P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in His Privy Council.

WHEREAS John Room, alias Rome, commonly called the Elder, of Tordiff, in North Britain, Farmer, and James Room, alias Rome, of the said Place, Farmer, Brother of George Room, alias Rome, of the said Place, and often called Little Jemmy, or Fighting Jemmy; were, upon the Nineteenth Day of January last, charged by Information of two credible Persons upon Oath, by them subscribed, before Mountague Farrer, Esq; one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Cumberland; with having been guilty, upon the Sixth Day of December last, of being, together with divers other Persons, to the Number of Eleven and upwards, armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, and so armed being assembled on Horseback at a Place called Brough Marsh in the County of Cumberland, in order to be aiding and assisting in conveying and carrying away uncustomed Goods, and forcibly hindering, obstructing, opposing and resisting the Officers of the Customs in the due Execution of their Duty, and firing their Pistols at them — Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Mountague Farrer, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who hath laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty in that Case made and provided. — His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said John Room, alias Rome, commonly called the Elder, and James Room, alias Rome, Brother of George Room, alias Rome, and often called Little Jemmy, or Fighting Jemmy, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Samuel Hilton, of Pinnington, Esq; Sheriff of the County of Lancaster.

Freyberg in Saxony, Jan. 16. His Prussian Majesty, finding it impossible to attack the Post of Dippoldeswalda, and the Frost increasing to an extreme Degree, thought proper, on the 12th Instant, to withdraw his Troops from Pretzschendorff and Frauenstein; and, since that Time, has fixed his Head-Quarters here. The Enemy did not even attempt to harraßs the Rear Guard of these Corps in their March hither. The Hereditary Prince of Brünswick came to this Place, along with the King of Prussia, on Saturday Morning; and, the same Day, Part of the Troops under his Command, marched to Odern, where they were to halt the next Day, and the Day after to go on to Chemnitz. The Austrian General Harßch, it is said, is marching through Bohemia by Lusatia into Saxony; and General Fouquet, with the Prussian Troops in Silesia, has Orders to attend his Motions. The Austrian General Beck still continues in the Neighbourhood of Großen Hayn; and his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia, keeps the same Position he has so long been in. Marshal Daun has yet made no Movement since the King of Prussia withdrew his Troops from Pretzschendorff and Frauenstein, except that the Austrians took Possession of that latter Post on the 12th.

Hague, Jan. 25. By the last Advices from Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Marbourg of the 18th Instant, we are informed, That on that Morning the Army began their March to their respective Winter Quarters: His Serene Highness's Head Quarters, it is supposed, will be fixed at Paderborn. The British Troops are to have theirs at Osnabrug, and in the Neighbourhood thereof, where they will arrive on the 28th Instant.
