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Falmouth, April 12.

HE eleventh inflant came in here the Hefter of Neath in Wales, being laden with Wine and Salt from Rochel, having been a month in making this Voyage, in which time file met with four Capers belonging to Oftend, who fent their Boars on board of her, took out of her feveral Hogfheads of Wine, and one half Hogfhead of Brandy; and befides, plundered the Mafter and Seamen of all their Cloaths, and this notwithflanding the Mafter shewed them his Sea-brief, and neceffary Pafsports : And indeed the violences committed by these Capers are fo great, that the finall Veffels belonging to these Coaffs, cannot pafs the Seas in fafety for them.

Stockbolm, March 31. The Advices we received from Mofcowy, of the Czars having commanded all his Forces which are quartered towards the Frontiers belonging to this Crown, to be ready to march the middle of this month, did raife a great jealoufie in many people; but his Majefty having fince received a Letter from the Czar of Mofcow, in which he affures his Majefty of his conftant refolution to live in amity and good correspondence with him, we feem pretty well affured on that fide. It is fuid, that our Ambaffador at Copenhagen has orders to leave that Court in 15 days; if he receive not a positive and more favourable answer than hitherto upon what he had propofed.

Venice, April 6. By a Veffel arrived from Smirna, we have advice, that two Gallies of Maltha, have lately taken a very rich fhip, going from Alexandria to Conftantinople. Four Spanish Gallies being fent from Melazzo to Naples with Provisions for the Fleet, were hardly got 50 Leagues from Melazzo, but there arofe a most terrible florm, in which two of the beft Gallies were cash away; the one was driven on the thore, by which means those that were on board, faved themfelves, but the other foundred at Sea, and all that were in her drowned.

The eighth inftant, the Count de Montecuculi parted hence for Manick, the Refidence of the Elector of Bavaria, and from thence he will continue his journey towards the Army, which is to Rendezvous, as we are told, between Francfort and Hanam; and in ordet thereunto, the Forces that were quartered on the Meuse, and in the Electorate of Cologne, are, by this Great quantime (it's thought) marching that way. tities of Corn are ordered to be ground in the upper Alfatia, to be embarked on the Danube, and fo conveyed to the Magazines appointed for the maintenance of the Imperial Troops. The Queen Dowager of Poland being in few days expected at Neisse in Silefia, the Emperor has fent the Count de Breintr towards the Frontiers of Poland, to receive her Majefty. Our Letters from Warfaw tell us, That the affairs of that Kingdom are but in a bad condition, the Kings Armybeing very weak, and out of cafe; no fupplies, or very inconfiderable, to be expected; and on the other fide, preffed by a' most powerful Enemy.

strasburgh, April 15: Prince Herman of Baden, General of the Artillery of the Imperial Army, having caufed 2500 Sacks of Meal, belonging to the French, and

defigned for Philipsburgh, to be feized here, the French Envoy makes great instance to the Magiferates for the having it reflored to fuch as he shall appoint ; but they have not yet come to any refolution in the matter, being in the mean time very much in pain, how to beliave themfelves, feeing they cannot zvoid giving offence to the Emperor, or the Most Christian King. The Deputies which were fent from hence to Vienna, to pray the Emperor's leave for the concluding a Treaty of Neutrality with the French, are returned, but we know not yet what fuccels they have had. The Chevalier Weizthi; who has been here some rime, has now taken upon him the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from his Imperial Majefty. The Duke of Lorrain is ftill here, leaving it bitherto uncertain when he wilf lepart towards Lis Troops. From Nancy and Merz they write, That the French Troops lie all ready on the Saar to be drawn' rogether, and to take the Field, nothing being wanting; bht the prefence of their General, Monfieur de Turenne. It is faid here, That the first Action of the Imperialifis this Campagne, will be to attack Philipsburgh, and that done, that General Montecucuti will march with his Army into Alfaira; the Troops of the Circles are to act under the orders of his Excellency ; the Lunenburgh Troops in Suabia, do not as yet begin to moves we are told that they are to pais down the Rhine towards Flanders!

Lipftadt, April 17. The Imperial Troops which were quartered in this Neighborhood, in the Diocels of Hildescheim and Paderborne, &c. are all gont towards Bon, from whence they will march towards Francforts and those parts. The 12 inftant, arrived here the Mareschal de Camp Dorfling, in the service of the Elector of Brandenburgh; he came from Cleves, and is going to Sweinfurt in Franconia, in order to the causing the Forces of his Electoral Highness to march towards Pomeren, to oppose the Suedes; for which purpose, the Imperial Troops commanded by General Gops in Silefa, will join with them.

