AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 28th Day of July 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Ninth of June last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of September next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of September next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Admiralty Office, August 1.

By Letters received of the 26th and 28th past from Capt. Wheeler, of His Majesty's Ship the *Ifis*, off *Emdden*, there is Advice of the Arrival, in the River *Embs*, of the First Embarcation of the Troops under his Convoy, consisting of the Troops under the Command of the Marquis of Granby: Also of the Arrival of those, which went under Convoy of the *Dolphin*, under the Command of Major General *Waldgrave*: And of the Invalids from *Shields*, under Convoy of the *Deptford*: And likewise of another Convoy being in Sight, which it was concluded were the Transports with the Troops under the Command of the Duke of *Marborough*.

Rome, July 8. On the 6th Instant Cardinal *Rezzonico*, a Venetian, and Bishop of *Padua*, was elected Pope. He immediately took the Name of *Clement the XIIIth*, having been made a Cardinal by Pope *Corsini* *Clement the XIIth*.

Venice, July 14. Cardinal *Rezzonico*, a noble Venetian, and Bishop of *Padua*, being elected Pope, the Senate set apart three Days for solemn Acts of Devotion upon that Occasion. On Monday last they created the Pope's Brother and Nephew *Cavaliers* of the *Stola d'Oro*, and made that Honour Hereditary in the Family of the Nephew. They also nominated the Brother of the Pope, Procurator of *St. Mark's*, to which Dignity he will be elected in the first Great Council to be held on Tuesday next for that Purpose: On which Occasion there will be publick Balls and Masking in *Cavalier Rezzonico's* Palace for three Days, according to Custom. The Senate appointed eight of the principal Nobles, Ambassadors Extraordinary to the Pope, namely, *Marco Foscarini*, *Alvise Mocenigo*, *Alessandro Zen*, *Cavaliers* of the *Stola d'Oro* and Procurators of *St. Mark's*, Procurator *Angiolo Contarini*, *Andrea Tron*, *Piero Correr*, *Antonio Diedo*, *Cavaliers* of the *Stola d'Oro*, and *Sig. Paolo Renier*. On Tuesday *Te Deum* was sung in *St. Mark's* Church, and that Day and the next in all the Parish Churches in *Venice*. On Wednesday there were solemn Processions of the Doge and Senate, of all the Religious Orders, of all the Secular Clergy, and of the several Confraternities, or Companies. The Spiritual Festivals being ended, last Night there were Fireworks, Bonfires and Illuminations in *St. Mark's* Place, with firing of Cannon, and such like publick Demonstrations of Joy, which are to continue for three Nights; and the third Night, *St. Mark's* Place is to be magnificently illuminated with some Thousands of large Wax Tapers.

At the Palace of the Family of Rezzonico there was last Night an Assembly of the Venetian Nobility, and two Concerts of Musick. The Palace was finely illuminated within and without with Wax Tapers; an Edifice was erected before it upon the great Canal for a Band of Musick, and was illuminated also within and without with large Wax Tapers; and on each Side of it were Bonfires upon the Canal. These Festivals are to continue for three Nights; all the Foreign Ministers are invited, and the Foreign Nobility and Gentry are admitted to them.

Florence, July 15. Two French Prizes, from the Levant to Marseilles, have been sent into Leghorn by the Eagle Privateer.

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.
