A T the Court at Kenfington, the 28th Day of September, 1759, PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majefty in Council.

WTHEREAS the Time limited by His W Majefty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May laft, "For giving Encouragement to "Seamen, and Able bodied Landmen, to enter "themfelves on Board His Majefty's Ships of "War; for granting Rewards for difcovering fuch Seamen as shall conceal themfelves; for " pardoning fuch Seamen as have deferted, and 46 fhall return into the Service ; and also for " taking up all ftraggling Seamen", hath been prolonged and extended to the 29th of this Inftant September : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, that the fame should be continued for some Time longer; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that the faid Time be prolonged and extended from the aforefaid 29th Day of this Instant September, to the 9th Day of November next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majefly's aforementioned Proclamation; be continued to be paid until the faid 9th Day of November next : Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majefty was pleafed by His Order in Council of the 11th of July last, to declare and order, (amongst other Things) That all fuch of His faithful Subjects, who should from and after that Time inlift themfelves as Soldiers in His Land Service, fhould not be fent out of Great Britain, and fhould be intitled to their Difcharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they fhould chuse it; -His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby most graciously repeat and confirm the fame, with relation to fuch as shall hereaster enlist on those Conditions; as also to such as have been inlifted in any Corps from the 11th of July laft to this Day-But whereas Doubts have arifen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Majefty's faid Order,-His Majefty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to fuch who thall inlift themfelves in Great Britain, to ferve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elfewhere, or to fuch who may chufe to inlift in any of His Majefty's Corps in the ufual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.

By the laft Accounts re-Hague, Oct. 2. ceived from Magdebourg it appears, That the united Corps of General Finck and General Wunsch had been attacked, the 21st of last Month, near Corbitz, not far from Drefden; by the Prince of Deux Ponts, and General Haddick, who had under their Command the greateft Part of the Army of the Empire, as likewife a confiderable Body of Auftrians; and that the latter had been obliged to retreat to the very Gates of Dreiden, after a very warm Cannonading on both Sides, which lafted from Teri o'Clock in the Morning till Eight at Night. The Lofs on either Side is not yet known. This Action; however, will probably be attended with the best Confequences to the Affairs of the Pruffians in Saxony. It is affured, that the King of Pruffia continued to follow the Ruffians, who feemed to intend the Siege of Glogau in Silefia. The Advantages, which Prince Henry of Pruffia was reported to have had over Marthal Daun's Army, are confirmed ; namely, that his Royal Highness had taken the Austrian Magazines at Gorlitz, Gabel, Bornisch Friedland, &c. upon the Frontiers of Bohemia: Upon which Maishal Daun had been forced to draw from Drefden both Forage and Provisions, for fublisting his Army. His Royal Highness had advanced as far as Gorlitz.

The laft Letters from Prince Ferdinand's Army, which are of the 26th paft, mention; That his Serene Highness's Army, and that of M. de Contades, continue in the fame Polition as before; and that Colonel Luckner's Appearance with his Corps in the Neighbourhood of Francfort and Coblentz had given a great Alarm to the French Quarters in those Parts.

W Hereas divers Foreign Neutral Ships or Veffels have, during the prefent War with France, been at different Times, in the Course of their refpec. tive Voyages, Piratically Robbed on the British Seas, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews of feveral English Ships or Vessels, who were, or pretended to be Privateers; And whereas in order effectually to profecute the Perfons who have committed any fuch Robberies, it is neceffary to prove the Name of each respective Ship or Vessel to robbed, and the Name of the Master or Commander thereof, and the Time when, and the Species and Quantities of Goods Piratically taken, and theinValues, with as much Exactness; as the Nature and Circumstances of the Cafe will admit of; And as it is hardly poffible to make fuch Proofs without the Evidence of proper Perfons, who belonged to, and were on Board each particular Ship or Veffel at the Time of its being Robbed; And whereas my Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty have, purfuant to the Directions of the Statute in that Behalf, ordered and appointed a Seffions
