

# The London Gazette.

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*Falmouth, March 25.*

**H**ere is put in the Recovery of Foy in Cornwall, which about a month since, being bound from Plymouth to Topsham, was by bad weather forced upon the coast of France, where an Offend Caper, of four Guns, came up with her, and sending his Men on board, they took out of her two Hogheads of Sugar, two halfe Hogheads of Spirits, broke open the Seamens Chests, and carried away their Cloaths, and whatever else they found there, misusing and bearing besides, the Master and Seamen so forely, that one of them dyed thereof, three days after.

*Barnstable, March 26.* Tuesday night last was cast away near *Isford-Comb*, the Arms of Bristol, of 350 Tuns, Captain Templeman Commander, bound for the Barbados; 16 Passengers and Seamen were drowned, the rest, which were 40, saved themselves.

*Lime, March 27.* The 25 arrived here the *Samuel* of this place from the *Texel*, the Master informs us, that some days after he came out, he met with three Privateers of 10 Guns each, bearing Offend Colours, who sent their Boats on board him, broke open his Hold, took out several Goods, and plundered him and his Seamen, of all they had, notwithstanding he showed them his Sea Brief.

*Weymouth, March 27.* Here is come in a Vessel from *St. Malo's* in France; the Master reports, that at his coming from thence about a fortnight since, there were above 90 Sail ready to put to Sea, designed to go and Fish at *Canada*. The Master adds, that a Tax of 60 Sols per Tun, had been lately laid upon all French Ships outward bound.

*Naples, March 12.* Every day brings us some account or other of the success of the French at *Messina*, so that, without some timely remedy, it may, as is feared, have an influence upon the whole Kingdom. We have advice, that the Viceroy thereof, had caused the Governor of the *Tour du Fare*, to be beheaded, for having quitted that Post without Orders, upon the first arrival of the Duke de *Vivonne*. The Marquis de *Bayonne*, late Viceroy of *Sicily*, and Don *Melchior della Queva*, who Commanded the Fleet, are prisoners here till farther Orders come from the Court at *Madrid*.

*Warsaw, March 15.* There are still hopes of bringing the accommodation with *Dorofensko* to the desired issue, his demands are. 1. That the Cossacks shall continue in the free exercise of the Greek Religion, without any disturbance whatsoever. 2. That a Bishop, or Archbishop of their Church, shall have Session in the Senate. 3. That a part of the *Ukrain* shall be set apart for the use of their Army. 4. That the King at his Coronation shall confirm all their privileges, and these Articles by Oath. 5. That the Republick shall declare whether they have need of the service of the Cossacks, and on what conditions they desire it. 6. That the Deputies which the Cossacks shall send to the Dyet, shall be received and Treated with the same respect, as the Deputies of the Dukedom of *Lithuania*, or of the

Kingdom of *Poland*. 7. That they shall continue their Commerce with their neighbors as heretofore. 8. That they may erect Printing Houses, &c.

*Marseilles, March 29.* Here are 24 Gallies in great forwardness, being designed for *Messina*, together with 15 or 20 Men of War that are fitting out at *Thoulon*, with them will go 40 other Vessels and Barks, laden with Soldiers and Provisions.

*Vienne, March 20.* The Count of *Waldeck* is still here, but will part in 2 or 3 days at furthest, on his return for *Holland*, he intending to take his way through *Bohemia*. The Troops that were raised here by the Spanish Ambassador, for the service of that Crown, to be employed against the *Messineses*, not being permitted by the Venetians to pass through their Territories, are commanded to march through *Tyrol* for *Milan*, in order to their embarkation at *Final*, which will loose much time. The 4 of the next month, the Count *de Montecensuli* will part hence to the Elector of *Bavaria's* Court, and from thence pass on towards *Cologne*, where, it is said, a Conference will be held by the Ministers, at least of the several Allies.

*Strasbourg, March 28.* On Tuesday last the French blew up the Fort or Castle of *Dachstein*, and seem intended to do the like with *Moesheim* and *Muzigh*. The Imperial Troops that are quartered in *suabia*, are commanded to march towards the *Rhine*, as some of the Troops of the Circles likewise are; and on the other side, the Marquis de *Vanbrun* assembles a body of an Army at *Brisack*, so that the time for action comes on apace. The Duke of *Lorraine* and the Marquis of *Baden* are still here, endeavouring all they can to keep this City in the interests of the Emperor and the Allies; though it seems the arguments of the French Envoye here have been more powerful with our Magistrates; for we are assured that they have embraced a Neutrality, and that 2000 Swisssers are to come hither for the guard of our Bridge, and the enabling us to maintain the Neutrality. They are to be Commanded by Colonel *Vecchia*, who formerly served in *Candia*.

*Hamburg, March 29.* The 23 instant, General *Wrangel* parted from *Stetin*, to the Head Quarter at *Stragard*; In the mean time the Swedish Troops move nearer and nearer to *Prussia* and *Silesia*, but hitherto commit not any hostility. It is said, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has commanded his Subjects not to pay any more Contributions to the Swedes.

*Cologne, March 29.* On Tuesday last the Marquis de *Grana* arrived here from *Cleves*, and the same day parted again for *Bon*. We are informed, that the Prince of *Orange*, upon the instances that have been made to him, has declared, that he will cause the Dutch Troops, Commanded by the *Sieur Fariaux*, to retire out of this Diocess, in case the Elector of *Cologne* will pay one third of the Moneys due to the States at present, and the rest when the Peace shall be concluded. From *Auris* of the 25 instant they write, that two thousand Imperialists were expected in the Countrey of *Brisgovia*, to hinder for the future, the incursions of the Garrison of *Brisack*; and that the Troops of the Circle of

Upper Saxony were on their march towards the Rhine, and were to be quartered in a Village called Kayt near Strásburg. The Marquis de Grana passed yesterday again by this place on his journey to the Hague.

