To the King's most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, Citizens, and Commonalty of the City of Norwich.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Sheriffs, Citizens, and Commonalty of the City of Norwich in Common Council assembled, humbly beg Leave to profess, in your Royal Presence, the Joy of our Hearts at the glorious Efforts and Successes of the British Arms, in every Part of the World, to which they have been directed by your Majesty's paternal Care of your People, and the Wisdom of your Councils.

We adore the Goodness of Providence, in rewarding the many Royal Virtues which distinguish your Majesty's Reign with such an Accumulation of Glory, as the British History cannot parallel.

The domestic Peace and Security of these Islands, amidst the victorious Progress of your Majesty's Arms, in Germany, in the East and West Indies, on the Coast of Africa, in various Parts of the Ocean, and in the Heart of the Enemy's Possessions in America, manifest the extensive and irresistible Power of a British Monarch, ruling in the Hearts of His Subjects.

We sincerely regret, that so good a Cause as that of your Majesty in the present War, could not be defended without the Loss of a General, whose early Virtues and Abilities have rendered his Memory dear to his Country. But we bless God, and congratulate your Majesty, that many of his Survivors are equal to the Execution of your Wife, Vigorous, and Salutary Measures; and permit us, Sir, to rejoice in the Conduct of one, to whom it is the peculiar Happiness of this County to stand related, who, with a Roman Spirit, preferred the public Service to the Enjoyment of his noble Family and Fortune, and in a distant hazardous Enterprize, had the Honour of completing the important Conquest of Quebec.

May your Majesty long survive this just and necessary War! May you have the Glory of crowning the Wisdom of your Councils, and the Valour of your Forces, with an honourable and lasting Peace! And may this Nation ever render to your Majesty, and to your Royal Posterity, that Tribute of Duty and Gratitude, which is the most valuable of all your Rights,

and which was never so universally and cheerfully paid, as in your Majesty's happy Reign.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Edinburgh, most humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon the signal and uninterrupted Success, which, during the Course of this Year, hath attended the Arms of Great Britain, and particularly, upon that great and decisive Event, the Reduction of Quebec. With Hearts full of Reverence and Gratitude, we adore Almighty God, who hath inspired your Councils with Wisdom, and your Troops with such distinguished Valour; and it is with unfeigned Pleasure that we behold the British Arms triumphing over all your Enemies.

At the same Time that we have the Satisfaction to see the Pride and Power of France humbled in almost every Part of the World, we cannot, without the utmost Indignation, think on their present Attempt to invade these Kingdoms; which we must consider as the last and desperate Effort of their Revenge.

Animated with Zeal for our holy Religion, and our most excellent Constitution, and inviolably attached to your Majesty's Person and Government, we think ourselves called upon to exert ourselves in inspiring your Majesty's Subjects with the same Sentiments.

We the Ministers of the Gospel, by the constant Intercourse which we have with the People under our Charge, have the best Opportunity of knowing their Principles and Spirit; and we should do them great Injustice, did we not declare to your Majesty, that on this Occasion they discover the warmest Gratitude to God for these unparalleled Successes with which He hath blessed your Arms; that they are full of Affection to your Majesty's Person and Government, and that they wish for nothing more than to be enabled to repel any Insult that may be offered to these Kingdoms by the Arms of France.

Whilst the far greater Part of the military Force in this Kingdom is wisely and necessarily employed for protecting those Places which are of chief Importance; we can assure your Majesty,
