Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

Charitable Purposes

The Whithorn Trust exists to curate and to celebrate the site where the evidence of the earliest Christian practice, settlement and belief has been unearthed at Whithorn. It also promotes the archaeology and history of the area of all eras. It continues its important partnership with Historic Environment Scotland, with whom it shares the management of the Priory Museum and monument. It is also a strategic partner for National Museums Scotland, which continues to provide significant items for loan - in 2016/7 the Whithorn Crozier - as well as advice and training for employees of the Trust. The Trust continued to foster live archaeology at Black Loch of Myrton by AOC Archaeology, which afforded training and volunteering opportunities for staff and members of the public.

To interpret the site for the public, the Trust embarked on a major reconstruction project, to build a life-size Iron Age roundhouse on the Scheduled Monument site it leases from Scottish Ministers at Whithorn. The Trust raised significant funds to do this from HLF, Dumfries and Galloway LEADER programme, Holywood Trust, Garfield Weston Foundation, Hugh Fraser Foundation, Regional Arts Fund, and Robertson Trust. The reconstruction allowed for volunteer training, employment of local craftspeople and involvement from local schools and has since won the Trust plaudits from heritage and community regeneration organisations. Young people continued to work with the Trust via digital media and won the Scottish Heritage Angels Award 2016 in the Youth category. Media attention for the Trust's work included Reporting Scotland and ITV Border Life, as well as many newspaper and magazine articles. New digital technology was introduced to the site and the audio visual room was upgraded with a new projector and laptop.

The Trust continues its close relationship with Whithorn and Garlieston Schools, supporting their Wider Achievement programme, as well as educational visits to explore the life of the Celts.

A Whithorn Trust Lecture was held at the Book Festival, with Philippa Langley lecturing on Richard III and his Whithorn connections to the St Ninian cult.

In the winter of 2016/7, the Trust raised further funds to film and market the Whithorn Way pilgrimage route, a 145 mile route from Glasgow to Whithorn. The project involves engaging with local schools to create pilgrim stamps, publishing a guidebook to the historic pilgrimage monuments along the way, and, following completion of its feasibility study, installing a section of footpath from Whithorn via Rispain to the coast.

The Trust is supporting the All Roads Lead to Whithorn Trust in its large-scale plans to renovate the New Town Hall, Whithorn, to include a pilgrim bunkhouse to the rear of the current Hall.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Fundraising activities

Year 2016/17 was dominated by the construction of the Iron Age roundhouse, which received significant funding from HLF, DG LEADER, the Holywood Trust, The Robertson Trust, the Friends of Ninian and Whithorn, the Garfield Weston Foundation, the Hugh Fraser Foundation and the People's Projects.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Trust's aim with the reconstruction Iron Age roundhouse was to create a high-profile, family-friendly attraction, based on archaeological details, and to increase visitors and to attract a younger audience. It was anticipated that this would bring a significant increase to ticket sales during the forthcoming 2017/8 season.

The Trust continues to be supported by grant aid from Wigtown Area Committee, though it expects that, over the coming years, revenue support will decrease, owing to the Council's reduced budgets over the whole of its operations. For the second year, the manager's salary was supported by The Headley Trust and this has significantly helped support the Trust's financial position during 2016/7. This grant will cease at Easter 2018. The Trust received its staging date for creating a Workplace Pensions scheme in early 2017 and this will be implemented in full during 2017/8.

The Trust continues to ensure staff productivity by designing rotas to reflect peak times and ensuring that staff are employed to best advantage; volunteers have significantly contributed to the Trust's operations once again during 2016/7. Strict monitoring of the Trust's high energy costs has been carried out by a volunteer with a background in facilities management and this has assisted in keeping costs down where possible; the longer term solution to the Trust's energy costs will be the renovation of the building, for which the Trust has now applied for feasibility study funds, to employ a museum designer and an architect. Results from this are expected in 2017/8.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Company is a Company Limited by Guarantee and is a Registered Charity in Scotland. The Company operates a museum which is accredited under Museums and Galleries Scotland.

The Trust continued with implementing its new Memorandum and Articles by revising membership and inviting directors to join in accordance with the composition of the Board specified in the Memorandum and Articles.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective I January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 20% on reducing balance

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
