**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Ninth of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twentieth Day of this Instant May;—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of June

next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Constantinople, April 17.* The Vizir, whose Abilities and prudent Administration have gained him the Esteem and Favour of the Grand Signor ever since his Accession, has lately been honoured very remarkably by that Prince, who has given him one of his own Sisters in Marriage, the Widow Lady of Kaiah Pascha, aged 50; the Vizir is 65. On the 13th Instant the Nuptials were celebrated at the Porte, without any particular Ceremonial. However, the next Day, the Sultan paid a Visit to his Sister with great Pomp, attended by his whole Court, and presented her with Jewels, suitable to the Occasion, out of the Serraglio. From this extraordinary Alliance it is natural to conclude, that this Prime Minister is firmly fixed in that high Office. Our Complaints for want of Corn, and of the Dearness of all Sorts of Provisions, still subsist. The Foreign Ministers are successively taking their Audiences of the Captain Pascha, who is preparing for his annual Voyage with five or six Men of War and as many Gallies.

*Rome, April 29.* On the 26th Instant, at Night, the Pope had a Relapse of his Disorder, accompanied with Convulsions, a Stoppage of Urine, and a Fever, for which he was immediately bled. On the 27th and 28th he continued in the same Situation; and on the 29th in the Evening, growing much worse, and his Physicians despairing of being able to relieve him, Dispositions were made to administer the Sacrament to him.

*Florence, May 6.* Yesterday in the Evening a Courier from Rome to Bologna passed through

this City, with Notice of the Pope's Decease on the 2d Instant in the Morning. A few Days ago anchored at Leghorn, in 21 Days from Gibraltar, His Britannick Majesty's Ship Preston, with a Convoy of four Merchantmen for that Port, Genoa, and Naples, having brought thither a rich French Prize. The Deal Castle, a Letter of Marque Ship, has also brought to Leghorn three French Tartans, laden with Hemp and other Goods, which she took on the Coast of Provence.

**W**HEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and War-rant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Charles Fearn, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the

*Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May Instant; This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of this Instant, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty;*
