Berlin, July 28. Count Dohna having had Leave, as he defired, to quit the Command of the Army against the Russians, and to retire to Berlin for the Recovery of his Health ; Lieutenant General Wedel was appointed to fucceed him, who accordingly arrived at the Camp of Zullichau on the 22d Inftant, efcorted by 200 Dragoons of Schorlemmer's Regiment, com-manded by Major Podewils. That Officer had, in his March, defeated one of the Enemy's Detachments (that was then plundering the Village of Radwitz) of which he took 69 Pri-1

foners, and killed upwards of 80. General Wedel's first Step, on his Arrival, 1933, to reconnoitre the Polition of the Ruffian Camp at Langemeil. On the 23d it appearing by the Motions of the Enemy, that their Intention was to quit that Camp, and again draw nearer the Oder, General Wedel, on his Side, in order to oppose their paffing that River, marched the Army in two Columns, one towards Kay, and the other towards Moze. The Head of our Van Guard, confifting of Cavalry, had hardly paffed the Defile of Kay, before they at-tacked the Enemy's Light Troops, which were repulfed with great Lofs. The Enemy was afterwards continually harraffed on their March; and our Cavalry, commanded by General Schorlemmer; fell upon hem at different Times, with great Impetuolity and Suc-cels. Lieutenant General Manteuffel, made, alfo, an Attack with fix Battalions, and poffeffed himfelf of feveral of the Enem 's Batteries. But as the Ruffians were advancing under Cover of the Batteries they had placed on the Heights, from whence they fired very brickly, while the Artillery on our Side could be of no Service, General Wedel thought proper to content himfelf with the Advantages he had gained, without returning to the Charge. He therefore pitched his Camp within Cannon Shot of the Enemy's; his Right Wing extending to the Hill of Kay, where the Attack begun. The Lofs we have had cannot yet be afcertained : It certainly does not exceed a Thousand Men killed and wound-That of the E emy, which is not exactly ed. known, is very confiderable. We loft General Woperfnow in one of the Attacks, and General Manteuffel was wounded.

HEREAS notwithHanding the feveral Acts of Parliament now in Ferce for preventing illegal Lotteries, and the feveral Convictions of Offenders in purfuance thereof, Information has been lately given to the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefly's Treafury, that there is now on Foot in Ireland a Scheme for raifing a Sum of Money by the Sale of Tickets or Chances to be determined by the Drawing of the prefent State Lottery, and that the faid Scheme is handed about this Town and other Parts of this Kingrom, and that Tickets or Chances agreeable thereunto are offered to Sale in Defiance and Contempt of the feveral Acts of Parliament for prohibiting the fame; Therefore, in order to put a Stop to fuch unlawful Proceedings, and to prevent the Ignorant and Unwary from being drawn in by fo illegal and pernicious a Practice; This is to inform the Public, that the Lords Com-miffioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions to their Sollicitor to profecute with the utmost Rigour and Severity of the Law all fuch as shall be anyways concerned in publishing fuch Schemes, or buying or felling any fuch Tickets or Chances. And whereas Mr. John M'Carrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, late of the City of London, were on the

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
