AT the Court at Kensington, the 28th Day of July 1758,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Ninth of June last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of September next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the faid Thirtieth Day of September next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

By Letters received of the 26th and 28th paft from Capt. Wheeler, of His Majesty's Ship the Iss, off Embden, there is Advice of the Arrival, in the River Embs, of the First Embarcation of the Troops under his Convoy, consisting of the Troops under the Command of the Marquis of Granby: Also of the Arrival of those, which went under Convoy of the Dolphin, under the Command of Major General Waldegrave: And of the Invalids from Shields, under Convoy of the Deptsord: And likewise of another Convoy being in Sight, which it was concluded were the Transports with the Troops under the Command of the Duke of Marlborough.

Rome, July 8. On the 6th Instant Cardinal Rezzonico, a Venetian, and Bishop of Padua, was elected Pope. He immediately took the Name of Clement the XIIIth, having been made a Cardinal by Pope Corsini Clement the XIIth.

Venice; July 14. Cardinal Rezzonico, a noble Venetian, and Bishop of Padua, being elected Pope, the Senate set apart three Days for folemn Acts of Devotion upon that Occa-On Monday last they created the Pope's Brother and Nephew Cavaliers of the Stola d'Oro, and made that Honour Hereditary in the Family of the Nephew. They also nominated the Brother of the Pope, Procurator of St. Mark's, to which Dignity he will be elected in the first Great Council to be held on Tuesday next for that Purpose: On which Occasion there will be publick Balls and Masking in Cavalier Rezzonico's Palace for three Days, according to Custom. The Senate appointed eight of the principal Nobles, Ambassadors Extraordinary to the Pope, namely, Marco Fofcarini, Alvise Mocenigo, Alessandro Zen, Cavaliers of the Stola d'Oro and Procurators of St. Mark's, Procurator Angiolo Contarini, Andrea Tron, Piero Correr, Antonio Diedo, Cavaliers of the Stola d'Oro, and Sig. Paolo Renier. On Tuesday Te Deum was sung in St. Mark's Church, and that Day and the next in all the Parish Churches in Venice. On Wednesday there were folemn Processions of the Doge and Senate, of all the Religious Orders, of all the Secular Clergy, and of the feveral Confraternities, or Companies. The Spiritual Festivals being ended, last Night there were Fireworks, Bonfires and Illuminations in St. Mark's Place, with firing of Cannon, and fuch like publick Demonstrations of Joy, which are to continue for three Nights; and the third Night, St. Mark's Place is to be magnificently illuminate ted with some Thousands of large Wax Tapers.
