Extract of a Letter from Captain Samuel Hood, of His Majesty's Ship the Vestal, of 32 Guns and 220 Men, to Mr. Clevland, Sccretary of the Admiralty, dated at Spithead the 2d of March, 1759.

I beg you will be pleafed to acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that being flationed at Day-light four or five Miles a-head of Admiral Holmes, to look out, on the 21ft paft, about Seven o'Clock in the Morning, 200 Leagues South Weft from the Lizard, I faw a Sail bearing S. S. E. directly to Windward, and gave Chace. At Eleven I discovered the Chace to be an Enemy, of which I made the Signal to the Admiral, as I did immediately after, That of being able to fpeak with her: At Ten Minutes paft Two, I begun to engage the Bellona Frigate, commanded by the Count of Beau-honoir, of 32 Guns, within half Musket Shot, and continued a close Action till near Six, when fhe ftruck, having only her Foremast standing, without Yard or Topmast, which soon after went away, being much wounded. The Trent chafed at the fame Time I did, and then was not more than four Miles to Leeward ; and when I began to engage, fhe was out of Sight from our Top Gallant Mast's Head, tho' she chased the whole Time, and the Weather very clear, and was full four Miles from me when the Enemy ftruck; the Lofs of whom I cannot exactly ascertain, the Accounts of the Prisoners differ fo widely ; and I can get no proper Roll of Equipage; but it was very great, as the Vestal's Lieutenant found more than 30 dead upon the Decks when he took Poffeffion; and they themfelves own, to have thrown overboard 10 or 12, which, with those now living, being 180, make the Number that were on Board, at the Beginning of the Action, upwards of 220, as I have carefully informed myfelf from the Captain, and other of the Officers. On the Part of His Majesty, were Five killed, and Twenty-two As foon as I brought to, after the wounded. Enemy struck, all the Top Masts fell over the Side, being much fhot, and having no Rigging to fupport them : The lower Mafts would likewife have gone, had not the Weather been very fine indeed; and with all the Fishing I could give the Mainmast, it would not bear other than a Jury Yard, which I was likewife under a Neceffity of rigging upon the Foremast. In this Situation of His Majesty's Ship, and her Prize, I thought myfelf obliged to bear up for England, efpecially as the Wind shifted in the Ac-

tion to the S.W. ; which I hope their Lordships will approve. Not being able to put a Boat in the Water, but by launching her over the Side, by which a Cutter was funk and loft ; I defired Captain Lindfay to flay by me, and exchange a Part of the Prifoners, which he did ; but having made Room for them on board the Veftal, by Noon next Day Capt. Lindfay took his Leave, in order to rejoin the Admiral. The Bellona failed from Martinique the 16th of January in fome Hurry, accompanied with another Frigate of the fame Force, and the Floriffant, occafioned by His Majefty's Squadron, under the Command of Commodore Moore, being off the Island. The Commodore did not appear till that Morning, and had all the Troops landed by the Evening near Point Negroe: The three French Ships were chafed by fome of Mr. Moore's Squa-dron. The Bellona got clear by Superiority of failing ; but does not know how it fared with her Companions, having never feen either of them fince.
