AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 2d Day of *May*, 1760,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 10th of this Instant May; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 10th Day of this Instant May, to the 21st Day of June next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 21st Day of June next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 23d of October last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit

the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Moray.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Moray, beg Leave to approach your Majesty's Throne, and at this our first Meeting after hearing with Certainty of the Reduction of Quebec, and of the happy Defeat of the late desperate Attempts to invade your Majesty's Kingdoms, to present with all Humility and unfeigned Joy, our Congratulations on these and the many other signal Successes, with which it hath pleased Almighty God to bless your Majesty's Arms by Sea and Land.

The Wisdom that inspires your Majesty's Counsels; the Conduct and Vigour with which they are carried into Execution in every Quarter of the Globe; and that national Unanimity which attends the public Measures; we observe with Gratitude to your Majesty, and the devoutest Acknowledgements to the King of Kings, who alone gives Wisdom and Strength, and to whom Salvation and Victory do belong.

Permit us, most gracious Sovereign, among the many amiable Qualities which adorn your Royal Character, to express our high Sense of that Magnanimity and heroic Disposition discovered by your Majesty in offering Peace to your Enemies in the Midst of your Victories and Conquests: A Disposition which adds Lustre to Sovereignty, and true Greatness to the Conqueror!

We beg Leave, with all Humility, to inform your Majesty, that we were Witnesses of the Terror and Alarm spread along this Coast, unarmed and defenceless, upon the Report of the intended French Invasion of your Majesty's Dominions. But if your Majesty's Wisdom shall see it meet to furnish the Inhabitants of this Province with Arms, we have not the least Doubt, from the Knowledge we have of their Spirit, Principles, and Loyalty, that under proper Regulations, they would employ these Arms with a Zeal and Fidelity not inferior to any of your Majesty's Subjects, in repelling Insults, defending your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, and maintaining the Peace, Religion, and Civil Constitution of their Country.

May we also be permitted, Most Gracious Sovereign,
