The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majefty was pleafed, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February laft, to fignify His Royal Pleafure, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman and Able Bodied Landman, fit for His Majefty's Service, fhould be continued to be paid to all fuch who should voluntarily enter themselves on Board any of His Ships of War, on or before the 21ft Day of April next ; and that the faid Bounties should be paid to them respectively, immediately after their first Muster on Board the Ships into which they fhould fo enter-And whereas fince the Iffuing the aforementioned Order, His Majefty hath been given to underfland, that there are at this Time dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, many of whom may be inclined to enter into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majefty's faid Bounties, provided that the Juffices of the Peace, or other Magistrates (near to whom the faid Seamen may refide) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to caufe them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War ;- His Majesty hath therefore been pleased, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, to Require and Command all the Juffices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities and Towns throughout the Kingdom of England and Wales, and likewife the Provofts of Edinburgh, Glafgow, and Aberdeen in Scotland, to receive all fuch Seamen and Seafaring Men, who fhall appear before them, and offer to enter as Voluntiers, in Cafe they are of Health and Ability fit for His Majeffy's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of fuch his voluntary Offer, and to caufe them to be conducted, by proper Perfons, to fome Sea Officer employed in raifing Men on Shore, or to

the neareft Sea Port Town, in order to be put on Board any of His Majefty's Ships of War, which Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships, are directed to pay to every fuch Seamen, after his being fo put on Board (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the faid Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman; — And to the End that His Majefty's Directions given herein may be made known to all Perfons concerned, His Msjefty has therefore ordered, that the fame fhould be publifhed in the London Gazette.

Their Lordhips therefore, in order to detect and bring to Juffice the Perfons guilty of fuch Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Na tions in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Difhonour thereof) are pleafed to promife a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Acts of Piracy as aforefaid, fo as fuch Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of fuch Offences as aforefaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Acceffaries thereto, who knowingly affift, maintain, councel, or advife the Committing of fuch Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods to piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed fuch Robberies :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Perfons guilty of fuch last men-tioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongil fuch Perfon or Perfons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Offences last mentioned, to as fuch Offender or Offenders shall Which -be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. faid respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatfoever, by Samuel Seddon, Efq: Solicitor of the Admiralty, imme diately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Veffels) who shall discover any one or more of the

faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders fo difcovered, be intitled to His Majefty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promife to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforefaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service. during this prefent War with France.

To both which Articles very little, if any Regard has been paid by feveral of the Commanders of Merchant Ships and Veffels having Letters of Marque, and it being a Matter of the utmost Importance that the fame should be firitly complied with ;
