RESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to fignify His Royal Pleasure, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman and Able Bodied Landman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be continued to be paid to all such who should voluntarily enter themselves on Board any of His Ships of War, on or before the 21st Day of April next; and that the faid Bounties should be paid to them respectively, immediately after their first Muster on Board the Ships into which they should so enter-And whereas fince the Issuing the aforementioned Order, His Majesty hath been given to understand, that there are at this Time dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, many of whom may be inclined to enter into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's said Bounties, provided that the Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrates (near to whom the said Seamen may reside) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to cause them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War; -His Majesty hath therefore been pleased, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, to Require and Command all the Justices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities and Towns throughout the Kingdom of England and Wales, and likewise the Provosts of Edinburgh, Glafgow, and Aberdeen in Scotland, to receive all fuch Seamen and Seafaring Men, who shall appear before them, and offer to enter as Voluntiers, in Case they are of Health and Ability fit for His Majesty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of fuch his voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted, by proper Persons, to some Sea Officer employed in raifing Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to be put on Board any of His Majesty's Ships of War, which Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships, are directed to pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board (upon

Petersbourg, March 2. On this Day Se'nnight General Brown arrived here, and was received, by the Empress, with great Marks of Distinction. He is surprisingly well recovered of his Wounds: However, he complains still of Weakness, and, on Account of his Health, has, it is faid, excused himself from serving this Campaign.

On Friday last the Great Duke was declared Head of the Corps of Cadets, and has taken Pos-

session of that Office.

Breslaw, March 11. No Magazine was found at Cracow, by the Corps of Pruffian Troops fent into that Country: But Major Panwitz, of the Hussars, had the good Fortune to intercept Capt. Verden, an Aid de Camp of General Fermor's, at about the Distance of one Mile from that Town, who was on his Road from Vienna to Petersbourg, and is said to have been charged with Dispatches of very great Importance. Captain Verden having no Notice of the Prussians being in those Parts, when he met with the Hussars, believed them to be Austrians, and had not Time even to attempt to destroy any of his Papers. He was brought to this Place last Friday. General Wopersnow, with the Corps under his Command, is returned to Lista, upon the Frontier of Poland, and is expected here very soon. The Prussian Troops observed the strictest Discipline during their Stay in Poland, and paid exactly and largely for every Thing they had. Things remain quiet in this Neighbourhood.

Hambeurg, March 20. Five Battalions of Prussian Infantry, with some Hussars and Dragoons, appeared before Schwerin on the 15th In-They immediately required Genera Zulow, who commands the Duke of Mec lembourg's Troops there, amounting to at 2000 Men, to deliver both the Town and rison into their Hands: The General resused to comply with these Dema the Town not being in any State c

he retired, with the Force he had; upon the Caninchen-Werder, a small Island situated in the Lake of Schwerin, where Redoubts have been lately raised, and Artillery sent, for the Desence of the Place. The Island is however so violently cannonaded and bombarded by the Prussians, that in all Probability General Zulow will not be able to maintain himself there much longer. The Duke of Mecklembourg is still here, his Serene Highness putting off his Removal to Altona from Day to Day.

Munster, March 22. This Morning Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, attended only by his Secretary, and two Aids de Camp, left this Place, and went out by the Gate St. Egide, which leads towards Ham: But where his Serene Highness may have directed his Route, is

not known.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Elliot, of His Majesty's Ship the Eolus, to Mr. Clevland, dated Plymouth Sound, March 26, 1759. Please to acquaint the Right Honourable my

Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty, that I arrived here this Day with His Majesty's Ship under my Command, and La Mignonne, a French Frigate of 20 Guns and 143 Men, commanded by Chevalier de Tursanville. I took her on the 19th Instant, after an Action of 12 or 15 Minutes. Her Captain and 30 Men were killed, the Second Captain's Thigh shot off, and about 25 wounded. That Evening, about Four o'Clock, in Company with His Majesty's Ship Isis, we got Sight of four Frigates and 30 Sail of coasting Vessels, close under the Isle de Dieu: Three of the Frigates stood off to us, in order to protect their Convoy: Captain Wheeler stood for the Leewardmost, as she appeared to be the Commodore, and to prevent, if possible, any of the rest getting in with the Land, (for it was a Lee Shore;) but Le Savage, of 32 Guns, the Ship Captain Wheeler stood for, made off before he could get near her. La Blonde, of 32 Guns, came close along-fide His Majesty's Ship under my Command, each under our Top-sails. When we had exchanged a few Broadfides, I fell a little a ftern for want of a Brace or Bouline to fill the Main-top-sail with: She seized that Opportunity to make all the Sail fhe could: As the Eolus had received no other Damage to prevent her Sailing as well as ever, and the Enemy had a good deal, I should have been up with her again in a few Minutes, had not the Mignonne come a long fide of me, which favoured her Escape. On board His Majesty's Ship under my Command were two Men wounded. The Isis followed the Blonde so close, that it was with great Difficulty she got into the Road of Basque, after exchanging chase Guns for fome Time.

Admiralty Office, April 3, 1759. His Majesty's Ships Southampton and Islalampe, commanded by the Captains Gilchrist and Hotham, on the 28th past, came up with the French Frigate of War the Danae, of 40 Guns and 330 Men, which, after a brisk Engagement, was taken, having between 30 and 40 Men killed, and a great Number wounded. The Southampton had one Man killed and eight wounded; amongst the latter was Captain Gilchrist, who being shot through the right Shoulder with a Pound Ball, has been put ashore at Yarmouth. The Melampe had eight Men killed and 20 wounded.

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, councel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more

of the Offenders guilty of any fach Offences 1ast mentioned, fo as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. faid respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatfoever, by Samuel Seddon, Eiq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (o her than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to

His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any fuch Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
