The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Humphry Edwards, of Talgarth, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Merioneth.

Rome, Jan. 13. A few Nights ago a Fire broke out in the Apartment of Cardinal Alexander Albani, which did considerable Damage. It melted all his Plate, destroyed a great Quantity of Saxon China, and caused other considerable Damages. On the 8th Instant the Pope's Frigates St. Peter and St. Paul, after having careened and refitted at Civita Vecchia, sailed again from that Port to cruize on the Barbary Corsairs.

Florence, Jan. 20. The Duke of Marlborough Privateer is arrived at Leghorne to refit, having had an Engagement for several Hours with a French Frigate called the Pleiades, which was obliged to sheer off in a bad Condition. On the 15th Instant, as the Ship William, Capt. Randall, with a Cargo of Fish from Newfoundland, was coming into the Port of Leghorne, she was taken by a French Galliot Privateer, in Sight of that Port, and carried in there.

Berlin, Jan. 27. The Swedish Garrison in Anclam has followed the Example of that of Demmin. They surrendered Prisoners of War; but have been permitted to return to Sweden, on their promising not to serve against his Majesty and his Allies, before they have been exchanged or ransomed. This Garrison, consisting of 1421 Men, was chiefly composed of Detachments from the Regiments of West Gothland and Nyland, and from the Green Dragoons. There were also taken 238 Horses, 6 Pair of Colours, 36 Pieces of Cannon, Mortars or Haubitzers, and a considerable Magazine.

tally consumed, by Fire: And that a Barn, Stable and Corn-Stacks, likewise belonging to the said John Hill, at Hacktorn aforesaid, were, on Monday the 8th of January last, also, greatly damaged, if not wholly consumed, by Fire: And that there is Reason to apprehend the said Corn-Stacks, Barn and Stable were, at the Times abovementioned, maliciously set on Fire, by some evil minded Person, or Persons; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, the Perpetrator, or Perpetrators, of those wicked Crimes, or either of them, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One concerned therein, (except the Person, or Persons who actually set the said Corn-Stacks, Barn and Stable, or either of them, on Fire,) who shall discover his, or her Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Facts, or either of them, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Right Honourable the Earl of Scarborough does, hereby, promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to the Person, or Persons, making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except the Person or Persons who actually set the said Corn-Stacks, Barn and Stable, on Fire :) To be paid by his Lordship, upon the Conviction of any One, or more of the Offenders.

And, as a still further Encouragement, Robert Cracroft, of Hacktorn, in the said County of Lincoln, Esq; and John Hill, of the same Place, do, each of them, hereby, promise a Reward of Ten Pounds, to the Person, or Persons, making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted :) To be paid by them respectively, upon the Conviction of any One, or more, of the said Offenders.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned



tioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor or the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick Information, that a Galliot or Vessel, called the Juffrow Christina Elizabeth of Lubeck, whereof Casper Muntzenberger was Master, laden with different Kinds of Goods and Merchandize, belonging to the Subjects of the Emprers of Russia, and bound from Rouen to St. Peterbourg, was, in the Course of her said Voyage, on the 18th Day of September last, boarded three several Times by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of six English Ships or Vessels, being, or pretending to be Privateers; and that at the first of those Times, viz. about One a-Clock in the Afternoon of that Day, some of the Crews of the said English Ships boarded the said Galliot off Dungeness, and opening the Fore Hatchway, went into the Hold, and broke open a great many Cases, and Packs of Merchandize, and unlawfully took, and carried away, great Quantities of Velvets, Silks, Silk-Stockings, Gloves, Confectionary Goods, and one whole Bale of Silk: And that between Three and Four a-Clock in the same Afternoon, being off Dover, the said Galliot was again boarded by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of three other English Ships, who being in Company, went together into the Hold, and rummaged the said Galliot, and unlawfully took, and carried away, some Silk, and Silk-Stockings, Part of which they wrapped about their Bodies, and put the rest into their Pockets, and also took away a Sword: And that soon afterwards, on the same Day, the said Galliot was a third Time boarded by the Crew, or Part of the Crew of another English Ship, who went into the Hold, broke open several Cases, and unlawfully took, and carried away, two Boat-loads of Merchandize, consisting of Men and Women's Velvets, Silk, embroidered Cloaths, Silk-Stockings, Leather Gloves, French-Plate Candlesticks, some Swords, and Hangers, Bottles of Cordials, Perfumes, and Confectionary and other Goods; and then beat several of the said Galliot's Crew, and confined the said Master in his Cabbin, placing a Centry over him with Pistols:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the Piratical Offences above-mentioned, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto or amongst such Person or Persons, as shall, within three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders concerned in Committing all or any of the Piracies above-mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders

shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the above-mentioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more, other of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders so discovered, be likewise entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
