A^T the Court at Kenfington, the 11th Day of July, 1759,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IS Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all fuch of His Faithful Subjects, who fhall Inlift themfelves as Soldiers in His Majefty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, fhall not be fent out of Great Britain, and fhall be entitled to their Difcharge in Three Years, or at the End of the War if they choofe it—And His Majefty doth hereby further Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deferted before the Firft of June 1aft, fhall be pardoned for the fame, on Condition they join the Corps they laft ferved in by the 20th of August next—And in Cafe the R.giment they laft ferved in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then furrender themfelves to any other, in which they may ferve, and be entitled to His Majefty's most gracious Pardon.

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excel'ent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majefty was pleafed by His Order in Council of the 11th of July laft, to declare and order, (amongft other Things) That all fuch of His faithful Subjects, who fit ald from and after that Time inlift themfelves as Soldiers in His Land Service, should not be fent out of Great Britain, and fhould be intitled to their Discharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they should chuse it; -His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, dath hereby most graciously repeat and confirm the fame, with relation to fuch as shall hereafter enlift on those Conditions; as allo to fuch as have been inlifted in any Corps from the 11th of July laft to this Day-But whereas Doubts have arifen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Majefty's faid Order,-His Majefty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to fuch who fhall inlift themfelves in Great Britain, to ferve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elfewhere, or to fuch who may chufe to inlift in any of His Majefty's Corps in the usual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.

A T the Court at Kenfington, the 10th Day of August, 1759,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May laft, "For giving Encouragement to "Seamen, and Able-bodied Landmen, to enter "themfelves on Board His Majefty's Ships of " War ; for granting Rewards for discovering " fuch Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning fuch Seamen as have deferted, and " fhall return into the Service ; and alfo for " taking up all ftraggling Seamen", was, by Order in Council of the 26th of June laft, prolonged and extended from the 3d of July, to the 18th of this Inftant August — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service. that the fame fhould be continued for fome Time longer ; -His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, here-by order, that the Time limited by the faid Order in Council, be prolonged and extended from the aforefaid 18th Day of this Instant August, to the 29th Day of September next, and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majefty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the faid 29th Day of September next : - Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

H IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to approve of James Hamilton, Esq; to be Deputy or Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Pensilvania, upon the Appointment of Thomas and Richard Penn, Esqrs; Proprietaries of that Province.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Minden, August 4. The French having pushed forward a Detachment as far as Vechte, in order to block up the fmall Garrison we had there, Prince Ferdinand determined to relieve that Place: This was executed by M. de Schlieffen, his Serene Highnes's Aid de Camp, with about 40 Huffars, followed by 200 of Brietenbach's Dragoons. After fome Measures were taken about Provisions at Vechte, the Garrison of Bremen marched thither, under the Command of General Dreves, and from thence to Ofnabruck, where the Volontaires de Clermont were in Garrison. M. de Schlieffen forced one of the Gates of the Town, and made himfelf Mafter of it: The Volontaires loft fome Men and two Pieces of Cannon. This happened on the 28th of July in the Morning.