Cologne, April 19. The i7 inflant, the Regiment formerly commanded by Count Lefle (who is gone for Vienna, to have fome more confiderable employment at the Emperors Court) and now by Count Mansfeldt, passed the Rhine here over our Bridge of Boats, compofed of 2000 brave Foot; and yesterday the Regiment of Rabata, confifting in 1000 Horfe, likewife paffed : they both took their way towards Bon, in order to the continuing their march with the reft of the Imperial Troops towards Francfort. On the other fide, the Regiment of Horse of Harach is marching this way from Bon, and will to day or to morrow pais the Rhine here; being ordered with the Regiment of Foot of Scarenbergh, and the Regiment of Dragoons of Trautmando f, to have their flation at Majon, feituate on the River Roer, about four I eagues from hence, in order to their hindring the Incurfions of the Garifon at Mhestricht ; these three Regiments, and that of Grana, of which fix Companies will be lodged here, and the reft at Bon; are all the ling perial Troops that will remain between the Mrufe and . the Rhine. Our Elector hath, by publick Proclamariό'n.

an, caufed the Baron of Vierfet, Governor of the City of Liege, to be fummoned to appear before him, to declare the Reafons that have moved him, contrary to his duty, to put the Cittadel into the hands of the French. The Sieur Fario having returned for answer to the meffage fent him by the States of this Diocefs, that he had no orders to treat, but to demand the monies due to the States'; and in cafe they were nor paid, to proceed to execution: the States are again affembled to find out fome way to fatisfie him. Some days fince, our Elector fent to Rhinberg, the monies neceflary for the paying the Arrears due to the Gatifon there. On Wednelday laft, the Imperial Generals paffed the Rhine at Bon, with such Troops that were there, and are marched towards the Laen,

Braffels, April 23. The Troops begin now to march on all fides, the French to attack us, and the Confederates to defend us ; which latter will be commanded by the Prince of Orange, though, it's faid, that the Duke of Lunenburgh will likewife act with a Body of an Army between the Meufe and the Schelde ; and the Duke of Lorrain between the Meufe and the Mojelle, for the fecurity of Luxemburgh : but as yet we discourse with much uncertainty of the flations the feveral Confederate Armies will have in this next Campagne, which a little time will now fully inform us. The French, by the march of their Troops, feem to perfuade us, that their main Army in these parts, to be commanded by the Prince of Conde, will be formed near Dunkirk and Bergues ; to which end, feveral Troops are faid to be already arrived in that Neighborhood. However, their chiefeft Force they bend towards Allatia, in order to the making good their ground on that fide. We have advice that a great Convoy is lately arrived at Andenard, with vaft quantities of all forts of Military Provision, and a Train of Artillery; of which, our Governor, the Duke de Villa Hermefa, has fent a Gentleman to acquaint the Prince of Orange, as well as to Complement him on his recovery, and to prefs him to haften the march of his Army. Several Deputies are arrived here from the States and Chapter of Ligges to affure his Excellency, that they had not any hand in the delivering the Cittadel into the poffeffion of the French, and to pray that they may continue in their Neutrality ; they give hopes, that in cafe the Imperialifts can be perfuaded to quit Dinant and Huy, the French will likewife quit their Cittadel, of The Mareschal de which there is little probability. Crequi is arrived with a Body of Horfe at Binch ; we are told that he is to command a flying Army between the Sambre and the Meuse; and that the Army, to be commanded by the Prince of Conde, will be drawn to-gether on the fide of Dunkirk. The preparations of the French are indeed very great, though, we hope, that those made on the part of the Confederates will equal them, who, it is faid, will act with five feveral Armies this Summer, and by that means will, as we expect here, give the French great diversion, but time will shew.

Hague, April 23. His Highness being now, God be thanked, reftored to his former health, the preparations for the approaching Campagne are carried on with great vigor; and it's not doubted, but that his Highness will about the middle of the next month be in a pollure to take the Field with his Army, with which, it is faid, he will act for the fecurity of the Spanifb Netherlands, which feem to lie exposed to the first attempts of the French this Campagne. Yesterday, or this day at farthess, their Electoral Highnesses of Brandenburgh intended to part from Gleves on their way hither, the States having given orders for the receiving them in all places they pais within their Territories, with all possi-

ble honour and refpret. Upon the arrival of his Electoral Highneis, a Conterer ce will be held here, in which , all the matters relating to the Campagne that hisherto remain unfinished, will be finally determined. Here has for fome days been a report in Town, as if the French had again poffeffed the mielves of Rkintergh, belonging to the Elector of Cologne, but without any ground, as we are affured by feveral paffengers that came from thence on Saturday laft. In our laft we told you, That feveral Suedes Vellels had been brought up into the Ports of this Province, by vertue of Commissions from the Eleftor of Brandenburgh, which the States had caufed to be releafed 3 and that fince, 12 other Merchanimen belonging to the Subjects of Sueden, had been brought in, by vertue of the faid Commissions; for the discharging of which, the Suedifb Minister here made likewife inflance to the States; but they have now, it feems, avow-ed the faid Commissions of the Elector of Brandenburgh, and given leave to those that were warranted by them, to dispose of their Prizes: And we are told that the King of Dinmark has done the like within his Territories. Count Waldeck is not as yet arrived here, but daily expected.

Paris, April 24. The Ceust continues as yet at Verfailles, and hitherto we cannot certainly learn the day his Majeffy will begin his journey towards the Trentiers of Flanders. It is faild, That the Army which the Prince of Cende fhall command this Campagne, will be composed of 40000 fighting Men 3 and that commanded by Monficur de Turenne in Alfaire, of 30000, not reckoning feveral flying Bodies, which will be at the difposition of those Generals 1 and the Troops which are to form these Armies, are accordingly on their match to the places appointed for their Rendervous 3 the News we had here, of the taking of the Scalerra and Melazzo from the Spaniards by the French at Melfina, proves a millake. We have advice of the arrival of the French Gallies at Villa Franca, on their way to Melfina.
