WHEREAS Information hath been this Day given to His Majesty at this Board, that the English Privateers, cruizing in the Mediterranean, visit many Neutral Ships bound from the Levant, and Smyrna, where the Plague now rages; — And it being of the utmost Importance to prevent the Infection being brought into this Kingdom by any of the said Privateers, — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, and Command, that all Privateers, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, on Board the same, now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from the Mediterranean, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations required to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coast of Barbary. — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors, or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Ninth of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all

Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twentieth Day of this Instant May; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Rome, May 6. On the 4th Instant, in the Evening, the Pope's Corpse was removed, with great Ceremony, from the Quirinal to the Vatican, where, after laying in State for nine Days, it will be interred; and the Conclave, for the Election of a new Pope, is to be opened on the 15th Instant: For which Purpose, circular Invitations have been sent to the Cardinals Abroad to attend it.

Turin, May 10. The Cardinal Delle Lawze sat out for Rome the 8th Instant; but Cardinal Rovero, Archbishop of Turin, does not propose going till the Beginning of June.

Florence, May 13. On the 6th Instant anchored at Leghorne, the Enterprize Privateer, Capt. Lewis, with four Tartans, one of which was French, loaden with Corn, and three Neapolitans, loaden with Timber for the Docks at Toulon.

Florence, May 20. Last Week the Emperor made a Promotion of Military Officers, to fill up the vacant Posts in the four Companies that are added to the third Tuscan Regiment in Garrison here.

Copenhagen, May 23. His Danish Majesty is now in Town, and daily employed in reviewing his Troops. The Queen of Denmark, and her Mother the Dutchess of Brunswick, are expected to arrive here on Thursday next. On the 18th Instant was launched a new built Frigate of 30 Guns, called the Christiansborg. The same Day an Ordonnance was signed at Friedenbourg, prohibiting the Exportation of any Kind of Horses from Denmark till farther Order.

WHEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Sunday the 7th, about Seven in the Evening; on Sunday the 14th, about Seven in the Morning; on
