Strategic report Year ended 31 October 2018

Principal activity and review of the business

The principal activity of the company continued to be that of travel arrangers for both leisure and corporate clients. It acts as a principal in that it sells flight and ground product as a "package". Although it covers the whole range of clients' travel requirements it has particular strength in the "up market" and premium long haul sectors of the market.

Results and dividends

The profit for the year after taxation, amounted to £6,580,826 (2017-£7,703,531). The directors recommended a final dividend of £5,500,000 (2017-£5,000,000).

Review of performance

Turnover has increased in the year and, although weaker sterling increased the cost of ground products and put pressure on gross margins, gross profit has been maintained. The directors are very happy with the performance considering the headwinds faced by the market as a whole.

Year end financial position

The already strong balance sheet of the company was improved, leaving shareholders funds of £20,559,808 (2017-£19,478,982).

Principal risks and uncertainties

The company is not considered to have any particular regional or geographical risk arising from political or natural factors. In addition to the ATOL licences issued by the Civil Aviation Authority the group operates a client trust account which safeguards all client monies received for travel arrangements until such time as payment is due to the supplier or the client has travelled. Gross profit is then transferred to the general bank account. Interest arising from the funds held on account belongs to the Lotus Group of companies.

Financial risk management objectives and policies

Interest rate risk - the company is not considered to be at risk to interest rate change.

Charitable donations

During the year the company donated £1,000,000 (2017-£ nil) to Make My Day Better (a UK registered charity established by the Lotus Group).

Future developments

Trading has remained firm in all the company's markets and this is expected to continue. The company is committed to a continued improvement in systems, training and client service levels and to maintaining its high customer satisfaction levels.

Employment of disabled persons

The directors try to make sure, as far as possible, that the training, promotion and career development of disabled persons is the same as for other employees. If an individual becomes disabled, every effort is made to ensure that their employment can continue and any additional appropriate retraining is received.

Employee involvement

Employees and equal opportunitites - the company's sole criterion for recruitment and promotion is the ability of the individual to perform the job conerned without any discrimination on the grounds of race, religion, age, disability, marital status, parental status or sexual orientation. Employee involvement - the company makes use of an intranet system to keep staff informed of current developments affecting the company and to provide trading performance data for each operational level. There is a comprehensive uniform and transparent incentive scheme for the majority of the staff, which is based on performance. Staff views are fed back to management through formal regular meetings.

The company only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other accounts debtors and creditors and loans to and from group companies.

There have been no significant events affecting the company since the year end.

Notes to the financial statements Year ended 31 October 2018

1. General information

The company is a private company limited by shares, registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Lotus Travel Ltd, Sandpiper House, 37-39 Queen Elizabeth Street, London SE1 2BT.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

Accounting standards require the directors to consider the appropriateness of the going concern basis when preparing the financial statements. The directors confirm that the going concern basis remains appropriate as the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the Company's accounting policies (see note 3).

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

- the requirements of Section 4 Statement of financial Position paragraph 4.12(a)(iv):
- the requirements of Section 11 Financial Instruments paragraphs 11.41(b), 11.41(c), 11.41(e),
- 11.41(f), 11.42, 11.44 to 11.45, 11.47, 11.48(a)(iii), 11.48(a)(iv), 11.48(b) and 11.48(c);
- the requirements of Section 12 Other Flnancial Instruments paragraphs 12.26 to 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

Turnover

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for goods supplied and services rendered, net of discounts and Value Added Tax. Turnover in respect of inclusive tours is recognised at the date of booking, other income is recognised at the earlier of the date of invoicing or receipt of monies.

Taxation

The taxation expense represents the aggregate amount of current and deferred tax recognised in the reporting period. Tax is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in capital and reserves. In this case, tax is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in capital and reserves, respectively.

Current tax is recognised on taxable profit for the current and past periods. Current tax is measured at the amounts of tax expected to pay or recover using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences at the reporting date. Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date that are expected to apply to the reversal of the timing difference.

Notes to the financial statements (continued) Year ended 31 October 2018

Foreign currencies

Foreign currency transactions are initially recorded in the functional currency, by applying the spot exchange rate as at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rate ruling at the reporting date, with any gains or losses being taken to profit or loss.

Fixed asset investments

Fixed asset investments are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Listed investments are measured at fair value with changes in fair value being recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value. The group operates a client trust account to safeguard amounts received from clients. The amounts held are represented by bank balances. Interest on this account belongs to the Lotus Group of companies.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income using the effective interest method.

Dividends

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Final equity dividends are recognised when approved by the shareholders at an annual general meeting.

The company has a contingent liability to the companys' bankers as follows: unlimited guarantee to Lotus Group Ltd by debenture dated 8.12.1988; and a debenture dated 28.09.06. Lotus Travel Limited has provided an unlimited guarantee to Lotus International Limited.

16. Related party transactions

The company's immediate parent holding company is Lotus Group Limited, incorporated in England. It has included this company in its group accounts. Copies of the group accounts are available from its registered office: Sandpiper House, 37-39 Queen Elizabeth Street, London. SE1 2BT. The group has taken advantage of FRS 102 Section 33.7. not to disclose details of transactions between entities that are part of the group, where the financial statements are publicly available and 100% of the voting rights are controlled within the group. Key management personnel are considered to be the directors and their remuneration is disclosed in note 8.
