HIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all such of His Faithful Subjects, who shall Enlist themselves as Soldiers in His Majesty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, shall not be sent out of Great Britain, and shall be entitled to their Discharge in Three Years, or at the End of the War if they choose it—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deserted before the First of June last, shall be pardoned for the same, on Condition they join the Corps they last served in by the 20th of August next—And in Case the Regiment they last served in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then surrender themselves to any other, in which they may serve, and be entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 11th of July last, to declare and order, (amongst other Things) That all such of His faithful Subjects, who should from and after that Time enlist themselves as Soldiers in His Land Service, should not be sent out of Great Britain, and should be intitled to their Discharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they should chuse it;—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby most graciously repeat and confirm the same, with relation to such as shall hereafter enlist on those Conditions; as also to such as have been enlisted in any Corps from the 11th of July last to this Day—But whereas Doubts have arisen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Majesty's said Order,—His Majesty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to such who shall enlist themselves in Great Britain, to serve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elsewhere, or to such who may chuse to enlist in any of His Majesty's Corps in the usual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and Able-bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen", was, by Order in Council of the 26th of June last, prolonged and extended from the 3d of July, to the 18th of this Instant August—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer;—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that the Time limited by the said Order in Council, be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 18th Day of this Instant August, to the 29th Day of September next, and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 29th Day of September next:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Hague, August 17.* By Accounts from the Army under Prince Ferdinand, it appears, That his Serene Highness had marched from Dalen on the 12th, and arrived that Day at Stadberg, where his Head Quarters were on the 13th. The Hereditary Prince has attacked the Enemy's Rear Guard six several Times, and has always obtained some considerable Advantages, taking many Prisoners. His Highness, it is said, repassed the Weser on the 13th at Herftal, and is by that Means at Hand to join Prince Ferdinand, or act separately, as shall be thought adviseable. The French arrived on the 11th and 12th at Cassell, after having undergone a most fatiguing March, and been harrassed by the Hereditary Prince, till they passed the Defiles of Munden, of which Post, as well as of that of Weitzenhausen, his Highness took Possession, before he repassed the Weser. Col. Boyd has marched, in the most expeditious Manner, with his Detachment from Lipstadt to Munster, and, we hear, has begun his Attack upon the Town.

**W**HEREAS notwithstanding the several Acts of Parliament now in Force for preventing illegal Lotteries, and the several Convictions of Offenders in pursuance thereof, Information has been lately given to the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that there is now on Foot in Ireland a Scheme for raising a Sum of Money by the Sale of Tickets or Chances to be determined by the Drawing of the present State Lottery, and that the said Scheme is handed about this Town and other Parts of this Kingdom, and that Tickets or Chances agreeable thereunto are offered to Sale in Defiance and Contempt of the several Acts of Parliament for prohibiting the same; Therefore, in order to put a Stop to such unlawful Proceedings, and to prevent the Ignorant and Unwary from being drawn in by so illegal and pernicious a Practice; This is to inform the Public, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions to their Solicitor to prosecute with the utmost Rigour and Severity of the Law all such as shall be anyways concerned in publishing such Schemes, or buying or selling any such Tickets or Chances: And whereas Mr. John M'Carrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, late of the City of London, were on the 8th of March 1757, convicted of the like Offence, and have ever since absconded in order to avoid the Penalties thereby incurred: Therefore the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury are hereby pleased to offer a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to be paid to any Person or Persons that shall apprehend either of them, on immediate Notice thereof being given to Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; their Solicitor.
