HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint *Jeffery Amherst, Esq;* to be Captain General and Governor in Chief of His Majesty's Colony of *Virginia*.

Hague, Sept. 9. We have received certain Advices from *Prince Ferdinand's Army*, That his Serene Highness had at last obliged the French to abandon their strong Camp in the Neighbourhood of *Marbourg*, which they did on the Morning of the 4th, seeming to take the Route of *Giessen*; and on the 5th the Troops of the Allied Army took Possession of the Town, a French Garrison still remaining in the Castle, which has not yet surrendered. The Prince of *Bevern* however, who is posted on some Heights which Command the Castle, was preparing to raise some Batteries, in order to force them to a Surrender.

It appears that *General Imhoff* opened the Trenches before *Munster* on the 29th past; and his Batteries having been all ready on the 2d Instant, that he began to cannonade and bombard the Town on the 3d, by Day-break; but, the next Day, having received certain Intelligence that *M. d'Armentieres* was advancing with Ten Battalions, detached from before *Lipstadt*, and also with some Regiments of Militia drawn from the Garrisons of *Cologne, Dusseldorp, and Wesel*, *General Imhoff* did not think it advisable, with the small Force he had, to continue the Siege: It was accordingly raised on the 6th Instant, in the Morning; and *General Imhoff* retired, with his Corps, between *Nobisbruck* and *Tellight*.

Hague, Sept. 11. No direct News has been received from *Prince Ferdinand's Army* since the 5th Instant; but private Accounts say, that his Serene Highness was marched with his Army towards *Giessen*, and that it was not expected the French would make a Stand at that Place. By authentick Letters of the 4th Instant from *Berlin*, we are informed, the King of *Prussia* marched the 2d Instant to *Waldo* between *Luben* and *Mulhrose*, at which last Place the *Russians* had a considerable Detachment which was dislodged, and several Hundreds taken Prisoners. *Prince Henry* was at *Spremberg*; and *Marshal Daun's Army* at *Forst* and *Pforten*. It was thought there would be another Battle: The *Prussians* seem full of Hopes; and their two Armies are abundantly supplied with Provisions.

We likewise hear from *Brunswick* of the 7th Instant, That a Detachment of 216 *Hanoverian*

Chasseurs had drove Part of the Army of the Empire from *Rosla* near *Sondershausen*, as far as *Langensaltza*, and taken many Officers Prisoners.

Last Night her late Royal Highness Princess *Elizabeth Caroline* was privately Interred in the Royal Vault in *King Henry the Seventh's Chapel* at *Westminster*, the Body having been privately conveyed to the Prince's Chamber the Night before. About Nine o'Clock the Procession began, passing thro' the *Old Palace Yard* to the

the South East Door of the Abbey, upon a Floor railed in and lined with black Cloth, guarded by a Party of Foot Guards, in the following Order.—Knight Marshal's Men.—Servants to her Royal Highness in Livery.—Other Servants and Officers of the Prince of Wales and her Royal Highness.—Two Pages of Honour.—A Gentleman Usher.—Two Equerries.—Clerk of the Household to her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.—Secretary and Treasurer to her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.—Pursuivants and Heralds at Arms.—Master of the Horse and Chamberlain to her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.—Norroy King of Arms bearing the Coronet upon a Cushion, between two Gentlemen Ushers.—The Body under a Canopy borne by eight Gentlemen Ushers.—Garter principal King of Arms with his Rod of Office, between two Gentlemen Ushers.—The Countess of Taskerville as Chief Mourner.—Four Maids of Honour to the Princess Dowager of Wales, viz. Mrs. Dives, Miss Chudleigh, Mrs. Mostyn, Mrs. Egerton.—Two Bed-Chamber Women, Mrs. Dechair, Mrs. Goodrick.—Yeomen of the Guard. Within the Door of the Abbey, the Dean, Prebends, and Choir, fell into the Procession next before Norroy King of Arms, singing an Anthem to King Henry the Seventh's Chapel; where the Body being deposited upon Trestles, while the Part of the Funeral Service before the Interment was read by the Dean. The Coffin was then let down into the Vault; and the Dean having finished the Burial-Service, Garter King of Arms proclaimed her Royal Highness's Style as follows: "Thus it hath pleased Almighty God, to take out of this transitory Life, unto his Divine Mercy, the late most Illustrious Princess Elizabeth-Caroline, second Daughter of the most High, most Mighty, and most Illustrious Prince, Frederick late Prince of Wales.

WHEREAS notwithstanding the several Acts of Parliament now in Force for preventing illegal Lotteries, and the several Convictions of Offenders in pursuance thereof, Information has been lately given to the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that there is now on Foot in Ireland a Scheme for raising a Sum of Money by the Sale of Tickets or Chances to be determined by the Drawing of the present State Lottery, and that the said Scheme is handed about this Town and other Parts of this Kingdom, and that Tickets or Chances agreeable thereunto are offered to Sale in Defiance and Contempt of the several Acts of Parliament for prohibiting the same; Therefore, in order to put a Stop to such unlawful Proceedings, and to prevent the Ignorant and Unwary from being drawn in by so illegal and pernicious a Practice; This is to inform the Public, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions to their Solicitor to prosecute with the utmost Rigour and Severity of the Law all such as shall be anyways concerned in publishing such Schemes, or buying or selling any such Tickets or Chances. And whereas Mr. John McCarrick and Mr. Henry

Lunn, late of the City of London, were on the 8th of March 1757, convicted of the like Offences and have ever since absconded in order to avoid the Penalties thereby incurred: Therefore the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury are hereby pleased to offer a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to be paid to any Person or Persons that shall apprehend either of them, on immediate Notice thereof being given to Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; their Solicitor.

WHEREAS divers Foreign Neutral Ships or Vessels have, during the present War with France, been at different Times, in the Course of their respective Voyages, Piratically Robbed on the British Seas, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews of several English Ships or Vessels, who were, or pretended to be Privateers; And whereas in order effectually to prosecute the Persons who have committed any such Robberies, it is necessary to prove the Name of each respective Ship or Vessel so robbed, and the Name of the Master or Commander thereof, and the Time when, and the Species and Quantities of Goods Piratically taken, and their Values, with as much Exactness, as the Nature and Circumstances of the Case will admit of; And as it is hardly possible to make such Proofs without the Evidence of proper Persons, who belonged to, and were on Board each particular Ship or Vessel at the Time of its being Robbed; And whereas my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have, pursuant to the Directions of the Statute in that Behalf, ordered and appointed a Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and Goal Delivery to be held for the Jurisdiction of the Admiralty of Great Britain, at Justice Hall in the Old Bailey, London, on Monday the 29th Day of October next, for the Trying (amongst other Things) of Persons accused of the aforesaid Offences, several of whom are now in Custody, and may then be tried, in Case such Proofs as are above-mentioned shall be made of Robberies committed, and it shall appear by other Evidence, that they were concerned therein; And to the End that Persons, guilty of such Offences as aforesaid, may be brought to Justice, their Lordships are pleased to give this Publick Notice, That Samuel Seddon, Esq; their Solicitor, has Directions to prosecute, on His Majesty's Behalf, all Persons against whom proper Evidence can be produced touching the said Offences; And that the Master and Mate, or others, who were belonging to, and on Board any Foreign Neutral Ship or Vessel, at the Time of its being Piratically Robbed as aforesaid, may apply to the said Samuel Seddon, at his Houle in Piccadilly, London, either in Person or by Letter, and inform him of such Particulars relating to the Premises aforesaid, as they can give Evidence of.
