THEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 11th of July last, to declare and order, (amongst other Things) That all such of His fairhful Subjects, who should from and after that Time inlift themselves as Soldiers in His Land Service, should not be sent out of Great Britain, and should be intitled to their Discharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they should chuse it; -His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby most gracicusty repeat and confirm the same, with relation to fuch as shall hereafter enlist on those Conditions; as also to such as have been inlisted in any Corps from the 11th of July last to this Day—But whereas Doubts have arisen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Ma. jesty's said Order,—His Majesty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to fuch who shall inlist themselves in Great Britain, to serve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elsewhere, or to such who may chuse to inlist in any of His Majesty's Corps in the usual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.

Hague, Sept. 7. By the last Accounts Prince Ferdinand's Army still remained encamped at Wetter; and the French kept their Polition behind the Ohm. It is supposed however, that they cannot continue there, but will choose rather to take a Camp between Giessen and Wetzlar; a sew Days must necessarily determine that Point. The Hereditary Prince, who Commands Detachment of the Allied Army upon the Right, is always close upon the French, and continually beating up their Quarters. His Highnels has croffed the Lahne, and encamped on the 2d Instant near Llohausen, and on the same Day pushed forward, with a Part of his Corps, to Nieder Weimar, where he surprised the Enemy, took two Pieces of Cannon, and feveral Prisoners, without any Loss on his Side.

We have received Accounts here, that the Russians marched from their Camp near Francfort upon the Oder, and left that Town on the 29th past, seeming to direct their Course towards Lusatia: Whereupon the King of Prussia marched from Furstenwalde, where he was incamped, crossed the River Sprehe, and advanced to Beeskow on the 30th, and from thence to Lubben on the 31st; General Finck having been lest behind, with a small Body of Men, in the Camp of Furstenwalde. A Corps of Austrians has joined the Army of the Empire; but that Junction has not prevented the Prussians under General Wunsch from retaking Wittenberg, and marching towards Torgau.
