PROCLAMATION,

For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Ablebodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as bave deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen.

HEREAS for the speedy Manning of Our Fleet, We did, by Our Order in Council of the Fourteenth of April last, amongst other Things, direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be continued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the Second Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should likewife he continued to be paid to fuch Person or Persons, who should, on or before the said Second Day of June next, discover any concealed Seamen, fo that such Seamen should be taken for Our Service. — And whereas Our Service doth at this Time require a more speedy Supply of Seamen, Sea-faring Men, and Ablebodied Landmen, to ferve on Board Our Ships of War, and it being Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Seamen, Sea-faring Men, and Able bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to revoke that Our former Order, and in lieu thereof to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, That the Bounties of FIVE POUNDS for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the Third Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy: And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the said Third Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either

with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy: And that the faid respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen upon their being brought on Board Our Ships at any of Our Dock Yards in England, by the Clerks of the Cheque, or upon their being put on Board any Ship or Veffel appointed to receive Men at Leith or Greenock in Scotland, or at Dublin or Corke in Ireland, by the Captains or Commanders of the Ships or Vessels whereinto such Seamen or Landmen shall be put, or by the Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and entring themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty-Money; We do hereby occlare and command, That fuch Seamen or Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels, to which they shall belong, and enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Veffels they shall leave, but also be feverely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may fecret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our faid Service, on or before the faid Third Day of July next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raifing Men: The faid Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamenso discovered and taken, in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, or Sea Officers employed in raifing Men on Shore; immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Sea Officers employed in raising Men on Shore respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service. And as an Encouragement to such Seamen who may have deferted from Our Ships to return to the Service, We do promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships or Veffels by or before the Third Day of July next; and also to all such who have deferted, but are now belonging to fome one of Our Ships, (in which Ship they are hereby permitted to continue.) And We do hereby

further Declare, that such Seamen who have absented themselves from any of Our Ships, and shall render themselves on Board the same, or any other of Our Ships of War, by or before the Time abovementioned, shall not be profecuted for such their Desertion; but that all such Deferters who shall not, on or before the said Third Day of July next, render themselves on Board some of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, without Leave from the Commanding Officer, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty of deferting at this Time, when their Country fo much wants their Service, they shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall fuffer Death according to Law. And We do hereby Require and Command, all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs and Magistrates of the several Shires, Counties, Cities, Towns Corporate, and all other Places within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, to give the firidest Orders and Directions to the Constables, and other inferior Civil Officers, to take up all straggling Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall be of Health and Ability fit for Our Service, and lend them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in railing Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board Our Shipe of War: Which Conductors shall be paid by the faid Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships to whom such Seamen that be delivered. Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they may respectively travel. And We do bereby likewise require and command all Our faid Justices of the Peace, Mayora, Bayliffe and Magifrates, to receive all fuch Seamon and Seataring Men, who shall appear before them, and offer to enter as Volunteers on or before the faid Third Day of July next, in case they are of Hezith and Ability fit for Our Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of fuch his Voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted in like Manner and with the lame Allowances as above directed with respect to flraggling Seamers; and the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships, to whom fuch Volunteer Seamen shall be delivered, shall pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board, (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the Bounties of FIVE POUNDS to every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings to every Ordinary Seaman.

Landsbut, May 9. Nothing material has happened here lately. The Austrian Army remains hitherto very quiet in Bohemia. Marshal Daun changes his Quarters, from Time to Time, to Gitschin, Konigshoff and Jaromirs.

The main Body of the Prussian Army continues in their Quarters of Cantonment. But on the 5th Instant, a small Camp of Five Battalions (commanded by Major General Rebentish) was formed upon a Hill between this Place and Liebau, which serves to cover Landshut, and at the same Time to protect the advanced Post of Liebau.

The Recruits for compleating the Regiments are, it is faid, all arrived in Silesia, and expected to join their respective Corps forthwith.

Ziegenhayn, May 15. We are informed by Letters from Franconia of the 11th Instant, That, about three Days before, Prince Henry of Prussia had, with 10,000 Men, attacked General Maguire near Hoff, who was posted there with eight Battalions and some Cavalry; and that his Serene Highness had forced him, after some Resistance, to retire. Upon this Occasion, one Battalion of Marschal, one of Salm, and the Battalion of Darmstadt Grenadiers, suffered confiderably; and General Maguire, it is supposed, has lost 270 Men. The Prince of Salm is taken Prisoner, and three other Officers are either killed or taken. General Maguire retired by Asch towards Egra. During this Time, General Haddick quitted his Camp near Munchsberg, where he had entrenched himself, and marched in the Night, between the 9th and 10th, to Culmbach, where he arrived on the 10th in the Morning. When all the Troops of this Corps of the Army were arrived in that Camp, Orders were immediately given for fending away the Baggage, which filed off towards Bamberg. Towards the Evening, the Army decamped, and marched about a German Mile and an half beyond Culmbach, to Gaffmanstorff; the Rear Guard under the Orders of General Palfi remaining at Culmbach. Prince Henry's Army was on the 10th near Murichberg, and himfelf in the Town. His Royal Highness mrached the 11th into the Neighbourhood of Bareith; and his Quarters were that Night at Himmeloron, a Villege about a German Mile Lieutenant General Platen, of from thence. the Prussians, attacked, in the Afternoon of the anth, the Regiments of Croneck, and the Palatine Diagoons, under the Command of General Riedefel, which, after a good deal of Refistance, were both made Prisoners of War. "Tis affirmed, that the Combined Army of the Empire and Imperialifts was drawing towards Nuremberg. Crenach was Yesterday cannonaded by the Pruffians, but had not then furcendered.

Mussler, May 20. Prince Ferdinand arrived at Lipitadt the 18th, with the greatest Part of the Troops from the Left. General Imhoff commands those that remain in the Country of Hesse Cassel.

Lieutenant General Hardenburgh is marched to Ham, and has taken Post there with the same Battalions and Squadrons he had under his Command at Lipstadt. Orders are daily expected for the March of the Army in these Parts, to join his Serene Highness.

The Enemy has been in Motion for some Days from Dusseldorp.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Lockhart, of His Majesty's Ship the Chatham, of 50 Guns, to Mr. Clevland, dated Way 20, 1759, off Ulhant.

Since mine of the 7th, I have cruized in Company with His Majesty's Ships the Thames, of 32 Guns, commanded by Captain Coiby, and the Venus, of 36 Guns, commanded by Captain Harrison. On the 18th in the Morning, being in Hodierne Bay, we saw a French Frigate, and, after two Hours Chace, she carried her Top-masts away. Soon after the Thames came up and gave her a close and brisk Fire; but she did not strike till the Venus raked her, and

gave her some Broadsides. She proves to be the Arethusa Frigate, commanded by the Marquis Vaudreuil, pierced for 36 Guns, 32 mounted, and 270 Men, from Rochesort for Brest; has been launched about two Years, and is esteemed the best sailing Frigate in France. She had 60 Men killed and wounded. Captain Colby had 4 Men killed and 11 wounded, 3 of which are since dead. Captain Harrison had 5 Men wounded.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, councel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongs such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Ottenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon:

And their Lordihips do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-men-

tioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
