Westminster, March 23.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Bills was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,

An Act for taking off the Prohibition of the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the Twenty Second Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the more easy and speedy Recovery of small Debts within the Town and Borough of Southwark, and the several Parishes of Saint Saviour, Saint Mary at Newington, Saint Mary Magdalen Bermondsey, Christ Church, Saint Mary Lambeth, and Saint Mary at Rotherhithe, in the County of Surrey, and the several Precincts and Liberties of the same, and for extending the Powers and Provisions of the said Act to such Part of the Eastern Half of the Hundred of Brixton, in the said County, as is not included in the said Act.

An Act for repairing and widening the High Road leading from the Town of Mansfield in the County of Nottingham, through the Towns of Polesley, Glapwell, Heath, and Normenton, and the Liberty of Hasland, to the Turnpike Road, leading from the Town of Derby, to the Town of Chesterfield, in the County of Derby.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the East End of the Town of Chard, to the South End of the West Moor, and from the West End of the Yeovil Turnpike Road, through Ilminster, to Kenny Gate, and from the West End of Pease-marsh Lane, to Horton Elm, and from Saint Rave Hill, to Ilminster, and from White Cross, to Chillington Down, and from a Place called Three Oaks, over Ilford Bridges, to Bridge Cross, in the County of Somerset.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Chappel Bar, near the West End of the Town of Nottingham, to New-haven, and from the Four Lane Ends near Oakthorpe to Ashborne, and from the Cross Post on Wirksworth Moor, to join the Road leading from Chesterfield to Chappel-en-le-Frith, at or near Longson, in the County of Derby, and from Selston to Annesley Wood-house, in the County of Nottingham.

An Act to continue, amend, and make effectual, an Act passed in the twelfth Year of the Reign of His pre-

sent Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing the Roads from the North West Parts of the County of Lincoln, through Nettlam Fields, Wragby Lane, and Baumber Fields, to the Wolds or North East Part of the said County; and also for repairing and widening the Roads from the Well in East Gate, in the City of Lincoln, and from the North West End of Horncastle, and from the Guide Post, at the East End of Hainton, through Barkwith, to the Roads directed to be repaired by the said Act.

An Act for repairing several Roads leading to the Town of Bridgewater, in the County of Somerset, and for amending and rendering more effectual several Roads from the Cities of Gloucester and Bristol, and several other Roads in the said Acts mentioned, in the Counties of Somerset and Gloucester.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Cross at Broken Cross in Macclesfield in the County of Chester, through Macclesfield Forest, to the present Turnpike Road, at the South End of the Township of Buxton, in the County of Derby.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Chesterfield, to the Turnpike Road at Hernstone-Lane-Head, and also the Road branching from the said Road upon the East Moor, through Baslow and Wardlow, to the joining of the said Roads again near Wardlow Mires; and also the Road leading between the said Road and Branch from Calver Bridge, to Baslow Bridge; and also the Road from the Turnpike Road near Newhaven House, to the Turnpike Road near Grindleford Bridge, in the County of Derby.

Petersbourg, Feb. 20. Count Fermor arrived at this Place on Saturday last, but it is thought that his Stay will be only for a few Days. On Wednesday her Imperial Majesty made a Promotion of General Officers.

Breslaw, Feb. 25. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse is declared General of the Foot, and named Vice Governor of Magdebourg, in the Absence of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick the Governor.

Breslaw, March 4. General Woperfnow has taken Possession of Posen, and the Magazine that had been formed there by the Russians, who retired from thence, being too weak to make Resistance: And, if the Accounts received from their Army are true, it has suffered greatly by Sickness. Last Friday the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel left this Place, on his Journey to Magdebourg. His Prussian Majesty has declared the Duke of Brunswick Bevern, and Lieutenant General Fouquet, Generals of Foot. The other Promotions are not yet published.

Breslaw, March 7. The Accounts received from Erfurth say, That on the 28th of February, that Town capitulated upon the Approach of the Detachment under General Knobloch; and a Neutrality was stipulated with the Garrison in the Petersberg. There were, besides the usual Garrison in the Petersberg, four Battalions in the Town, to whom a Capitulation of an extraordinary Nature has been granted, viz. To have Leave for 24 Hours to retire unmolested, where they pleased; but if taken after

after that Time, they were liable to be made Prisoners of War: And it is said, there is a Probability that General Kischerleben, who led a Detachment from Lagenfaltz towards Erfurth, may intercept them in their Retreat, especially as he will be assisted by Colonel Kleift, who commands the Detachment of Dragoons and Hussars, and who had made about 60 Men, and some Officers, Prisoners, before the Town of Erfurth capitulated. General Verner of the Hussars is returned from his Expedition to Cracow, whither he was detached to seize a Magazine the Austrians were forming: But it does not appear that any Thing considerable was found there.

Munster, March 7. About the 28th past, the Prince of Isenburgh, agreeable to the Orders he had received, detached towards Vacha four Battalions, with about 1000 Dragoons, Hussars, and Chasseurs, under the Command of Major General Urft. This Detachment, being assembled at Rhotenburg the 28th of last Month, fell unexpectedly, in the Night between the 1st and 2d Instant, upon the Enemy's Quarters, some of whom were taken, and the rest retired in the utmost Confusion. Hirschfeld, Vacha, and all the Hessian Bailiwicks, which the Austrians had taken Possession of, were immediately evacuated. It is supposed that the Enemy are retiring towards Meinungen, and that their heavy Baggage has taken the Route towards Bamberg.

Hague, March 13. The News of the taking of Erfurth by the Prussians, and of the clearing the Landgraviate of Hesse, by a Detachment of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick's Army, the Beginning of this Month, is now confirmed. The Troops of the Empress Queen, and the Circles, were driven from all their Posts, and are retired in great Confusion and Precipitation further back into the Empire, abandoning a great many Prisoners, and a great Deal of Baggage, which have fallen into the Hands of the Light Troops of Prince Ferdinand's Army.

There is certain Advice that the Prussians are in Possession of Fulda: They have taxed that Abbot and Abby at One Hundred Thousand Crowns, of which Ten Thousand were paid. Erfurth was taxed One Hundred Thousand Florins.

The King has been pleased to grant unto John Kelly, of Christ Church, in the University of Oxford, Doctor in Physick, the Office and Place of Professor in the Science or Faculty of Physick in the said University of Oxford.

Admiralty Office, March 13, 1759.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular,

and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
