On a Prospect fo alarming, however improbable the Succefs, this Provincial Synod do noth humbly and devoully offer up their Prayers to Almighty God, that he may difappoint and defeat fo audacious an Enterprize. And while they glory in their unqueflioned Loyalty and Attachment to your Majefty's Sacred Perfon and Illuftrious Family, they have the Pleafure of giving the fulleft Aflurance to your Majefty, of the firm and determined Loyalty of the People under their Care : And they humbly beg Leave to affure your Majefty of their own and of their People's fteady Refolution to fuppert your Majefty's Government, at the Hazard of their Lives, and of all that is dear to them in this World.

And they humbly beg Leave, most gracious Sovereign, to add their most earnest Prayers, that the Divine Providence may guard and protect your Majefty's most Sacred Person from all Dangers; and that, notwithstanding the rostles and implacable Malice of your Enemies, your Majesty's Reign may be long and glorious, over a free and happy People; that the Imperial Diadem of these Realms may fit easy on your Royal Head; and that the Sceptre, as a Blessing to Posterity, may continue to latest Generations in your Illustrious Jouse.

It is our peculiar Happinefs to live in a Period that will be ever diffinguished in the British Annals, by the Glory of your Majetty's Conquests, the Wifdom and Unanimity of your Councils, and by the Loyalty and Affection of all your Majesty's Subjects. Under your Auspices the British Arms receive fresh Lustre ! Nor will any of those Victories, renowned in History, obtained by our Ancestors over the fame avowed and ever-aspiring Enemy, restect greater Honour to the British Name, than the Reduction of Guadaloupe, the Battle of Minden, and the Defeat under the Walls of Quebec, with the consequent Acquisition of the Metropolis of our Enemies in that Part of the World, and a whole Series of other in a portant Succeffes and favourable Events, with which it has pleafed God to blefs your Majefly's Arms by Sea and Land, in fo fmall a Compats of Time.

In the Review of many of theie great Atchievements, we behold with joyful Surprize every Otftacle of Art, of Nature, of Situation, of Climate, and of fupetior Numbers, overcome by the Intrepdity of your Majefty's Troops and Naval Force; and the Abilities and Perfeverance of those who commanded them : Nor doth the Victories and Acquifitions of your Majefty's Fleets and Armies redound more to the Honour, than to the real Interest and Benefit of our Country, the Welfare and Protection of our Trade, the Extension of the Protestant Religion, and the Deliverance of fo many of your Majefty's Subjects from the Incroachments of their Enemics, and all the Horror of favage Cruelty.
