Admiralty Office, December 26, 1758 Y Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick Information, that a Galliot or Vessel, called the Juffrow Christina Elizabeth of Lubeck, whereof Casper Muntzenberger was Mafter, laden with different Kinds of Goods and Merchandize, belonging to the Subjects of the Empress of Ruffia, and bound from Rouen to St. Feterfbourg, was, in the Courfe of her faid Voyage, on the 18th Day of September laft, boarded three feveral Times by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of fix English Ships or Veffels, being, or pretending to be Pri-vateers; and that at the first of those Times, viz. about One a-Clock in the Afternoon of that Day, fome of the Crews of the faid English Ships boarded the faid Galliot off Dungeness, and opening the Fore Hatchway, went into the Hold, and broke open a great many Cafes, and Packs of Merchan-dize, and unlawfully took, and carried away, great Quantities of Velvets, Silks, Silk-Stockings, Gloves, Confectionary Goods, and one whole Bale of Silk: And that between Three and Four a Clock in the fame Afternoon, being off Dover, the faid Galliot was again boarded by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of three other English Ships, who being in Company, went together into the Hold, and rummaged the faid Galliot, and unlawfully took, and carried away, fome Silk, and Silk-Stockings, Part of which they wrapped about their Bodies, and put the reft into their Pockets, and also took away a Sword : And that foon afterwards, on the fame Day, the faid Galliot was a third Time boarded by the Crew, or Part of the Crew of another English Ship, who went into the Hold, broke open feveral Cafes, and unlawfully took, and carried away, two Boatloads of Merchandize, confifting of Men and Wo men's Velvets, Silk, embroidered Cloaths, Silk-Stockings, Leather Gloves, French-Plate Candleflicks, fome Swords, and Hangers, Bottles of Cordials, Perfumes, and Confectionary and other Goods ; nad then beat feveral of the faid Galliot's Crew, and confined the faid Master in his Cabbin, placing a Centry over him with Piftols :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Juffice, the Perfons guilty of the Piratical Offences above-mentioned, are pleafed to pro-mife a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto or amongst fuch Perfon or Persons, as shall, within three Months from this Time, difcover any one or more of the Offenders concerned in Committing all or any of the Piracies above-mentioned, fo as fuch Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof : Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Elq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the abovementioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more, other of the faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders fo difcovered, be likewife entitled to His Majefty's most gracious Pardon.

Whereas by the Eleventh Article of His Majefly's Inftructions given to Commanders of Merchant Ships and Veffels, with the Letters of Marque against France, it is directed that they shall keep a Correspondence by all Conveniences, and upon all Occasions, with the

Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Commignoners for Executing the Office of Lora trigh Admiral of Great Britain, or their Secretary, and not only to give an Account of their Captures or Proceed-ings, but also of all they shall discover by any Means whatever concerning the Defigns of the Enemy, their Fleets, Ships or Veffels, and of their Stations. And whereas by the Fifteenth Article of the afore-

faid Infructions it is likewife directed, that the faid Commanders Iball, by every Opportunity, fend exact Copies of their Journals to the Secretary of the Admiralty.

To both which Articles very little, if any Regard has been poid by several of the Commanders of Merchant Ships and Vessels having Letters of Marque, and it being a Matter of the utmost Importance that the fame should be strictly complied with;

My Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty do there-fore give Notice to the faid Commanders, and all other Perfons concerned, that they will direct the Proctor of the Admiralty, to proceed according to Law, against all fuch as do not punctually comply with His Majefly's Instructions before-mentioned.
