PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Ninth of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Ablebodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twentieth Day of this Inflant May; - And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Snillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Oxford, in pursuance of His Majesty's Letter of Recommendation to the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London, the President, and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul. The 18th Instant His Majesty's Ship the Rochester, Captain Duff, arrived at Plymouth from a Cruize, and brought in with her a French Snow, called the Cerf Volant, loaden with Ordnance Stores and Flour, bound to Louisbourg, which Captain Duff took on the 11th, she having been separated from a Squadron of French Ships of War which failed on the 2d from Rochefort.

On the 23d, four French Ships were brought into Falmouth, having been taken fome Days before by a Squadron of His Majesty's Ships cruizing under the Command of the Honourable Captain Keppel. They were Part of 17 Ships which failed the 1st of this Month from Bourdeaux, laden with Provisions and Stores for

Canada, and faid to be under Convoy of a large Privateer of 54 Guns, and two Frigates. When these Prizes left Captain Keppel, the Officers on board them fay, that his Squadron was in Chace of other Ships, thought to be Men of War.