*Ditto, April 2.* Several hundreds of Imperial Horse, who came out of Westphalia, passed here yesterday, and are marched towards the Meuse; the Imperial Garrison that was at Aix la Chapelle, drew out from thence five days since, and have likewise taken their way towards the Meuse; and 1100 Men are gone from these parts to supply their rooms at Aix, where they arrived on Friday last.

*Mayence, March 31.* Our Elector having desired an assistance of the Elector of Treves, for the security of this City, 350 of his Troops arrived here accordingly the 29 Instant. The Elector Palatine has caused Germjeim to be demolished, and hath sent certain Troops to possess themselves of the Castle of Newlingens, of which our Elector hath complained to the Dyac at Ratisbonne.

*Ghent, March 31.* On Thursday last, the French being 4000 strong, and having with them 7 small Field pieces, made another attempt to pass the Schelde, not far from this City, in order to their entering into the Country of Waes, and exacting Contributions of the Inhabitants thereof; but the Bores, assisted with 800 Spanish Soldiers, and four Field pieces, were so well upon their guard, that the French were forced to retire again, without effecting anything. It is reported, that upon the news of the French having possessed themselves of the Castle of Liege, our Troops have received Orders to march towards that Diocess; and that the Prince of Orange sends likewise several Forces that way.

*Brussels, April 2.* We are told, that the Baron de Vieset, late Governor of the Citadel of Liege, hath published certain reasons, which induced him to let in the French, and that one amongst others, is, That he did it to prevent the Imperialists, who used all possible endeavours to make themselves Masters of it: On the other side the Chapter and Magistrates have set forth a Manifesto, declaring their innocence and ignorance of what hath happened, till such time, that it was out of their power to hinder it, of which they desire all Princes and States their neighbors to take notice, and not to impute any fault to them. We are still more and more sensible of the great prejudice this accident will bring to the common Interests of the Allies. And our Governor-General is very apprehensive, that the Enemies next work will be to attack Nimur, and for that reason, the Marquis de Mortara's Regiment marched from hence this morning, on its way thither, to reinforce the Garrison there; in lieu of which, the Regiment of Vesasco, and other Forces, are coming hither from Dendermond, Ghent, and Bruges; the rest of our Troops are gone towards Leuw and those parts, for the security of our Frontiers on that side. The Imperialists in Liege march towards that City, as do likewise the Spaniards from Luxemburg, to see if they can remove the French out of the Citadel, and to oppose them, the Marschal de Crequi is coming with a Body of an Army from Charleville. We have advice that the French assemble their Forces likewise about Aeth.

*Hague, April 5.* In our last we told you of his Highness indisposition, which hath since turned to the Small Pox; they began to appear on Wednesday morning, after that his Highness had been let blood the day before, and are since come out very kindly; his Highness being as well as can be expected of one in his

condition, rested the last night very well, and his Feaver is much abated. Yesterday his Highness was visited by the Princess of Simmeren his Aunt, and some Forreign Ministers; as likewise by several other principal persons of quality; The States of Hólland are still assembled, they intended to have separated two days since, but his Highness sickness has been the cause of continuing their Assembly. We are certainly told, that the Equipage for the Sea this Summer, will only consist in 24 Men of War, besides Fireships and Gallies, not reckoning the Convoys which will be appointed to attend our Merchantmen. By our Letters from Liege we understand, that after all the heat, those Inhabitants seemed to be in, upon the first news they had of the French being possessed of the Citadel, the Matter had been wholly composed, and that the City had put it self under the protection of the French. However, that the Imperialists continue to march that way, and that the Marschal de Crequi is likewise on his march towards Liege with a body of an Army; so that our next Letters may perhaps speak of some action. The Elector and Electress of Brandenburg are expected here the beginning of the next week, about which time the Prince of Friesland, with the Princess Dowager his Mother (who is Aunt to his Highness the Prince of Orange) will its thought, likewise come hither. The Marquis de Grana is at present here.

*Ditto, April 6.* This is the third day since the Small Pox appeared on his Highness, they are come out very well, and with all the good simptoms that may be; Dr. Van Straeten, who was Physician to the late Prince his Highnesses Father, being sent for from Utrecht, arrived here yesterday. In the mean time, all people are much troubled at his Highness illness, as well out of their concern for his Highness person, as for the prejudice it may be to the publick, in a time, when the several Matters for the Campagne ought to be regulated, and hastened with all the diligence possible. It hath been finally resolved to pay to the Crown of Denmark, the Moneys stipulated by the Treaty; and the Danish Minister here, will in few days receive them.

*Paris, April 6.* We have advice of great disorders that have lately happened at Bourdeaux, on occasion of certain new Impositions on Pewter and Tobacco, which had gone so far, that several of the Kings Officers had been killed, and some of their Houses burnt by the People; but that the tumult had been at length appeased by the Governor, upon his promise, to procure them his Majesties pardon. The Dutches of Orleans has been very ill of a Feaver, not without some danger, but at present her Royal Highness is much better. It is certainly said, that the 20 or the 25 of this month, the King will part hence towards his Army; and that the Queen will remain at St. Germain.

*Whitehal, March 31.* This day His Majesty was Graciously pleased, in consideration of the good and faithful services of Thomas Povey, Esq; to cause him to be sworn one of the Masters of Request, in the room of Sir Thomas Beverly, deceased.
