AT the Court at St. James's, the 9th Day of March, 1759,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to signify His Royal Pleasure, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman and Able Bodied Landman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be continued to be paid to all such who should voluntarily enter themselves on Board any of His Ships of War, on or before the 214 Day of April next; and that the faid Bounties should be paid to them respectively, immediately after their first Muster on Board the Ships into which they should so enter-And whereas fince the Issuing the aforementioned Order, His Majesty hath been given to understand, that there are at this Time dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, many of whom may be inclined to enter into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's said Bounties, provided that the Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrates (near to whom the said Seamen may reside) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to cause them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War; -His Majesty hath therefore been pleased, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, to Require and Command all the Justices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities and Towns throughout the Kingdom of England and Wales, and likewife the Provofts of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Aberdeen in Scotland, to receive all fuch Seamen and Seafaring Men, who shall appear before them, and offer to enter as Voluntiers, in Case they are of Health and Ability fit for His Majesty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Sezman a Certificate of fuch his voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted, by proper Persons, to some Sea Officer employed in raifing Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to be put on Board any of His Majesty's Ships of War, which Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships, are directed to pay to every fuch

Seaman, after his being so put on Board (upon producing the Certificate asorementioned) the said Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman;—And to the End that His Majesty's Directions given herein may be made known to all Persons concerned, His Majesty has therefore ordered, that the same should be published in the London Gazette.

Rome, Feb. 17. The Roman Catholick Ecclesiasticks, in the States possessed by the King of Prussia, have acquainted the Pope, that His Pruffian Majesty has caused an Edict to be published, requiring them to pay a Tax of Ten per Cent. on their Revenues, in the same Manner as is exacted by the Empress Queen in her Dominions, in Consequence of a Bull which the Pope has granted to her Imperial Majesty for that Purpole. The King of Portugal has requested the Pope to take upon himself the Chassifing of the Clergy under Arrest, that are concerned in the late Conspiracy against his Perfon, but nothing has been determined as yet on this Subject. The Neapolitan Troops are encamped on the Borders of the Ecclefiastical State, which has occasioned the Pope to order a sufficient Number of the Militia to be ready for any Service that may be required.

Florence, Feb. 24. On the 9th Instant, as the Snow Bethia, an English Vessel, was entering into the Port of Leghorn, she was attacked and taken by a small French Privateer, within the Jurisdiction of the Port; on which Account the Fortifications fired at the Frenchman, who is detained in that Port, with her Prize, till the Regency of Tuscany decides the Affair. On the 15th, 500 Recruits, drasted out of the Tuscan Battalions in Garrison at Leghorn, Porto-Ferraio, and this Capital, marched for Germany, to supply the Desiciency of the Tuscan Troops. On the 18th and 20th anchored at Leghorn, His Britannick Majesty's Ships the Glasgow, Lyme, Ambuscade, and Gibraltar, for Re-

freshments.

And in regard the Committing of fuch Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, councel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed

fuch Robberies

. Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst fuch Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Offences last mentioned, fo as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which faid respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatfoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, imme. diately after the Conviction of such Offenders

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Veffels) who shall discover any one or more of the

That on the 16th Instant, about Three o'Clock I faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any fuch Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service,

during this present War with France.
