By the KING, PROCLAMATION,

For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Ablebodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Re-wards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as bave deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen.

GEORGE R. THEREAS for the speedy Manning of Our Fleet, We did, by Our Order in Council of the Fourteenth of April last, amongst other Things, direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds fir every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be con inued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the Second Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should likewife be continued to be paid to fuch Person or Persons, who should, on or before the said Second Day of June next, discover any concealed Seamen, so that such Seamen should be taken for Our Service. - And whereas Our Service doth at this Time require a more speedy Supply of Seamen, Sea-faing Men, and Ablebodied Lanamen, to ferve on Board Our Ships of War, and it being Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Seamen, Sea-faring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to revoke that Our former Order, and in lieu thereof to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, That the Bounties of FIVE POUNDS for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the Third Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal

Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy: And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the said Third Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy: And that the faid respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen upon their being brought on Board Our Ships at any of Our Dock Yards in England, by the Clerks of the Cheque, or upon their being put on Board any Ship or Vessel appointed to receive Men at Leith or Greenock in Scotland, or at Dublin or Corke in Ireland; by the Captains or Commanders of the Ships or Vessels whereinto such Seamen or Landmen shall be put, or by the Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and entring themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen or Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels, to which they shall belong, and enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be feverely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further promise and declare. That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may fecret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our faid Service, on or before the faid Third Day of July next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raifing Men: The faid Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken, in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, or Sea Officers employed in

raising Men on Shore; immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Sea Officers employed in raifing Men on shore respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforefaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service. And as an Encouragement to fuch Seamen who may have deferted from Our Ships to return to the Service, We do promise Our most gracious Pardon to all fuch as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships or Veffels by or before the Third Day of July next; and also to all such who have deserted, but are now belonging to some one of Our Ships, (in which Ship they are hereby permitted to continue.) And We do hereby further Declare, that such Seamen who have absented themselves from any of Our Ships, and shall render themselves on Board the same, or any other of Our Ships of War, by or before the Time abovementioned, shall not be profecuted for such their Desertion; but that all such Deferters who shall not, on or before the faid Third Day of July next, render themselves on Board some of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, without Leave from the Commanding Officer, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty of deferting at this Time, when their Country fo much wants their Service, they shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall fuffer Death according to Law. And We do hereby Require and Command, all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs and Magistrates of the feveral Shires, Counties, Cities, Towns Corporate, and all other Places within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, to give the Ariclest Orders and Directions to the Constables, and other inserior Civil Officers, to take up all straggling Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall be of Health and Ability fit for Our Service, and fend them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in raifing Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board Our Ships of War: Which Conductors shall be paid by the said Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships to whom such Seamen shall be delivered, Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they may respectively travel. And We do hereby likewise require and command all Our faid Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs and Magistrates, to receive all fuch Seamen and Seafaring Men, who shall appear before them, and offer to enter as Volunteers on or before the faid Third Day of July next, in case they are of Health and Ability fit for Our Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of fuch his Voluntary Offer, and to cause them to

Allowances as above directed with respect to straggling Seamen; and the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships, to whom such Volunteer Seamen shall be delivered, shall pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board, (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the Bounties of FIVE POUNDS to every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings to every Ordinary Seaman.

GOD fave the KING.

Constantinople, April 3. The Illuminations and Rejoicings for the Birth of a Princess, who was named Ibetula, or Given of God, which were limited to Seven Nights, were prolonged. by the Grand Seignor's Orders, to Ten. The fourth Day the Sultan rode through Pera with great Pomp, to visit the Seraglio of his Pages. During these Rejoicings, the greatest Order was preserved in all Parts of the City, which may be attributed to the strict Prohibition against felling Wine, or spirituous Liquors, The Raias, or Christian Subjects, indulged themselves in all Kinds of Divertions, without any Manner of Restraint; and the whole terminated with three Nights Fireworks, exhibited on the Canal before the Seraglio. It is confidently faid, that two other Sultanas are pregnant.

Landshut, May 4. General Fouquet having found it impracticable to destroy the Austrian Magazine at Hoff in Moravia, retired to his former Station at Leobschutz, in order to cover Neisse, and the Country about it, after having made in that Expedition 260 Prisoners, with the Loss only of two Men. The King of Prussia went in Person from hence early in the Morning of the 20th, and arrived at Neille that Day. General de la Ville was posted on the Heights behind Neuftadt, and decamped that Evening, and placed himfelf behind Ziegenhals and Zugmantel. His Prussian Majesty joined General Fouquet the next Day, the 30th, at Deutsch-Kamitz, and marched the Day after towards the Enemy, who hath decamped at Two in the Morning; so that that Expedition ended in an Affair of the Rear guard.

Hague, May 8. The Army under the Command of Prince Henry of Prussia is actually in Motion, and, it is supposed, would enter Franconia by Hoss on the 7th Instant, in order to act against the Army of the Empire, commanded by the Prince of Deux Ponts, who had drawn the greatest Part of his Force towards Culmbach. In the mean while, a large Detachment from Prince Ferdinand's Army was arrived on the 4th Instant, within a forced March of Bamberg, which will cause a considerable Diversion. Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, councel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of

FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Ossenders guilty of any such Ossenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Ossenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to

His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
