Algiers, March 5. Thice the departure of Sir John Narborough from hence in Fanuary last for Tunk and Tripoli, this Government has on all occasions expressed their great disposition for the continuance of peace and friendship with the English. The fifth in-flant, came ashore near Bugia, in a Ships Boat 41 perfons, belonging to the Andrew, William Symonds Commander, which some days before foundred at Sea, about 30 Leagues from the shore; 13 of those that Landed were Spaniards and Italians, which notwithstanding, this Government has sent orders to treat them with all kindness, and not to fuffer that any prejudice be done The first of this month, was brought up here three Hollanders and a Spaniard, of confiderable value. Here is arrived 52ddy Abra la Ben hag, formerly Governor of Sally, from whence he was forced to flie by the present King of Morocco, Muley Ismael, against whom he is come to desire assistance; and to render his sollicitation the more successful, has brought with him a con-Aderable Sum of money: in which he has not miffed his expectation, for this Government has refolved to affift him with a good Body of Men.

Naples, March 26. On Wednesday last arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from the Court at Madrid, by whom our Viceroy, the Marquels d'Aftergas, received the necessary Dispatches for the confirming him in this Government, and positive Orders to arrest the late Viceroy of Sicily, the Marquels de Bayonne, and the Generals at Sea, who through the difference and divisions amongst themselves, gave the Chevalier de Valbelle an opportunity to relieve the Meffineses; and fince, in the Re-engagement with the Duke de Vivonne, did not behave themselves as they ought; Don Melchior de la Cueva, Lieutenant General of the Fleet, hath accordingly been sent Prisoner to the Castle at Gayetta; the Marquels del Vife, General of the Gallies, to Barletta; Don Foseph Centeno, to Taranto; and the Marquels of Bayonne is a Prisoner in the Castle here. We have Letters; which very confidently affure us, that Don Fuan of Austria will arrive in these Parts about the middle of the next month, till when, no great matter will be at-

tempted against the Messineses.

Madrid, March 27. Letters from Cadiz, tell us, that fix Men of War are fitting out there, defigned for Sicily, to Reinforce the Armada, which, according to our last Advices, was put into Naples. The Ministers of this Court are very much concerned to see Assairs go so ill in those Parts, which has chiefly hapned through the fault of those who had the chief Command of the said The Count de Monterey, late Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, of whose arrival here, we have already told you, having given her Majesty an account of the posture he left those Countries in, is gone to meet his Lady, who comes by the way of St. Sobastian. The Prince Regent of Parrugal, we understand, has ifflied out Commissions for the raising of several new Troops, as is given out, for the fecurity of the peace and quietness of his Government, which this Court is however somewhat jealous of. Don Fuan of Austria will how very suddenly begin his journey for stally.

Warfam, March 29. We daily more and more discover, that Dordensko means only to deceive his Majesty, having hitherto kept him up with Treaty, and Accommodations, to gain time, till the Turks and Turiurs came to his assistance; and the former being now approached the Mkraine, in a Body of 20 or 25000 Men, it is feared he will join his Forces with them, and fall upon the King, whose Troops are at present in a very lamentable condition, so that we cannot well see how his Majesty will be able to disengage himself, if the Bremy press upon him, but by making a Peace, which, as things stand, cannot be expected should be very honourable for this Crown. The King, we understand, has again written a very earnest Letter to the Czar of Moscowy, to represent to him the ill posture he is in; and that without a speedy and considerable assistance, he shall be forced to quit the Ukrain, and softer it to fall again into the hands of the Common Enemy, and therefore desires he would give positive Orders for the Conjunction of his Forces with those of this Kingdom, for the preservation of their common laterests.

Vienna, April 7. The fifth instant, parted hence the Baggage of the Count de Montechculi, who has taken his leave of the Emperor, in order to his departure likewife, which, however, is deferred for some days. Yesterday arrived here Prince Pio from Italy, intending to make but a very short stay here, and then to proceed to the Army, which, it's said, will consist of 25000 Imperial Troops, besides the Troops of the Circles which are to join with them, and may compose 12000 Men. The Emperor has given orders for the fetting at liberty feveral Hungarians which were Prisoners on account of Religion, and, it is faid, as if the Emperor had refolved to leave them the free exercise thereof, and even to cause several Churches to be restored to them. there passes nothing but offices of friendship and civility between the Imperial Officers in Silefia, and the Suede's in Pomeren; and many People seem after all, to believe, that the Crown of sueden has not any intention of entring into a War with his Imperial Majesty. The Afribaffador to the Czar of Moscowy, is on his way thither, having with him very confiderable Presents for the Czar from the Emperor; it is faid, his Errand is to propose and conclude an Alliance with that Court against the Turks, in which it is probable the King of Poland will be likewise included, if he make not a Peace before with the Port, of which there seems some likelihood.

