Yesterday and this day the Shops and Houses, as well as the Gates, have been kept shut, except this afternoon, when the Gates were opened, to receive into the City 1200 Peafants, of the Countrey of Franchimont, all compleatly armed. This morning early was held a Chapter, where feveral persons were deputed, to go and defire the French to retire again out of the Castle, which if they do not, it is thought the Imperialists will come and help us to remove them. But after all, it is faid, that though the ordinary People are so violent, yet, that most of the Magistrates are not much troubled at what has hap-

Brussels, March 29. This morning his Excellency received advice by an Express from the Count de Chavigniach, who commands the Imperial Troops, quartered in the Countrey of Liege, that yesterday the French possessed themselves of the Castle of Liege, having been lest in by the Inhabitants, to the number of 3000; his Excellency is much concerned at it, as being a thing of great importance, and which will make easy the further defignes the French may have in those quarters. In the mean time we prepare here in good earnest for the Campagne; his Excellency has Commanded the feveral Officers to make all the diligence possible in the raising their recruits, and care is taken to pur things every where in the best posture, the pre-
