AT the Council Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 20th Day of *March*, 1760,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 24th of this Instant March; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer—It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 24th Day of this Instant March, to the 10th Day of May next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 10th Day of May next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Paderborn, March 22.* We have received an Account here, that a Body of our Troops detached under General Gilfoe, to oppose the French that were in Motion on the Side of Fulda, had attacked the Enemy who had taken Possession of an Eminence between Neuhooff and Fliede, where they made an Appearance of Resistance, but having been dislodged from thence, retired to Schlichtern. The Detail of this Action is not yet known. We hear however, that General Luckner, with his Chasseurs, signalized himself upon the Occasion.

*Hague, March 28.* On the 18th Instant the Deputies of the States General invited Major General Yorke, His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary, and M. Hellen, his Prussian Majesty's Minister, to a Conference; in which they were acquainted, that their High Mightinesses had taken the Resolution of offering to the Belligerent Powers the Town of Breda for Holding a Congress for treating of a general Peace; and were desired to convey this Pro-

posal to their Britannick and Prussian Majesties. The Ministers of the other Belligerent Powers have likewise had the same Communication made to them.

Notwithstanding the Advantages the French pretend to have gained over the English in Asia, all the Correspondence upon the Exchange of Amsterdamb agrees in confirming the Defeat of M. D'Ache's Squadron by Admiral Pocock; and that the former had been obliged to fly to the Isle de France, in a very shattered Condition, without having been able to put any Thing of Consequence ashore at Pondichery.

The King has been pleased to grant unto His Majesty's dearly beloved Grandson Prince Edward Augustus, and to the Heirs Male of his Royal Highness, the Dignities of Duke of the Kingdom of Great Britain, and of Earl of the Kingdom of Ireland, by the Names, Stiles, and Titles of Duke of York and of Albany in the said Kingdom of Great Britain, and of Earl of Ulster in the said Kingdom of Ireland.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on the Second Day of this Instant March, several Houses, in and near Lad Lane, London, were burnt down, by a sudden Fire, and that there is good Cause to suspect that one of the said Houses was set on Fire wilfully, by some wicked or malicious Persons;—His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, except the Owner or Occupier of the House where the Fire began, who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Governor and Company of the Royal Exchange Assurance, do, hereby, promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices concerned in setting Fire to any of the said Houses, except the Owner or Occupier of the House where the Fire began, to be paid, at their Office, on the Royal Exchange, upon the lawful Conviction of any one, or more, of the Offenders.

Salop, March 11, 1760.

WHEREAS on Friday the 14th of this Instant March, at Night, a large Gang of Smuglers were assembled at East Dean in the County of Suffex, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Running, Landing and Carrying away a large Quantity of Un-

customed Goods out of a Smugling Cutter then lying near the Shore: And whereas Henry Bean, one of the Officers of the Customs at East Dean aforesaid, and several other Officers of the Customs, did attempt to go on Board the said Cutter, in order to examine and search the same, but were forcibly and violently obstructed and hindered in the Execution of their Duty, by several Persons belonging to the said Cutter, who stood upon the Deck with Lighted Matches in their Hands, swearing they would sink the Boat, in Case the Officers attempted to come on Board, by which Means the Officers were prevented from doing their Duty, and a large Quantity of Prohibited and Uncustomed Goods were afterwards run out of the said Cutter: The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, do hereby promise a Reward of TWENTY POUNDS, for the apprehending and taking each of the said Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction.