Strasburgh, April 14. The old Duke of Lerrain, and Prince Herman of Baden are fill here, and as yet we cannot precifely say, when they will leave this place. From Ratisbaine they write. That the Duke of Wartemberg having not only resused to grant any quarters within his Territories to the Confederates, but even with some opposed them; it had been resolved the sixth instant at the Dyet, That a Letter should be written to the said Dyke, and other the States and Princes of Suabia, seriously to exhort them, to accord the quarters assigned the said Confederates, according to the Constitutions of the Empire. The Troops of the several Circles, will hardly assume a Canada of their owns as was at first

intended; for that the several States are very backward to contribute towards the maintenance of the general Officers, &c. fo that they will be joined, as is thought, with the Imperial Army commanded by the Count de Monte cucult, which the Emperor hath long and earnestly defired, as most conducing to the Publick service. From Mayence they tell us that feveral Boats pass daily by that City down the Rhine, coming from the Upper Palatir nate, Bokemia, &c. with Soldiers. The Imperialists are, it's faid, very for ward in their preparations for the Campagne; and we are assured, that the fourth of the next month, Count Monte excult will be at the head of his Army.

Cologne, April 16. The Imperial Treops that were quartered in this Diocess, are all moved out of their quarters, and hitherto march to and fro, leaving us vincertain whither they are indeed designed: the general. discourse is, that they now draw only together, between this place and Bon, and that the 18 instant they that are on this side, will pass the Rhine, and march in a Body towards Francfort; if so, we know not how to underfland, that the Regiments of Count Gallas, and of the Doke of Holftein, which were quartered in the Neighborhood of that City, are coming down the Rhine to-The Imperialists fortifie Lickenich, and wards Ban. feem to apprehend some design upon Rhinterg. belonging to our Elector, in which there is not at present any The States of this Diccess have finally great Garison. concluded their Affembly, having only refolved, that Monsieur Fario should be desired to depute some person hither to Treat with those appointed by them, about the matter in controversie; but, it is said, that Monsieur Fario has no otders to Treat: and in case the monies de-

manded be not paid, to proceed to execution.

Bruffels, April 19. Some perfons arrived here from Challeron, inform us, That preparation was made there for the lodging of 10000 Hoise; and that the Prince of Conde was expected there the 25 or 26 of this month. The Imperialists, having left good Garisons in Huy and Dinant, are all marched towards the Rhine; the 2000 Imperial Troops that were fent to Luxemburgh, for the Reinforcement of the Garison there are likewise marched out again, to join with the rest of these Forces; and now all the discourse is, that the old Duke of Lirrain will be ere long with a flying Army in or about the Prc-vince of Luxemburgh. We expect every day to hear of the Enemies taking the Field with their Aimy, and therefore all endeavors possible are used here to put our selves into a posture of defence; in order to which, our Governor has, it's said, desired a farther essistance from the Prince of Orange, and that accordingly several Regiments are to arrive here from Holland. On the other hand, we are very well pleased to hear by our Advices from Germany, that the Imperial Recruits are in very great forwardness.

Hague, April 19. This morning his Highnel's being perfectly recovered, appeared abroad for the first time fince his illness, and was at his devotions in the Cloyster Church, though his Physicians would have ressuaded his Highness to have deserred it for a day or two longer. Their Electoral Highnesses of Brandenburgh will be certainly here about Wednesday or Thussday next, if the Elector be not taken ill again of the Gout; the Marquess de Grana continues here, in expectation of his Electoral Highnesses arrival, in order to assist at the Conference, to be held with him, on the part of the Emperor. The Commiffaries are parted from hence, to go and muster the several Troops, which done, they will march to the place affigned for their Rendezvous; and about the mid-

dle of the next month, his Highness will take the field with them. The Heer Van Beverning, the Heer Odyck, and the Heer Van Hairen, are appointed to affift at the Treaty at Nimeguen, on the part of this State, and they have orders accordingly to prepare themselves for it. It is written from Vienna, that the Count de Montecuculi parted from thence the fifth inflant, which, according to cur fiether advices frem thence, we find to be a mistake, that it was onely his Bacgage that began to march that day fre in Vienna.

Paris, April 26 Out Letters from Marfeilles of the ninth irflant, advife, I hat that morning 24 Gallies failed from thence with a fair wind, leirg defigned for Messian; and that in sew days they would be followed by eight or ten Men of War stom. Therefore, and several other Vessels laden with Promisens. visions. Madem's the Durchels of Griens, is now pretty well recovered of her indiffection, to the great joy of the whole Court. The disorders that had hapned at Foundanx are now Court.
