THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to one Act agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Bill was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,*

An Act for granting to his Majesty several Duties upon Malt; and for raising the Sum of Eight Millions, by Way of Annuities, and a Lottery, to be charged on the said Duties; and to prevent the fraudulent obtaining of Allowances in the gauging of Corn making into Malt; and for making forth Duplicates of Exchequer Bills, Tickets, Certificates, Receipts, Annuity Orders, and other Orders, lost, burnt, or otherwise destroyed.

armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, and so armed being assembled on Horseback at a Place called Brough Marsh in the County of Cumberland, in order to be aiding and assisting in conveying and carrying away uncustomed Goods, and forcibly hindering, obstructing, opposing and resisting the Officers of the Customs in the due Execution of their Duty, and firing their Pistols at them — Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Mountague Farrer, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who hath laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty in that Case made and provided. — His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said John Room, alias Rome, commonly called the Elder, and James Room, alias Rome, Brother of George Room, alias Rome, and often called Little Jemmy, or Fighting Jemmy, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

This Day a Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter was held in the Council Chamber, Present, The Sovereign, the Prince of Wales, his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, his Royal Highness Prince Edward, the Duke of Newcastle, the Duke of Kingston, the Duke of Leeds, Earl Granville, the Earl of Lincoln, the Earl of Cardigan, the Duke of Devonshire, the Earl of Northumberland, and Earl Waldegrave; when Charles Marquis of Rockingham, and Richard Earl Temple, were knighted, and elected Companions of the said Most Noble Order; and afterwards invested with the Garter, Ribbon and George, with the accustomed Solemnities.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Wednesday the 23d of January last, in the Morning, the Body of Nathaniel Revell, of Gainsborough, in the County of Lincoln, Gentleman, was found dead, and floating, in the Cold Bath, near the Town of Gainsborough, aforesaid, with two large Wounds upon the Head; — That the said Nathaniel Revell was at the House of Elizabeth Dixon, Widow, in Gainsborough, aforesaid, until about Half an Hour past Five of the Clock, in the Evening of the 22d of the said Month of January last, in perfect Health of Body, and Tranquility of Mind; and that, about the Time last above-mentioned, the said Deceased left the said Mrs. Dixon, and was last seen walking down a Croft, at the Back of her House, which leads to a small Common, over which is a Foot-way, leading to that Part of the Town of Gainsborough, aforesaid, where the said Deceased lived; and that, the said Deceased usually walked, every Evening, along the said Foot-way, from the said Mrs. Dixon's, to his own Home, about that Time of the Night; — That, the said Deceased never came to his own Home all that Night, nor could be found, (tho' diligent Search was made for him) until the next Morning, about Ten o'Clock, when, his Body was found in the Cold Bath, (which stands upon the Piece of Common, nigh to the Foot-Road before-mentioned, and has been, for some Time, deserted and left open,) in the Situation before described; the Deceased's Hat lying near the Door on the Outside, and his Wig within the Dressing-Room; On the further Side of which Room there was, much Blood spilt, and a Trail of Blood, from thence, along the Floor, to the Door leading to the Steps of the Bath; — That, the Deceased's Pockets were rifled of his Gold Watch and Money: And that, by an Inquest taken, on the Body of the said Deceased, by one of the Coroners for the said County of Lincoln, on Thursday the 24th of the said Month of January last, it was found, that, the Deceased had died by such Wounds, or by the Water, or one of them; and that, the Cause of such his Death was Murder, committed by Persons unknown: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in committing the said Murder, is, hereby, pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who

shall discover one, or more, of his, or her, Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
